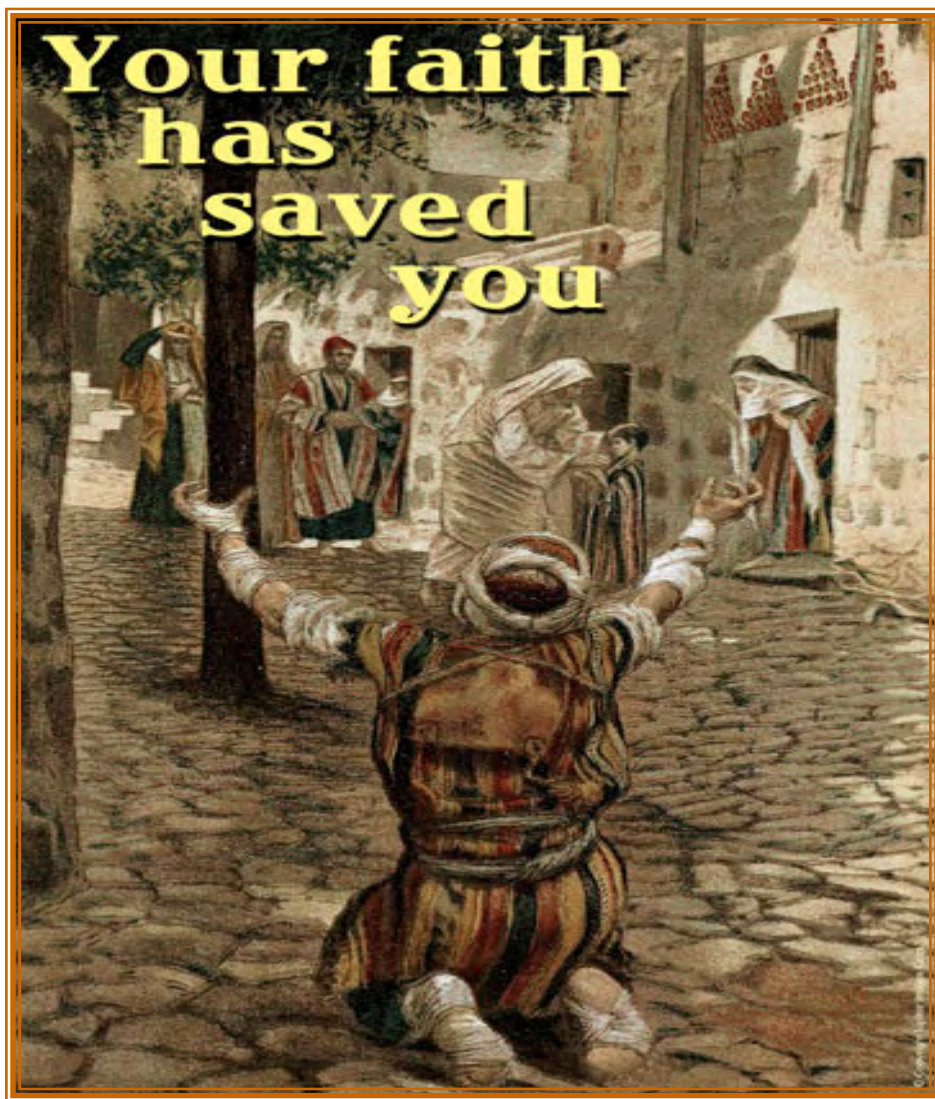

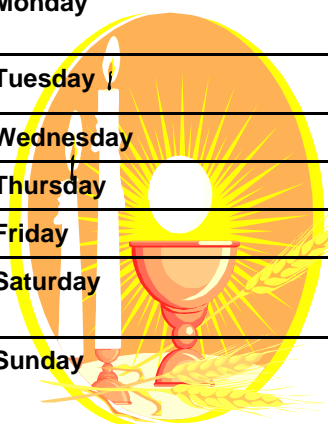

SUNDAY, OCTOBER 14, 2007

TWENTY-EIGHTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME- A thousand thanks!

If you became aware that you've suddenly been healed of a deadly disease, would you go back to thank the doc who cured you? Probably. But miracles are often less dramatic. Your parents, for example, may have (probably literally and certainly figuratively) saved your life many times. Day-to-day compassion and forgiveness in a spouse or friend can mass into a mountain of taken-for-granted love—always just there. How can you possibly and adequately say thank you? The best response is to accept and cherish what's given—to remember where it came from, to show those who give you life that their care has rubbed off, turning you into a mountain of love for someone else.

TODAY'S READINGS: 2 Kings 5:14-17; 2 Timothy 2:8-13; Luke 17:11-19
"Were not ten made clean? But the other nine, where are they? Was none found to return and give praise except this foreigner?"

MONDAY, OCTOBER 15- FEAST OF TERESA OF JESUS, VIRGIN, DOCTOR Honorary doctorates

We tend to think of doctors as people with waiting rooms and occasionally cold hands. But there are church versions of doctors, too. Since the 13th century the church has been recognizing doctors of the church as exceptional and reliable teachers of the faith—the root meaning of *doctor* is teacher. But until recently, no women had made the list. Popes Paul VI and John Paul II changed that, when the former named today's saint, the Spanish Carmelite sister Teresa of Avila, and Catherine of Siena doctors of the church in 1970, and the latter named Thérèse of Lisieux a doctor in 1997. Both were bold moves and signs for a new generation of the church. Your library will probably have biographies and collections of writings of these eminent women, and the internet definitely will. Make an appointment with these doctors today!

"For just as Jonah became a sign to the people of Nineveh, so the Son of Man will be to this generation."

TUESDAY, OCTOBER 16

FEAST OF HEDWIG, MARRIED WOMAN - Well, I'm no saint

We might think of saints as aliens: distant other-worldlies, experiencing visions and working miracles. We might think, "Well, some monastic celibates can be saints, but the rest of us just schlep through the world." But this is not what the church tells us. Saint Hedwig (1174-1243) shows us that each one of us, no matter how burdened with worldly matters, is called to sainthood. Wife to Henry I of Silesia, Hedwig experienced no great visions and worked no great miracles but took on the responsibilities of her public role with a love of Christ and proved a great champion of monasticism. Today, consider how you, too, were made to be a saint, to be one of whom an icon is made.

TODAY'S READINGS: Romans 1:16-25; Luke 11:37-41
"Give for alms those things that are within; and see, everything will be clean for you."

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 17 - FEAST OF IGNATIUS OF ANTIOCH, BISHOP, MARTYR - God is met in love

The lights are on but nobody's home. That's how the gospel describes people who put on the appearance of faith but don't really practice it. It's not hard to do. We can go to church every Sunday and drop our envelope in the basket but never give the

plight of the world's poor a second thought. Ignatius of Antioch (c. 35-c. 107) wrote that "faith is the beginning and love is the end; and the union of the two is God." When we express our faith through acts of love for the poor and lowly of the world, we have a direct encounter with God.

TODAY'S READINGS: Romans 2:1-11; Luke 11:42-46

"Woe to you Pharisees! For you love to have the seat of honor . . . and to be greeted with respect in the marketplaces."

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 18 - FEAST OF LUKE, EVANGELIST

Stories to live by

Luke's Jesus tells some of the best stories in the gospels. Only Luke records the Prodigal Son, for example. What a loss if we did not have that unforgettable model of forgiveness. Even more remarkable is Luke's purposeful memory of the women disciples of Jesus, remembered by name for their love of and care for the missionary Jesus. One of Luke's stories combines both these emphases, the story of the anonymous woman (not Mary Magdalen), known to be unclean by Jewish law, who washes Jesus' feet with her tears and wipes them with her uncovered hair. We remember her because Jesus points not to her bad reputation but to "her great love. Little is forgiven those whose love is small." Remember Luke's Lord today by loving and forgiving large.

TODAY'S READINGS: 2 Timothy 4:10-17b; Luke 10:1-9

"Say to them, 'The kingdom of God has come near to you.'"

FRIDAY, OCTOBER 19

FEAST OF JOHN DE BRÉBEUF AND ISAAC JOGUES, PRIESTS, MARTYRS, AND COMPANIONS, MARTYRS - Worth the effort

Saints Isaac Jogues and John de Brébeuf were among a group of Jesuit missionaries who tried to evangelize Native Canadians in what is now Ontario and upstate New York. They suffered martyrdom between 1642 and 1649, frequently after horrible torture. Between missionary journeys, Jogues returned to France to recuperate. He was so altered by his experience that his own brother did not recognize him and, hearing he had come from New France, asked if he had met his brother Isaac! Given the option to stay in France and teach, Jogues decided to go back to the New World, where this time he was killed. Things do not always turn out the way you might have hoped. But determination and endurance can make an effort worthwhile. How you do things can be as important as what you might achieve.

TODAY'S READINGS: Romans 4:1-8; Luke 12:1-7

"Do not fear those who kill the body, and can do nothing more. Fear him who has authority to cast into hell."

SATURDAY, OCTOBER 20 - FEAST OF PAUL OF THE CROSS, PRIEST The Spirit supplies the words

Don't you hate it when you think of something really smart you should've said at the meeting when you're in the car on the way home? It won't be that way when you defend your faith. The Holy Spirit will give you what you need to say the moment you need to say it. The question is: Will you ever step up to defend your faith? Saint Paul of the Cross (1694-1775) spent his entire life doing just that and was given words that transformed the lives of many people. When we choose to endure the shame of the cross, many wonderful things come our way.

TODAY'S READINGS: Romans 4:13, 16-18; Luke 12:8-12

"When they bring you before the authorities, the Holy Spirit will teach you at that very hour what you ought to say."

SOCIAL CONCERNS

THANK YOU, parishioners and friends, for your donations to our October food distribution. Now it's time to begin replenishing our shelves for the November Food Pantry! Here are some reminders:

- ◆ All non-perishables are greatly appreciated. We are low on most of our staple items, including cereal, rice, dry pinto beans, peanut butter, jelly, soup, meals in a can or box, pasta, pasta sauce, canned fruits, canned vegetables, tuna, and macaroni & cheese.
- ◆ Each month we have a "specials table" where we have extra items from which our clients choose a couple of things. Some favorites include coffee, oatmeal, juice or soft drinks, crackers, side dishes, baby food, diapers, toiletries, cleaning supplies, laundry detergent, and dish washing soap. (If available, one of these extra items is also put in each pre-packed family bag.)
- ◆ Check expiration dates to avoid out-of-date goods that we cannot use.
- ◆ These items can be dropped off in the Church vestibule in the designated food bins located in the Madonna della Strada shrine area.
- ◆ We can also use large brown grocery bags, since we double bag the groceries we distribute each month. Please drop those off in the food bins.
- ◆ The Food Pantry distributes groceries from the vestibule of the Church on the second Thursday of each month, from 6:30-8:00 PM. Our next distribution is on November 8.
- ◆ Please continue to make it a routine to pick up some items for the Food Pantry when you do your weekly grocery shopping.
