FATHER BOB'S MUTTERINGS

24th Sunday of Ordinary Time

Mark 8:27-35

Jesus tells us in Mark's gospel today that we must take up our cross and follow Him. This is not a walk in the park but a call to make more than a few changes in our lives. Through the cross of Jesus we are called to "let go" instead of "get more." Jesus calls us on the path of the cross to be self-giving and other directed. It means that the wisdom of the world must give way to the wisdom of God. It is a fearful thing because it calls us to change. It challenges us to trust that we are already held in the hand of God who gives us life and gives life to our dying world. The questions for us this week are: Can we answer the challenges of this difficult call from God? Can we truly say that we are ready to take up our cross, with all that that entails, and follow Jesus?

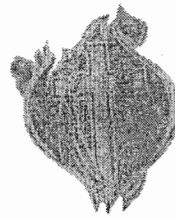

Feast of St. Matthew

Sept. 21st
 Chances are, you know Matthew’s Gospel better than you know the other three. It contains the Sermon on the Mount with the Beatitudes and the Lord’s Prayer. It highlights the ministry of Peter. In it, Jesus urges the disciple to works of mercy because “what you do to the least you do to me.” It records stories about the birth of Jesus, the coming of the Magi, the flight into Egypt and the slaughter of the innocents. Its account of the death of Christ thunders with an earthquake. For centuries, Matthew’s popular Gospel dominated the scripture readings Catholics heard at Mass. But when the lectionary was revised in 1969, it became associated with the first of a three-year cycle of readings.

Most people assume that the author of this Gospel was the tax collector who decided to follow Jesus. However, this is not likely. The writer of Matthew’s Gospel is sometimes symbolized as a man or an angel, recalling the genealogy that opens the book. Even though this Gospel was probably written after Mark’s, it appears first in the New Testament and first in the lectionary cycle. Its central message is embedded in the title associated with Jesus at his birth, “Emmanuel--God with us.” In Jesus, God is with us. To Jesus, we respond as disciples.

My Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

For the past three years I have been privileged to serve as chairman of a committee of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) called the *Secretariat for the Church in Latin America*. Along with six of my brother bishops, this committee is charged with conducting a yearly national collection for the church in Latin America and to see that the funds raised are responsibly distributed. "Pastoral" projects in individual parishes and dioceses throughout Central and South America and the Caribbean are the beneficiaries of this annual collection.

Each year the committee receives hundreds of requests for local pastoral projects such as: youth formation and evangelization in the Dominican Republic, education of seminarians in Peru, and sacramental preparation for our brothers and sisters in Honduras. Last year we were able to provide financial assistance to 470 of these ministerial projects, in 21 countries of the southern hemisphere.

As we have witnessed here in the Archdiocese of Chicago, the Church in the United States is being fortified by clergy, religious and laity from many Latin American countries. Consequently, our generous support of this collection will directly impact hundreds of thousands within the Catholic Church in South America and the USA.

On behalf of those who, while lacking financial resources, are blessed in faith and love for Our Lord Jesus Christ, please accept my gratitude for your support of this effort.

Originally from Sydney, Australia, Matthew Kelly began his Catholic Ministry in 1993 at the age of 19. Since then, more than three million people from around the world have attended his talks, seminars and retreats. Millions more have been touched by his writings and appearances on radio and television.

Our D.R.E., Pat Kahl, heard Matthew at a convention she attended last December. She purchased several of his books which he autographed.

I borrowed his book, "The Rhythm of Life", to read while flying to California for a baptism last March. I am not much of a reader, but I couldn't put the book down. I wrote him a note to tell him how much I enjoyed and learned from it. A short time later two boxes appeared from the Matthew Kelly Foundation. When I opened the boxes, I found a nice note from Matthew and many CD's. The CD's are audio of three of his books.

- 1) The Seven Levels of Intimacy
- 2) Becoming the Best Version of Yourself
- 3) Building Better Families

He told me, "share them with the people you serve." You may check them out on a weekly basis and share his message with others. These CD's are available in Room 105, of the Religious Education Office in the Education Building. You can actually be inspired by Matthew before he gets here!

Who Do You Say That I Am?



In the United States, more than half a million catechists serve in the nation's parishes, missions, and schools. The dedication and commitment of these catechists is something that deserves to be celebrated. The annual celebration of Catechetical Sunday is an occasion for recognizing, affirming, and supporting their efforts through a formal rite of blessing. In like manner, all Catholics, especially parents, are called to renew their commitment to hand on the faith and to serve as witnesses of the Good News in ways that are more informal but just as important.

This year's Catechetical Sunday theme is "Who Do You Say That I Am?" It comes from Mark 8:27-35, the Gospel reading for today. The question that Jesus asked his disciples so long ago is one that each Christian must answer for her- or himself even today. How we respond to this question affects how we live, pray, make decisions, and form relationships. It is a question that goes to the very heart of Christian discipleship.

RESPONDING IN FAITH

By living the question "Who do you say that I am?" we make an intentional effort to deepen our relationship with Jesus. Our response is best lived out within the ordinary pace of our lives. There are some ways we might do this.

Share What You Know

Think about enriching the lives of our young people participating in religious education programs

by being a catechist. Share your insight by working with those preparing to baptize a child or to marry through our baptismal or wedding preparation programs.

Deepen your participation in the Eucharist

Dedicate yourself to being present each Sunday at Mass and to pay close attention to the words, gestures, music and rituals that are part of our Eucharistic celebrations. Prepare yourself to participate more fully in the liturgy by reflecting on the readings before and after mass.

Base your choices on Christian principles

Each day brings multiple possibilities for choosing a Christian way of life. How do the things you buy and the way you spend your time reflect your faith in Jesus? How do you choose to treat others at home, in the workplace, at school, and in the neighborhood, mall, or parish so that your love is reflected in your words and in your deeds?

Set aside time for prayer

Pay attention to the benefits that come with the wise and wonderful spiritual practice of prayer. Commit yourself to a dedicated time for reflection each day. Give thanks for those people, living or dead, who inspire you to live generously and graciously.

Reach out to those in need

Accounts of global terror and tragedy can leave us feeling overwhelmed and powerless to do anything to help. Follow the example of Jesus to transform your fear into faithful action. Participate in the many parish social outreach projects that are named in the parish bulletin. While doing so, remember we create change in the life-giving and positive action we take.


