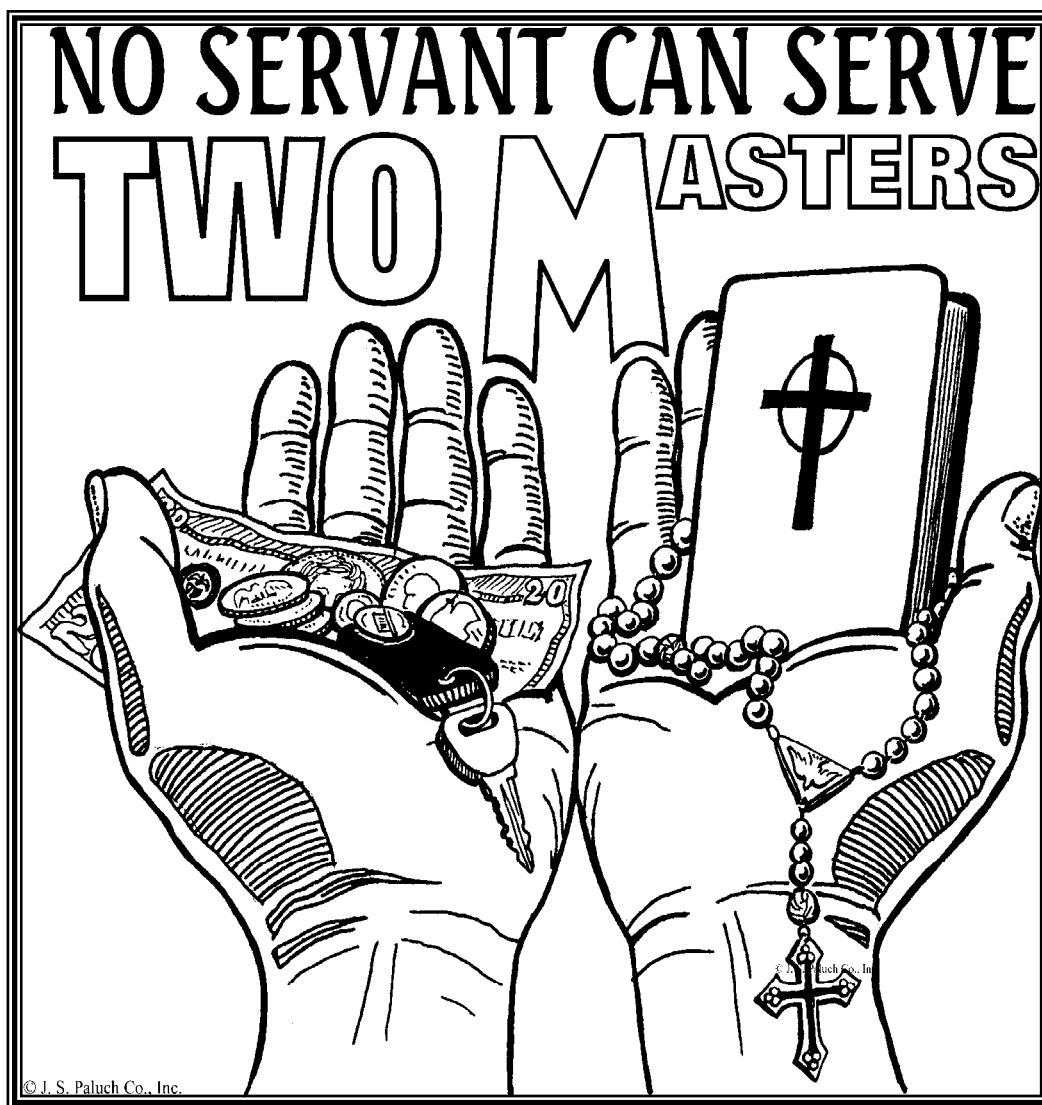

FR. BOB'S UTTERINGS

25th Sunday in Ordinary Time

True Wealth

Our society may be materially rich, but it is spiritually poor in many ways. Even so God “wills everyone to be saved, and to come to the knowledge of the truth” (1 Tim 2:4). Part of that “truth” is that when we have less room in our hearts for self, we have more room for God and others, more spiritual resources to share with others. Our “true wealth,” our salvation in Christ, is not something we earn by our own efforts, but rather is the free, generous gift of God. Our true fame and fortune are not from this world, but are God’s spiritual gifts to us in Jesus Christ.

Compendium – Catechism of the Catholic Church Man’s Freedom

- **363. WHAT IS FREEDOM?**
Freedom is the power given by God to act or not to act, to do this or to do that, and so to perform deliberate actions are one’s own responsibility. Freedom characterizes properly human acts. The more one does what is good, the freer one becomes. Freedom attains its proper perfection when it is directed toward God, the highest good and our beatitude. Freedom implies also the possibility of choosing between good and evil. The choice of evil is an abuse of freedom and leads to the slavery of sin.
- **364. WHAT IS THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN FREEDOM AND RESPONSIBILITY?**
Freedom makes people responsible for their actions to the extent that they are voluntary, even if the imputability and responsibility for an action can be diminished or sometimes cancelled by ignorance, inadvertence, duress, fear, inordinate attachments, or habit.
- **365. WHY DOES EVERYONE HAVE A RIGHT TO EXERCISE FREEDOM?**
The right to the exercise of freedom belongs to everyone because it is inseparable from his or her dignity as a human person. Therefore this right must always be respected, especially in moral and religious matters, and it must be recognized and protected by civil authority within the limits of the common good and a just public order.
- **366. WHAT PLACE DOES HUMAN FREEDOM HAVE IN THE PLAN OF SALVATION?**
Our freedom is weakened because of original sin. This weakness is intensified because of successive sins. Christ, however, set us free “so that we should remain free” (Galatians 5:1). With his grace, the Holy Spirit leads us to spiritual freedom to make us free co-workers with him in the Church and in the world.
- **367. WHAT ARE THE SOURCES OF THE MORALITY OF HUMAN ACTS?**
The morality of human acts depends on three sources: THE OBJECT CHOSEN, either a true or apparent good; THE INTENTION of the subject who acts, that is the purpose for which the subject performs the act; and THE CIRCUMSTANCES of the act, which include its consequences.
- **368. WHEN IS AN ACT MORALLY GOOD?**
An act is morally good when it assumes simultaneously the goodness of the object, of the end, and of the circumstances. A chosen object can by itself vitiate an act in its entirety, even if the intention is good. It is not licit to do evil that good may result from it. An evil end corrupts the action, even if the object is good in itself. On the other hand, a good end does not make an act good if the object of that act is evil, since the end does not justify the means. Circumstances can increase or diminish the responsibility of the one who is acting but they cannot change the moral quality of the acts themselves. They never make good an act which is in itself evil.
- **369. ARE THERE ACTS WHICH ARE ALWAYS ILLICIT?**
There are some acts which, in and of themselves, are always illicit by reason of their object (for example, blasphemy, homicide, adultery). Choosing such acts entails a disorder of the will, that is, a moral evil which can never be justified by appealing to the good effects which could possibly result from them.

SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 23, 2007

TWENTY-FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME; AUTUMNAL EQUINOX - **Be sly as serpents, innocent as doves**

At the autumnal equinox, equal light and dark may be an entry into a saying of Jesus that is hard to take. Why does Jesus seem to praise the darkness of dishonesty? Bible scholars debate the point, but Jesus' own explanation seems clear: Human creativity and shrewdness must be used to promote the kingdom with the same energy we use to line our own pockets or ensure our security. Just as we cannot depend only on some ambiguous "they" to "do something" about the problems of life, so also the kingdom of God and the defeat of darkness need our greatest talents and gifts.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Amos 8:4-7; 1 Timothy 2:1-8; Luke 16:1-13*

"The children of this age are more shrewd in dealing with their own generation than are the children of light."

MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 24 - **The light of the world**

In her *Revelations of Divine Love*, 14th-century mystic Julian of Norwich describes how she came to understand that God is light, "our endless Day." Seven centuries later, physicist Bernard Haisch came to the same understanding: "The solid, stable world of matter appears to be sustained at every instant by an underlying sea of quantum light," which Haisch concludes gives "Let there be light" profound meaning and a clue to the nature of God and the mysteries of the universe. The light that shines within you is God. Let others see that light in everything you do.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Ezra 1:1-6; Luke 8:16-18*

TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 25 - **Breaking away**

"Sisters, sisters," an Irving Berlin song from the movie *White Christmas* celebrates devoted sisterhood, but ends, "And Lord help the sister / Who comes between me and my man." Even in a sentimental musical, we acknowledge that there are times when family bonds give way to greater values. So Jesus' insistence that he and the reign of God come before all else is not so outrageous as it may seem. As the biblical scholar William Barclay wrote, one must live as though nothing matters more than the kingdom of God, because nothing does.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Ezra 6:7-8, 12b, 14-20; Luke 8:19-21*

"My mother and my brothers are those who hear the Word of God and do it."

WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER 26 -

When bad things don't just happen

It can be surprising to read how the Bible sometimes explains things like war and sickness. If God's people suffered defeat at the hands of some invading army, it was because God was punishing them for their sins. If someone were sick, it must have been because they had done something wrong or were possessed by a demon.

In our age we tend to avoid seeing God as one who deals out violent punishment, or illness as the work of an evil spirit or the product of our misdeeds. But perhaps the biblical writers can point out for us today how suffering is a kind of disorder or disease, whether of our physical or moral health. And in every case we can go to Jesus, the divine physician, for healing in body and soul.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Ezra 9:5-9; Luke 9:1-6*

"Jesus called the twelve together and . . . sent them out to proclaim the kingdom of God and to heal."

THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 27

FEAST OF VINCENT DE PAUL, PRIEST

We can never run out of ways to help

Saint Vincent de Paul (1580-1660) believed that "charity is infinitely inventive." Guided by that belief, the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, founded in Vincent's honor, offers nearly 12 million people a year "tangible assistance to those in need on a person-to-person basis," according to its mission statement. This aid takes many forms, including intervention, consultation, or direct donations of goods and services. The Society is committed to maintaining the confidentiality and dignity of those it serves and often assumes a role of advocacy for those with little political voice. Help the poor be seen and heard by assisting the Vincentians in their work.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Haggai 1:1-8; Luke 9:7-9*

"Herod said, 'John I beheaded; but who is this about whom I hear such things?'"

FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 28 - **Bless this mess**

When you look around and see things in disarray—the world situation, politics, your town or city, the church, your family, your personal life—remember that God's people have gone through similar experiences before. Imagine what it was like for ancient Israelites, their land occupied, their temple destroyed, most of them in exile. Yet God through the prophets promises them that all will be restored; God's Spirit has not abandoned them. The Spirit is the abiding presence of God. It is always available, always with you, always there to turn to, no matter what else is going on, or going wrong.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Haggai 2:1-9; Luke 9:18-22*

"My spirit abides among you; do not fear."

SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 29

FEAST OF MICHAEL, GABRIEL, AND RAPHAEL, ARCHANGELS **Heaven help us**

In an interview about her book *A Catalogue of Angels*, author Vinita Hampton Wright offers this explanation for our continued interest in angels: "We carry within us a deep, intuitive sense that we are not alone in the universe. One of our oldest Christian creeds speaks of God as being the creator of things 'seen and unseen.' So since the early centuries of Christianity, our spiritual leaders, teachers, and mystics have acknowledged that there are realms of existence we barely perceive, let alone understand. In faith systems all over the planet there has persisted this image of otherworldly beings who come to our aid who are more spirit than we are." Pray for some heavenly aid today.
