EMBRACE THE CHALLENGE OF CONVERSION

In the Gospel today, Jesus warns his followers to be holy for there is always the possibility of sudden death. Even if God spares the sinner, as the fig tree is spared, it is only for a limited time. Ultimately, all will be called to judgment. What is required, therefore, is repentance. Not surprisingly, repentance is a basic theme of Lent. We as Christians are to prepare for the sacred events of Holy Week by making a sincere effort to repent for our sins and to truly seek greater holiness in the future.

This week we will have a very important opportunity to spend three days in prayer during our Lenten Mission. The next three days are set aside for us to reflect on past sinfulness and to seek true conversion in our future relationships with God and neighbor. We will have the opportunity to "Embrace the Challenge of Conversion" in our lives as we listen to Fr. Lou Tylka lead us through the Mission. He will guide us as a community of faith with opportunities for reflection, prayer, reconciliation, thanksgiving, and celebration of the Eucharist over the next few days.

Let us not miss this wonderful opportunity to grow in holiness as we enter the third week of Lent. Join your fellow parishioners on Monday, March 12, Tuesday, March 13, and Wednesday, March 14, at 7:30 p.m. in the church and experience the blessings of our Lenten Mission.

Words we don't want to hear

Say you're a tree. And you're in God's vineyard. And God comes along and finds no fruit

for the kingdom on your branches. "Cut it down!" God says. The gardener, who is Jesus, offers a suggestion. "Let's give it one more season to make good." This is your season. What are you going to do with it? As the story goes, we're always in our final season. This is the life we get, the one that counts. What manure will we use to make sure this year's harvest is better than the last? Prayer, fasting, and almsgiving come highly recommended.

Listen before you leap on the messenger

Once upon a time in Nazareth, Jesus' hometown community tried to kill him. Did these folks misunderstand his teaching that they felt such rage against him? Or was the problem that they understood Jesus perfectly? Jesus had suggested that his fellow citizens were not prepared to accept God's Word, but foreigners might. If a preacher got up and said his words in our churches today, he might receive a similar send-off. We like to think we're pretty good people and on the right path. But are we prepared for the call to change?

TUESDAY, MARCH 13 LENTEN WEEKDAY

Lighten your load

Forgiveness is one of those things that's easier said than done. Even after we've reluctantly uttered the words, "OK, you're forgiven," who among us hasn't secretly carried a grudge against our offender? Judging by the number of lawsuits filed each year, we aren't so good at forgiving our debtors or trespassers. But does "forgiving from the heart," as we are called to do, mean we have to become everyone's favorite doormat? Hardly. It simply means that we accept the fact that others are as human and prone to folly as are we. Lent is the perfect season to practice forgiving from the heart. Give it a try—you'll feel lighter when you no longer have to carry that grudge around.

WEDNESDAY, MARCH 14 LENTEN WEEKDAY

Teach by example

"Do as I say, not as I do" is a good trick, but it doesn't work. Which one of us hasn't said at some point, "Omygod! I'm becoming my mother!"—or father, depending on our gender? The really scary part is that someday our kids will say the same thing! Set a new precedent by not trying to control all that they do but rather showing them how to be faithful by living generous,

compassionate lives. They will undoubtedly do as you do, and we will all be the better for it.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Deuteronomy 4:1, 5-9; Matthew 5:17-19*

THURSDAY, MARCH 15 LENTEN WEEKDAY

What was that?

Sometimes we don't know what hit us. Power comes into our lives and takes our breath away. Was this mighty attraction we just felt a good thing or a bad thing? Was that charismatic speaker who cast a spell over us an evil genius or a saint? It all depends on which direction the demons are headed, according to Jesus. The spirit of holiness is a liberating power, and the spirit of darkness binds us tighter to itself. Check your freedom. The freer you are, the closer you are to a holy Spirit.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Jeremiah 7:23-28; Luke 11:14-23*

FRIDAY, MARCH 16 LENTEN WEEKDAY

Good neighbors

When Jesus is asked by a scribe to name the single most important commandment, he answers by citing not one, but two commandments—to love God, and to love neighbor as oneself. The scribe agrees with the answer. All this might seem a bit odd to us—wasn't Jesus supposed to pick one commandment, not two? Perhaps the message here is that we can't really separate these two commandments from one another—they come as a unit. It is impossible to "love God with all your heart" if you do not "love your neighbor as yourself"—and vice versa. God is in our neighbor—yes, even in the noisy one who plays loud music late at night. Do your best to live up to the greatest commandment. Love God with all your heart—it's the neighborly thing to do.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Hosea 14:2-10; Mark 12:28-34*

"There is no commandment greater than these."

SATURDAY, MARCH 17 LENTEN WEEKDAY; ST. PATRICK'S DAY

The steps are right; the answer is wrong

A student in a mathematics course made three pages of intense calculations to solve a difficult problem. But although she got all the steps toward the solution correct and in order, the final sum was still wrong! It was a simple question of arithmetic: She had added the first two numbers incorrectly. We see the same problem with the Pharisee who prays, fasts, and gives alms—the perfect Lenten observance, we might say! Yes, but he got the first step wrong: He started by judging his neighbor. Better to follow the example of Saint Patrick: He began by forgiving his enemy, and grace flowed freely from there.

Today's Gospel is about Peter, James and John seeing their friend and master teacher transfigured before their eyes. Despite their incredible experience with Jesus, they stumble in faith, just like we do. They get confused and afraid. We, too, sometimes fail to hold in our hearts the awareness of how much God loves us. Lent reminds us of this unending, ever forgiving love God has for each of us.

As we begin this third week of Lent, may our prayer, fasting and almsgiving transfigure and change our hearts as we embrace the challenge of following Jesus.

PRAYER

+ In your prayer – consider:

- Jesus' love for the outcast
Who are the outcasts in your life?
- His care for the poor
How do you share with the poor?
- His concern for the sick
Do you share the gift of time with the ill or elderly?
- His daily journeying with his companions
How does your faith make a difference in your family, in your workplace?
- Pray the rosary or say a decade a day for world peace
- Begin your day 5-10 minutes earlier to ask God to bless the day

FASTING

- + Fast from impatience on the road, standing in line, in the workplace, at home
- + Fast from a sarcastic or demeaning remark
- + Fast from complaining about school, jobs, church, family, the shortcomings of other people
- + Fast in solidarity with those who are hungry by eating a simple meal

ALMSGIVING

- + Give thanks for the blessings in your life
- + Consider getting involved in a volunteer effort that will continue beyond the Lenten season
- + Invest your energy and attention to full, conscious and active participation in the Sunday Liturgy
- + Contribute to the Food Pantry or Heifer Project



