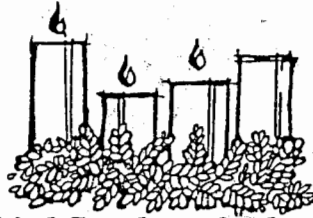

Third Sunday of Advent

"The crowds asked John, 'What ought we to do?'" John the Baptist does not hesitate to inform each one of them that they must treat one another with honesty and charity in all that they do. John's message is appropriate for you and me in our world today as we continue our journey of hope. We are called, by the gospel, to treat one another with honesty and charity at all times. Indeed, at this time of the year, it often seems natural to reach out in charity to those who are in need but what of the rest of the year? Do we reach out to the homeless person on the street corner? Do we notice the neighbor or co-worker who is hurting and in need of our help and support? Do we regularly treat everyone we meet with honesty and charity? Let us spend this third week of advent in prayer and reflection on John's answer to our question "What ought we to do?"

Compassionate Care Ministry

John's call for us to reach out with honesty and charity to those in need becomes concrete for us if we have ever experienced the devastating loss of a spouse, sibling, child or close family member or friend. St. Cletus Parish is attempting to reach out to those suffering a loss with our new compassionate care ministry. The core organizing committee of this vital ministry will speak to us at each of the Masses this weekend regarding opportunities for people to serve their fellow parishioners in this ministry. Please consider reaching out in charity to those who have suffered a loss in their life.

Parish Forgiveness Service

This Tuesday, December 19, 2006 at 7:00 p.m., we will celebrate the sacrament of reconciliation together as a parish family. The service will include scripture, prayer, examination of conscience, and reflection. Confessions will take place at the regular communion stations with the penitent sharing one thing that they would like to ask God to forgive. The priest will then offer individual absolution. We will conclude our service with a communal penance and closing prayer. Please use this opportunity to experience God's forgiveness and receive the gift of God's grace in your life.

Advent Signs and Symbols

Our Journey of Hope continues this third week of Advent with new signs and symbols. You will notice the addition of the crèche with only the angel, shepherd, and animals this week. The road continues over the altar and up the back wall pointing us to the star of hope. We see the addition of trees and green plants as we come closer to the end of our journey. All lead us, in great anticipation, to the celebration of God's gift to us in the Christ Child.

Today is traditionally known as Gaudete Sunday. It is named from the Latin word meaning “rejoice.” We rejoice not only because we move into the second half of Advent, but also because the liturgy now turns from focusing on the return of Christ in his glory at the end of time to the approaching commemoration of Christ’s first coming in the flesh — his birth in Bethlehem. From today on, the liturgy calls us to look back to the greatest of all God’s actions in human history: God himself breaking into our experience, our existence, in the person of Jesus the Christ.

We read in Zephaniah today that God “will sing joyfully because of you, / as one sings at festivals” (Zephaniah 3:18). We know plenty about singing at festivals. Already our ears are ringing with the songs and carols that anticipate the Christmas season.

Paul reminds us of the source of our own double rejoicing: God is the mighty savior who is in our midst (in Zephaniah’s words). Because this is so, says Paul, we can rejoice and be at ease. We don’t have to worry, for God’s peace will stand guard over our hearts and minds

A medieval carol depicts Christmas as “my dancing day” and urges us to enter into the dance. Why all the merrymaking? Because “the Lord is near,” as Paul reminds us (Philippians 4:5). He then points to another reason for the dancing: the dawn of the promise of peace, the peace beyond all understanding, that is now within our grasp.

SUNDAY, DECEMBER 17, 2006

3RD SUNDAY OF ADVENT; GAUDETE SUNDAY

The way of wisdom

The church throws two unusual words at us today: *gaudete* and *antiphon*. The first comes from the Latin for “rejoice,” and the Mass readings for today sound a note of joy—both our rejoicing in the Lord and his rejoicing in us! The rose color you see in church and the third candle of the Advent wreath symbolize this joy. *Antiphon* means “response,” as in a prayer in which responses go back and forth. For seven consecutive days the evening prayer of the church will use a particular kind of antiphon, the “O Antiphons,” which occur only at this time of year. Each of them calls on a biblical name for the Messiah. They also make fine little prayers in themselves and offer a way to do a bit more to prepare for the birth of Christ.

TODAY’S READINGS: *Zephaniah 3:14-18a; Philippians 4:4-7; Luke 3:10-18*

O Antiphon: “O Wisdom, O holy Word of God, you govern all creation with your strong yet tender care: Come and show your people the way of salvation.”

MONDAY, DECEMBER 18 ADVENT WEEKDAY

What’s in a name?

The Israelites had several substitute names for God—because, out of reverence for the sacredness of the holy name, they did not want to write or say God’s actual name. When God first appeared to Moses, in the burning bush, God told him to say to the people, “I AM sent me,” a play on the name *Yahweh*. Another substitute name was *Adonai*, which means “my Lord.”

Like the Israelites, we are taught to revere God more than anything else. But God also wants to be with us and invites us into the divine life, at the heart of which is love. God is revealed in the commandments and in Jesus. We can talk with God, just as Moses did. All we need to do is speak and listen.

TODAY’S READINGS: *Jeremiah 23:5-8; Matthew 1:18-25*

O Antiphon: “O *Adonai*, sacred Lord of ancient Israel, who showed yourself to Moses in the burning bush, who gave him the holy law on Sinai mountain: Come, stretch out your right hand to set us free.”

TUESDAY, DECEMBER 19 ADVENT WEEKDAY

Bow down your heads and listen

Today’s O Antiphon proclaims the majesty of Jesus. Jesus is worthy of our reverence. Why? Because he is born of the royal House of David, son of Jesse? No, because he is the Word of God. We stand silent in his presence that we might hear God’s whispers of love, acceptance, and encouragement. We pray for Jesus to come to our aid, for we know that he need only say the word, and our souls shall be healed.

TODAY’S READINGS: *Judges 13:2-7, 24-25a; Luke 1:5-25*

O Antiphon: “O Flower of Jesse’s stem, you have been raised up as a sign for all peoples; kings stand silent in your presence; the nations bow down in worship before you. Come, let nothing keep you from coming to our aid.”

WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 20 ADVENT WEEKDAY

The key to the mystery

With all the Advent talk of expectant waiting for new life, the reality for many families is that some of their sick and elderly are choosing this time of year to let go and go home to God. We hold these mysteries of birth and death together. If you are around death and the dying at this time of year—or any time—

remember that a God who can bring life from Mary, a virgin, and Elizabeth, an elderly woman, can draw eternal life out of the bounds of death.

TODAY’S READINGS: *Isaiah 7:10-14; Luke 1:26-38*

O Antiphon: “O Key of David, O royal power of Israel controlling at your will the gate of heaven: Come, break down the prison walls of death for those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death; and lead your captive people into heaven.”

THURSDAY, DECEMBER 21 ADVENT WEEKDAY; WINTER SOLSTICE

A light shines in the darkness

A lit Christmas tree in a darkened room, evening services at a church bathed in candlelight, neighborhoods aglow with colored lights—these Christmas traditions remind us that something special has taken place with the birth of Jesus. We are given a way out of the darkness of sin and despair; shown the path of patience and tolerance; and led to the place where holiness radiates: our own hearts. Open your heart today and see for yourself.

TODAY’S READINGS: *Song of Songs 2:8-14 or Zephaniah 3:14-18a; Luke 1:39-45*

O Antiphon: “O Radiant Dawn, splendor of eternal light, sun of justice: come, shine on those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death.”

FRIDAY, DECEMBER 22 ADVENT WEEKDAY

A roof over our heads

According to the story of God’s creation of human beings in Genesis (the second creation story is in Genesis 2:7; the first one is at 1:26-27), “The Lord God formed man from the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and the man became a living being.” God formed us from the clay of the earth and breathed the Spirit into us to give us life. From this clay come the “living stones” to be “built into a spiritual house” (1 Peter 2:5). As individuals we come together in the church to build up the Kingdom of God. At the capstone of this temple is Christ, the head of the body. Be a living stone. Raise your arms in prayer and action to build up this wonderful building and be the hands of Christ in the world.

TODAY’S READINGS: *1 Samuel 1:24-28; Luke 1:46-56*

O Antiphon: “O King of all the nations, the only joy of every human heart: O Keystone of the mighty arch of humanity: Come and save the creatures you fashioned from the dust.”

SATURDAY, DECEMBER 23 ADVENT WEEKDAY

With all my heart

What do you long for, with all your heart, at this time of your life? Some of us may be seeking love, companionship, understanding, or peace of mind. Others may desire more specific things: a home, employment, the strength to make a hard decision. Some may be praying just to get through this holiday season in one piece. We want to escape the harsh experiences of the past year or cling to the things and people we may feel are slipping away. Whatever the deepest desires of your heart, lay them at the feet of the Christ child this season.

TODAY’S READINGS: *Malachi 3:1-4, 23-24; Luke 1:57-66*

O Antiphon: “O Emmanuel, king and lawgiver, desire of the nations, Savior of all people, come and set us free, Lord our God.”



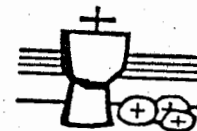
