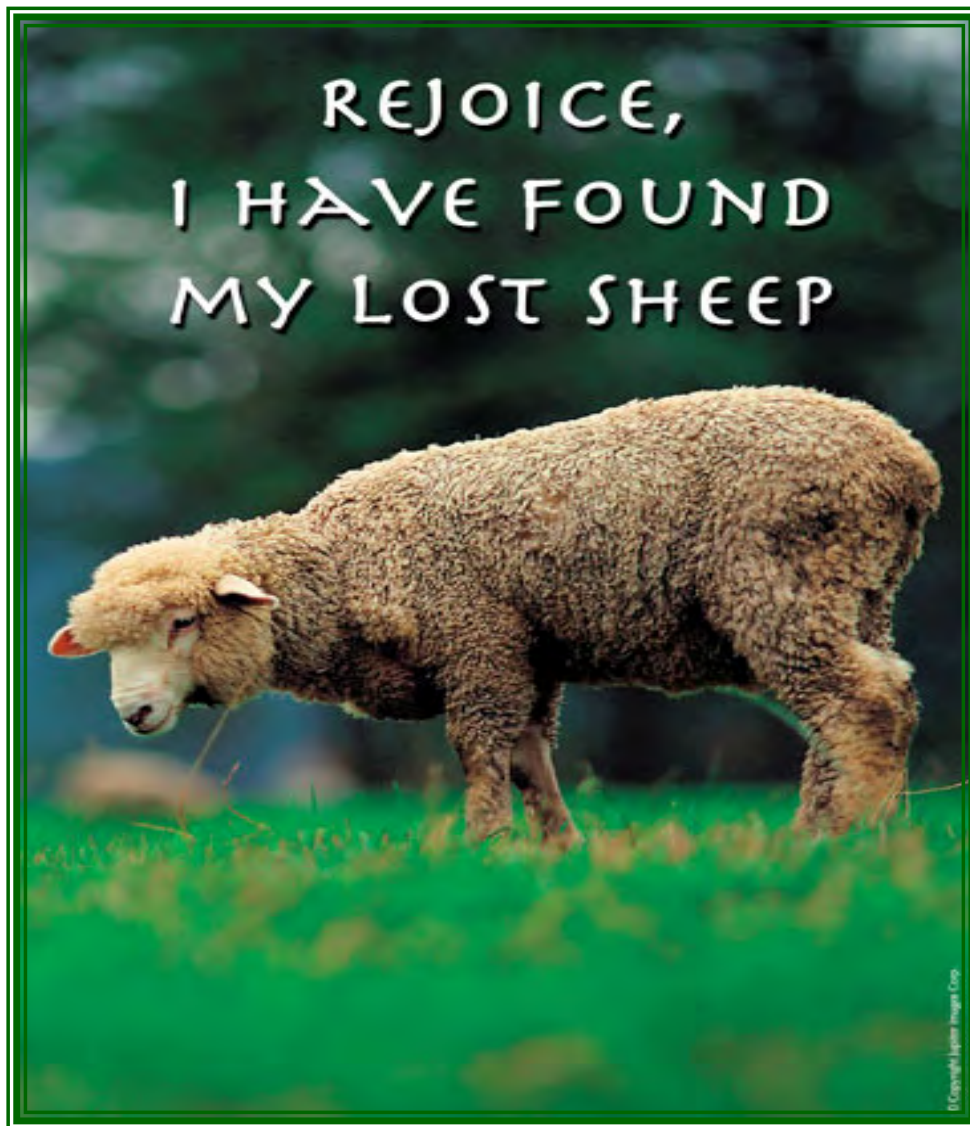

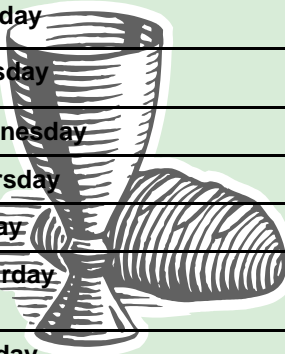

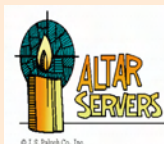

Catechism of the Catholic Church

(Dignity of the Human Person)

Man the Image of God

- **358. WHAT IS THE ROOT OF HUMAN DIGNITY?**

The dignity of the human person is rooted in his or her creation in the image and likeness of God. Endowed with a spiritual and immortal soul, intelligence and free will, the human person is ordered to God and called in soul and in body to eternal beatitude.

Our Vocation to Beatitude

- **359. HOW DO WE ATTAIN BEATITUDE?**

We attain beatitude by virtue of the grace of Christ which makes us participants in the divine life. Christ in the Gospel points out to his followers the way that leads to eternal happiness: the beatitudes. The grace of Christ also is operative in every person who, following a correct conscience, seeks and loves the true and the good and avoids evil.

- **360. WHY ARE THE BEATITUDES IMPORTANT FOR US?**

The beatitudes are at the heart of Jesus' preaching and they take up and fulfill the promises that God made starting with Abraham. They depict the very countenance of Jesus and they characterize authentic Christian life. They reveal the ultimate goal of human activity, which is eternal happiness.

- **361. WHAT IS THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE BEATITUDES AND OUR DESIRE FOR HAPPINESS?**

The beatitudes respond to the innate desire for happiness that God has placed in the human heart in order to draw us to himself. God alone can satisfy this desire.

- **362. WHAT IS ETERNAL HAPPINESS?**

It is the vision of God in eternal life in which we are fully "partakers of the divine nature" (2 Peter 1:4) of the glory of Christ and of the joy of the Trinitarian life. This happiness surpasses human capabilities. It is a supernatural and gratuitous gift of God just as is the grace which leads to it. This promised happiness confronts us with decisive moral choices concerning earthly goods and urges us to love God above all things.

SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 16, 2007

TWENTY-FOURTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME—Lost causes

Today we read three famous parables of things lost and found: a sheep, a coin, and a son. What these three stories have in common is a certain attitude toward the inevitable troubles of life. Sheep and children sometimes wander off. Valuables get lost. We do well when we accept this fact of life, when we don't lose our cool but instead act decisively to make things right again. The shepherd goes off to find his sheep, the woman searches diligently for her coin, and the father actively waits for his son's return. Furthermore, none of them waste time and energy being angry once their troubles are over, but rather celebrate joyfully with their friends. What old resentment am I holding onto today?

TODAY'S READINGS: *Exodus 32:7-11, 13-14; 1 Timothy 1:12-17; Luke 15:1-32*

"The woman calls together her friends, saying, 'Rejoice with me, for I have found the coin I had lost.'"

MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 17

FEAST OF ROBERT BELLARMINI, BISHOP, DOCTOR

The lowly and the mighty

Saint Robert Bellarmine, the Italian Jesuit, cardinal, and doctor of the church (1542-1621), served as both a theologian and bishop at a critical time in church history, the aftermath of the Protestant Reformation. His book responding to the positions of the Reformers was so good some thought it had to be the work of more than one person. Yet he was moderate with his opponents, prayed for them, and went out of his way to fairly represent their arguments. As a bishop, when others in his position lived like royalty, he kept his lifestyle simple and gave away items from the bishop's residence. Though powerful, Saint Robert did not fall back on throwing his weight around to get things done. Rather, he relied on knowledge and generosity. Would that all of us in the church do the same.

TODAY'S READINGS: *1 Timothy 2:1-8; Luke 7:1-10*

"I desire, then, that in every place the men should pray, lifting up holy hands without anger or argument."

TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 18—

No suffering is anonymous

Of the three accounts of Jesus raising the dead, that of the widow's son in Nain is easily the least known. However, the story reveals a depth to Christ's compassion that the better known resurrections of Lazarus and Jairus' son might not. The widow's son was not a dear friend of Jesus (as was Lazarus) nor a prominent community figure (as was Jairus). The widow of Nain was a stranger to Jesus and did not even make a request for Jesus' help. But Christ came upon her suffering and felt the compassion to raise her son. This action reflects back to the Old Testament prescription to care for the most vulnerable, the widows and orphans. But it also prefigures when Christ himself on the cross will leave his own mother a childless widow and compassionately entrust her to John. How do we care for the vulnerable in our society?

TODAY'S READINGS: *1 Timothy 3:1-13; Luke 7:11-17*

"The dead man sat up and began to speak, and Jesus gave him to his mother."

WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER 19 - Eyes wide open

You want more faith, right? Like the apostles who said to Jesus, "Increase our faith," you may even pray for more. In a way, though, greater faith is right in front of your eyes. Among other things, faith is a way of seeing. If you look at things with the eyes of faith, you will see things you could not have seen before. If you really open yourself to Jesus and his message, and to God whom Jesus shows us, you will notice a real difference that shows you are on the right path.

TODAY'S READINGS: *1 Timothy 3:14-16; Luke 7:31-35*

"Wisdom is vindicated by all her children."

THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 20— Love the sinner

Jesus makes a strong connection between forgiveness and love. We can imagine how forgiveness can lead to love, but the connection works in both directions—love also leads to forgiveness. The woman who anointed Jesus' feet with expensive ointment and her own tears had made her share of mistakes in life. But her sincere heart and generosity toward Jesus earned her forgiveness, in contrast to the stingy Pharisees who offered Jesus little other than their own self-righteousness. The bottom line: Love greatly, and much can be forgiven. Be stingy in love, and the portion of forgiveness granted you will be equally meager.

TODAY'S READINGS: *1 Timothy 4:12-16; Luke 7:36-50*

"But the one to whom little is forgiven, loves little."

FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 21

FEAST OF MATTHEW, APOSTLE, EVANGELIST

Qualifications may vary

Generalizations are easy to make and are generally just as wrong. We tend to lump the apostles together as "fishers." Only Peter and Andrew, James and John fit that description. Matthew collected tolls for the Empire—including the tax for taking fish to market, which did not endear him to his future companions. Simon was a political agitator. Judas "Iscaiot" was likely from Kerioth—not on the water—or perhaps one of the Sicarii, a group of politically motivated bandits. The rest of the Twelve may have had day jobs, but we know little about what they did. Jesus found room for them all at his table.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Ephesians 4:1-7, 11-13; Matthew 9:9-13*

"Those who are well have no need of a physician, but those who are sick."

SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 22- Do you want to know a secret?

Gnosis is a Greek term that can be defined as "knowledge of spiritual mysteries." It is the root of the word *gnosticism*, which refers to various near-eastern religious groups that flourished in the early Christian era and claimed to have secret or supernatural knowledge, and who for a time enjoyed considerable standing in the Christian community. Saint Augustine was a member of a gnostic sect in his early years, though later he repudiated the movement. The wider Christian tradition has always affirmed that there can be no "secret society" or "secret knowledge" required for salvation. All who call upon the Lord can be saved, and the Christian tradition at its best has always affirmed this universalism.

TODAY'S READINGS: *1 Timothy 6:13-16; Luke 8:4-15*

"To you it has been given to know the secrets of the kingdom of God."

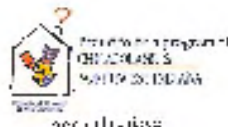
