# **FR. BOB'S UTTERINGS**

## **PALM SUNDAY**

**2007**

*As we prepare to begin Holy Week, Jesus encourages us to humbly look at ourselves and how we can often be quick to judge others. At the Last Supper, as Luke relates it, the disciples hotly debate how one of their own company could possibly betray Jesus. Thinking themselves above such gross disloyalty, they are ready to do violence to anyone who would harm their esteemed rabbi. Peter is incredulous when the Lord tells him that he has prayed for him in particular that he will not cave in to temptation. Full of bluster, the apostle swears that he will go to prison and perish at the side of Jesus. Hours later he will be brought low by having betrayed Christ three shame-drenched times. Like the disciples, we sometimes lose sight of our own weaknesses while judging those who betray, defraud or demean others. "How could he or she do such a thing?," we ask, wagging our heads like courtroom magistrates. Humility reminds us that "there but for the grace of God" we also go.*

*As we prepare to begin Holy Week, Jesus invites us to humbly serve one another. Despite daily elbow rubbing with Jesus, the disciples could be as competitive as CEOs on Wall Street. Even at their final supper with him, they vied with one another about who would be the greatest. They were like us when we need to have the air let out of our inflated egos. Jesus corrected their competitiveness by insisting that they were not to lord it over others. If they wished to be great in his eyes, they had only to be more like him who said: "I am among you as the one who serves." When we try to outdo or be superior to others, we are often building ourselves up at their expense. But that is not the way of Jesus. His way is that of the parent who encourages a child to enjoy the fellowship of sports without having to be number one. It is the way of the nursing home volunteer who regularly visits the self-pitying patients others avoid. It is the way of the parish leader who peels potatoes at the soup kitchen.*

*As we prepare to begin Holy Week, Jesus empowers us to suffer with humility and hope. When the power brokers moved against Jesus, his disciples were at first ready to defend him. Out came the sword and off went an ear. "Stop, no more of this!" Jesus insisted. His was the way of nonviolence. To consistently refuse to retaliate against our enemies requires a lifetime of prayer and practice. Adversity reveals the worth of a humble person who suffers with grace. Humility will not spare us from the crushing blows of disaster, depression, sickness or loss. But it will empower us to become more like Jesus whose love compelled him to ride on into Jerusalem. It will strengthen our efforts to be peaceful, compassionate and certain of our share in his resurrection.*

*On this Palm Sunday, we begin our journey into Jerusalem embracing the challenge of our conversion. We walk through Holy Week with Jesus to the cross that will lead us to Paschal Mystery and the glory of the Resurrection. We are once again reminded of the price of our salvation given to us freely out of LOVE. May we begin Holy Week converted in the Lord and committed to our call to discipleship.*

### **PALM SUNDAY OF THE LORD'S PASSION**

#### **The tears of faithfulness**

Parents of every generation weep for their children. Their weeping is an acknowledgement of their helplessness. Yet it must also serve as a sign of hopefulness. Our role as parents and mentors to young people is not to spend our lives fretting about all the terrible things that may befall them. Rather we are to be an example of faithfulness. Following God's Word won't spare any of us from the trials of this life, just as Jesus wasn't spared torture and death. But it will place us on the path of salvation. It will keep us confident and compassionate in a world that often seems unredeemable. It will enable us to find immense joy amid even our deepest sorrows.

*"Daughters of Jerusalem, do not weep for me, but weep for yourselves and for your children."*

### **MONDAY, APRIL 2**

#### **MONDAY OF HOLY WEEK; PASSOVER BEGINS AT SUNSET**

#### **Looking too good**

Talk about "life-threatening": Sometimes vitality itself is the threat! Such was the case with Lazarus, who was looking mighty good for a dead man after Jesus called him out of the tomb. So the religious authorities put Lazarus on their hit list along with Jesus. Next time, Lazarus might stay dead; however, nobody reckoned on Jesus. Although you'll never see the bumper sticker announcing it, resurrection "happens," too. Our new life in Christ should be highly visible—not to mention equally threatening to those who prefer God-inspired troublemakers quiet and lifeless.

### **TUESDAY, APRIL 3**

#### **TUESDAY OF HOLY WEEK**

#### **Looking for Jesus**

Who looks for Jesus? People who are suffering, mostly. The sick, outcasts, and sinners are always running after Jesus, hoping for relief from their pain. So when the Greeks start looking for Jesus, we know something's changed. These folks are doing well—they're just in town for the Passover festival. The only reason such folks could want Jesus is as Jesus predicts: God's saving plan gathers momentum when the outside world is onto the gospel. We, too, normally seek Jesus when things are going wrong. But salvation is often closer when need is not all that compels us.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Isaiah 49:1-6; John 13:21-33, 36-38*

*"The Greeks came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and said, 'Sir, we wish to see Jesus.'"*

### **WEDNESDAY, APRIL 4**

#### **WEDNESDAY OF HOLY WEEK**

#### **Crime pays?**

When we read the daily headlines, we might get the impression that crime definitely pays. Ruthless people make it to the top of their professions. Drug lords drive enviable cars and drip diamonds. White-collar criminals live in multiple mansions. Things often look pretty good for pretty bad folks. Even Judas got paid handsomely for his betrayal: 30 pieces of silver for one little kiss. But Judas got more than a bag of silver. He got the anguish of watching his friend suffer for his decision and the burden of self-loathing. Money couldn't buy him free of that.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Isaiah 50:4-9a; Matthew 26:14-25*

*"Judas Iscariot went to the chief priest and said, 'What will you give me if I betray him to you?'"*

### **THURSDAY, APRIL 5**

#### **HOLY THURSDAY; EVENING MASS OF THE LORD'S SUPPER**

#### **Leadership begins here**

The story of the Last Supper in John's gospel does not include the part about the bread and wine. Instead there is the foot washing story. For John, then, foot washing and the Eucharist are the same thing. They mean simply that if God forgives our sins, a forgiveness that is made real and present to us in the Eucharist, then we ought to forgive one another's sins in order to be eucharistic people. When we adore the Blessed Sacrament on this beginning of the holy Triduum, we might reflect on our part in making Christ really present to the world by continuing his ministry of forgiveness.

### **FRIDAY, APRIL 6**

#### **GOOD FRIDAY OF THE LORD'S PASSION**

#### **The end of hate**

At the risk of sounding cynical, it's pretty easy to look around and conclude that one of the things human beings do best is inflict suffering on one another. In ways big and small, people look to their own interests at the expense of others. Christ's Passion draws attention to suffering, both what he endured because a group of leaders put their own power and security ahead of everything else, and what people have endured ever since for similar reasons.

Yet Christ gathers up all suffering and death in his own. The Passion and Resurrection of Jesus forever ended meaningless suffering and death. All sacrifice, all loss, even—and especially—of the innocent now has ultimate value because Christ offered himself for sacrifice and rose again. You can participate in this redeeming sacrifice by stopping the cycle of violence with yourself.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Isaiah 52:13-53:12; Hebrews 4:14-16, 5:7-9; John 18:1-19:42*

*"When you make his life an offering for sin . . . through him the will of the Lord shall prosper."*

### **SATURDAY, APRIL 7**

#### **HOLY SATURDAY; EASTER VIGIL**

#### **Roll away the stone!**

Through Christ's resurrection our very bodiliness has been raised. For the resurrection, we both anticipate and celebrate. Not only do we look outward to a risen body of our God, but also upon our very own bodies, now brought out of death. Pope Benedict XVI, in his 2006 Easter Vigil address, emphasized this point: "His resurrection becomes our resurrection, through Baptism which 'incorporates' us into him." It is fitting, then, that on the day we rejoice over the risen body, the church takes new members into this very same Body through Baptism. During the Easter Vigil, focus on the physical movements of the liturgy as a celebration of Christ's resurrection.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Genesis 1:1-2:2; Genesis 22:1-18; Exodus 14:15-15:1; Isaiah 54:5-14; Isaiah 55:1-11; Baruch 3:9-15, 32-4:4; Ezekiel 36:16-17a, 18-28; Romans 6:3-11; Luke 24:1-12*

**The Sacred Triduum**
