FR. BOB'S UTTERINGS

First Sunday of Lent

Luke 4:1-13

Our Parish Lenten focus this year is "Embracing the Challenge of Conversion." Changing where we are in our lives or who we have become is often difficult. Looking at ourselves can be a painful experience at times. We often discover that we have not been as faithful as we should to our call of discipleship. We sometimes discover that we have wandered from our close personal relationship with the Lord and have fallen into sin. The true challenge during this holy season is our willingness to embrace the often difficult task of converting our personal lives to be in tune with the Lord.

Lent is a time for us to return to our roots. Some of us will see this period as penitential, a time for reparation for our sins; some of us will see this as a time for growing more prayerful or a time to reestablish our lives in service to others; others will use this time to deepen their faith. Lent can truly be all of that. Yet the readings for this first Sunday of Lent take us back to how it once was and who was once shaping our lives.

Let us use this holy season to "Embrace the Challenge of Conversion" in our lives by looking at the many ways in which we can have our Lenten journey lead us back to our roots. Spend time in prayer with the scriptures; go on a retreat; read the lives of the saints; pray the rosary; sit in silent prayer and reflection; make the stations of the cross; keep a prayer journal; visit the sick; offer reconciliation to an enemy; do some long put off spiritual reading; give alms to our parish Heifer International Project; fast and abstain from meat; make a sacrifice for the benefit of another, expecting nothing in return; attend daily Mass. These are all part of our rich traditions that return us back to our roots. Here in these Lenten sacrifices we will once again meet who we have been called to be by our baptism. Do not be afraid to truly "Embrace the Challenge of Conversion." It has the potential to change not only you but the world around you.

FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT

Into the desert

"It is written, 'Worship the Lord your God, and serve only him.'" How many of us

wouldn't jump at the chance for a 40-day retreat in the desert? Forty days with no cell phones or deadlines, cranky coworkers, or uncooperative children? Sign me up!

On second thought, it wouldn't be so easy. Without our daily distractions, we would be compelled to look within to observe and confront all that keeps us from living an authentic, God-centered life. Yikes! What might we find? This is the meaning of Lent: For 40 days we minimize the distractions, we go within, we face our demons, and we recognize our reliance on God. We are not afraid; Jesus showed us the way. Today we follow him into the desert.

MONDAY, FEBRUARY 26 LENTEN WEEKDAY

See for yourself

In our creed, we profess faith in "all that is seen and unseen." The unseen is not only the parts of the created universe we've yet to discover but the Spirit's workings we've yet to comprehend. Jesus tells us he can be found in the least of our brothers and sisters, yet most of us squint and strain and still find our vision blurred. Next time you pass one who is hungry and thirsty, try to see your father, mother, child, spouse, or friend in the face looking up at you. Could you pass that person by? No? Now see in that face the one who saved you for all eternity. Can you refuse to lend him a hand? Seeing is believing.

"Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you food, or thirsty and gave you drink?"

TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 27 LENTEN WEEKDAY

This is how you are to pray

The Lord's Prayer may be the essential Christian prayer. It's certainly one of the most frequently prayed by Christians of all stripes. Why? One reason is that it's what Jesus gave the disciples when they asked him how to pray. Because this prayer is from the Lord, we are in especially close communion with him when we pray it.

Another reason may be that the "Our Father" says so much about prayer, like it's OK to pray for both big and little things. The big stuff—like the coming of God's kingdom and the doing of God's will on earth and in heaven—and also the "little" but equally important stuff: daily food, forgiveness both received and given, and protection from temptation and evil. Pray for what the world needs today, and for what you need.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Isaiah 55:10-11; Matthew 6:7-15*

"Give us this day our daily bread."

WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 28 LENTEN WEEKDAY

Who do you think you are, the Queen of Sheba?

Walking around like you're the Queen of Sheba isn't necessarily a bad thing. In Jesus' view the Queen of the South is at least as wise as Solomon, because she knew wisdom when she heard it. Where do you go to attend to the voice of wisdom—family, friend, mentor? Scripture, tradition, prayer? Consider this piece

of advice from the Book of Proverbs: "Fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom." Open your heart to wise counsel.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Jonah 3:1-10; Luke 11:29-32*

"The queen of the South came from the ends of the earth to listen to Solomon, and see, something greater than Solomon is here!"

THURSDAY, MARCH 1 LENTEN WEEKDAY; SAINT DAVID'S DAY

Seek and you will find

Saint David, a sixth-century bishop, is the patron saint of Wales. Many stories of miracles connected to David have come down to us. In one, while he was preaching, not everyone could see him, so he made the ground rise in order to accommodate those in the back. Another story says the water from the font in which he was baptized was said to heal.

These traditional tales express a faith in God who touches people and makes healing accessible. Turn to God today and pray for your needs and those of others: healing for the sick, restoration of broken relationships, openness to the needs of those around you. God will hear your prayer and respond to it according to God's will. Trust that holy will.

FRIDAY, MARCH 2 LENTEN WEEKDAY; WORLD DAY OF PRAYER

We're all in this together

World Day of Prayer is an ecumenical effort of women in 170 countries that encourages women "to become aware of the whole world and no longer live in isolation; to be enriched by the faith experience of Christians of other countries and cultures; to take up the burdens of other people and pray with and for them; to become aware of their talents and use them in the service of society." You can follow the leadership of these women by praying and putting your prayer into action. On this day of Lenten abstinence, make your prayer an offering for the good of the world.

SATURDAY, MARCH 3 FEAST OF KATHERINE DREXEL, VIRGIN

Reaching beyond our circle

Born into a wealthy Philadelphia family, Katharine Drexel (1858-1955) eventually spent her large inheritance in founding a religious order, the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament, and establishing schools and missions for Native Americans and African Americans, including Xavier University in New Orleans, the only predominantly black Catholic institution of higher learning in the United States. The Sisters continue Mother Drexel's work today through prayer, counseling, education, health care, social work, and other works of mercy, especially in connection with the poor and oppressed and among Native American, African American, and Haitian peoples.

Ahead of her time, Mother Drexel had a special concern for excluded people. Is there someone you can reach out to today with whom you usually wouldn't communicate?

"Meet Our R.C.I.A. Candidates"

I grew up in Rock Falls, Illinois, a small town about 100 miles west of the Chicago area. I was born to a Catholic mother who died when I was an infant, and raised in the Methodist religion after my father remarried. I have lived in the Chicago area since the early 1980's. I purchased my home in Brookfield, in 1999. I live there with my 20-year-old son, one dog and five cats.

I did not attend church services regularly for most of my adult life. When I did occasionally attend, it was usually to accompany a friend to a Catholic Mass. I always enjoyed the feel of the Mass and the sense of the community. This is what first interested me in becoming Catholic. My personal sponsor is a close friend I have known for 11 years. She has been prodding me gently and sometimes not so gently to explore becoming Catholic for ten of those years. A couple of years ago I began reporting to a new manager at work who is a deacon at his parish, and we've had several discussions about the Catholic faith since that time. I began attending Mass at a couple of local parishes, and decided I did want to pursue R.C.I.A.
