NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time

“Avoid making presumptuous judgments about others; judging is a dangerous thing to do.”

When the Pharisee became distracted and spotted the tax collector during his prayers, he judged him. He looked down on him and despised him. Like a peacock, he preened himself and rejoiced in his good deeds. The Pharisee is presented as being self-righteous, not in need of God. He justifies himself before God. In contrast the tax collector knows that he needs God's forgiveness. What does that say about tax collectors in Jesus' time? Often tax collectors in Palestine were men who demanded money from others by extortion. They demanded money beyond what was due in tax and kept the extra fee for themselves. Were all tax collectors like this? Probably not, it is always dangerous to make generalizations.

Luke uses the story of the tax collector and the Pharisee to emphasize God's compassion and mercy and warn against self-righteousness. The example of the repentant tax collector is a reminder that no sin is beyond the forgiveness of God. What are required are repentance and the request for forgiveness. The image of God portrayed in the readings is one of a God who listens carefully to the voice of the sinner, the poor, and the vulnerable people in society.

Many older people will remember preachers speaking about the sin of presumption. It referred to presumption about knowledge of one's relationship with God. While I can trust in the mercy of God, I can never fully know how I stand before God. The Pharisee not only suffers from the sin of presumption but then makes a presumptuous judgment about the life of the tax collector. It is much easier to judge others than oneself. I remember a comment after a homily on the need for conversion; “THEY needed to hear that Father!” While it is necessary to judge certain actions as right or wrong, it is presumptuous to judge how a person stands before God. There are always facts about a person's situation and life which are private. The story that Jesus told about removing the plank from your own eye rather than dealing with the speck in others' eyes is a warning about this sort of behavior. Like the tax collector we are invited to trust in God's mercy and pray for our enemies.

SUNDAY, OCTOBER 28, 2007

THIRTIETH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME; PRIESTHOOD SUNDAY Proclaiming the good news

No priest is alike, yet all are commissioned to be a sign of Christ and bring the gospel to God's people. The fact that priests come in all shapes and sizes says a lot about the breadth and depth of Christ. Christ is reflected in all those who dedicate their lives to God's mission. Faithfulness, not perfection, is all that is required. Priests remind us that our salvation, which comes through Christ, isn't out there somewhere but right here standing at our sides, accompanying us on our journey. Offer priests strength and encouragement in their roles as you hope they will offer you in yours.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Sirach 35:12-14, 16-18; 2 Timothy 4:6-8, 16-18; Luke 18:9-14*

"The Lord stood by me and gave me strength, so that through me the message might be fully proclaimed."

MONDAY, OCTOBER 29- Praise happens

Stop to notice the content of your prayers. According to the early Christian thinker Origen, the noblest form of prayer we can make is praise. But so often, we find it is the one feature missing in our communication with God. We find in the gospels that praise is the song of the healthy creature—what one gives *after* healing. When you do not praise, it may mean you need to be healed. Look for ailments in your life, whether of the mind, body, or soul. Tend to your needs and ask for the healing grace of the Holy Spirit. Praise will follow.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Romans 8:12-17; Luke 13:10-17*

"When Jesus laid hands on her, immediately she stood up straight and began praising God."

TUESDAY, OCTOBER 30 - A little goes a long way

When Mother Teresa first went into the slums of Calcutta, she had little more than a patch of dirt in which to scrape the letters of the alphabet as a way of teaching children to read. Today, thousands of Missionaries of Charity, the community she founded, work around the world with the poorest of the poor. Dorothy Day started the Catholic Worker movement with only one house of hospitality. Many worthy efforts started with very little, sometimes only an idea, before growing into something great. So don't run down your own humble ideas or projects, especially if they will make people's lives better. You never know when that little seed will grow into a tree.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Romans 8:18-25; Luke 13:18-21*

"The kingdom of God . . . is like a mustard seed that someone took and sowed in the garden; it grew and became a tree."

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 31 - Trick or treat?

People aren't always as they appear. We wear different masks for different occasions. Perhaps that is why human beings revel in celebrations like Halloween where masquerading is encouraged. We are given permission to do what we do naturally: cover up our true identity. But hiding behind a mask isn't as easy as you might think. We reveal much by what we choose to hide behind. Oscar Wilde says, "Give [a person] a mask, and he will tell you the truth." As you look in the mirror each morning remember that no matter what face you put on—happy, sad, scary, angry, strong, vulnerable—the truth that should be revealed in you is love, both given and received.

THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 1

SOLEMNITY OF ALL SAINTS

Saints all around

Genesis says people are made in the image and likeness of God. The gospels say to see Jesus in one another. In other words, we are more like God than we might think. We can see God, not completely, but a lot, in human beings. That's what saints, whom the church celebrates today, do: They show us how to be close to God, how to be holy. They help us to see how God is like us and we are like God—and call us to be more like God, as they were and are. Answer that call. Imitate the saints. You can be one, too!

"What we do know is this: When God is revealed, we will be like him, for we will see him as he is."

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 2-

ALL THE FAITHFUL DEPARTED

Because I could not stop for death

For those who suffer the loss of a loved one, seeing death as a friend, as the late Cardinal Joseph Bernardin did, or as a kind and civil travel companion, as poet Emily Dickinson envisioned it, is hardly our experience. Perhaps 18th-century verse writer Theodore Chickering Williams more closely captures the reality of death from both sides of eternity: "Death is an angel with two faces:/ To us he turns/ A face of terror, blighting all things fair;/ The other burns/ With glory of the stars, and love is there." As you honor your dead today, remember: Nothing God-given is lost; wherever faithful souls go, love is there.

FEAST OF MARTIN DE PORRES, RELIGIOUS

How to move up in the world

The child of a freed slave and a Spanish nobleman, Saint Martin de Porres (1579-1639) joined the Dominicans at 15. Throughout his life he remained lowly and stayed close to the lowly, working as barber, tailor, and cook for his religious community and also caring for the poor, the sick, orphans, the African slaves of Lima, and even animals. He was the closest thing to a doctor for many, and it was said he had miraculous powers of healing—though he would conceal this ability by giving his patients a medication to "cover" the cure. His closeness to God was so intense that sometimes in prayer he would rise off the floor to the rafters—pretty good for someone who kept so close to the ground.

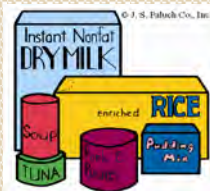


Year II Confirmation Candidates - Candidates Mass

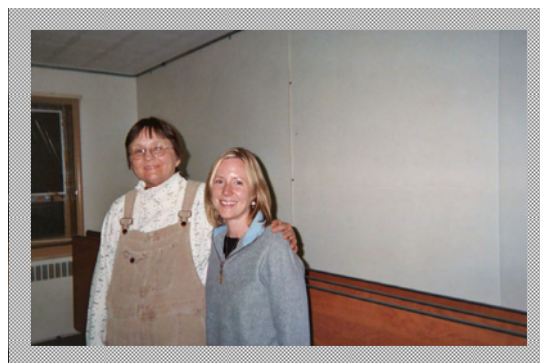


