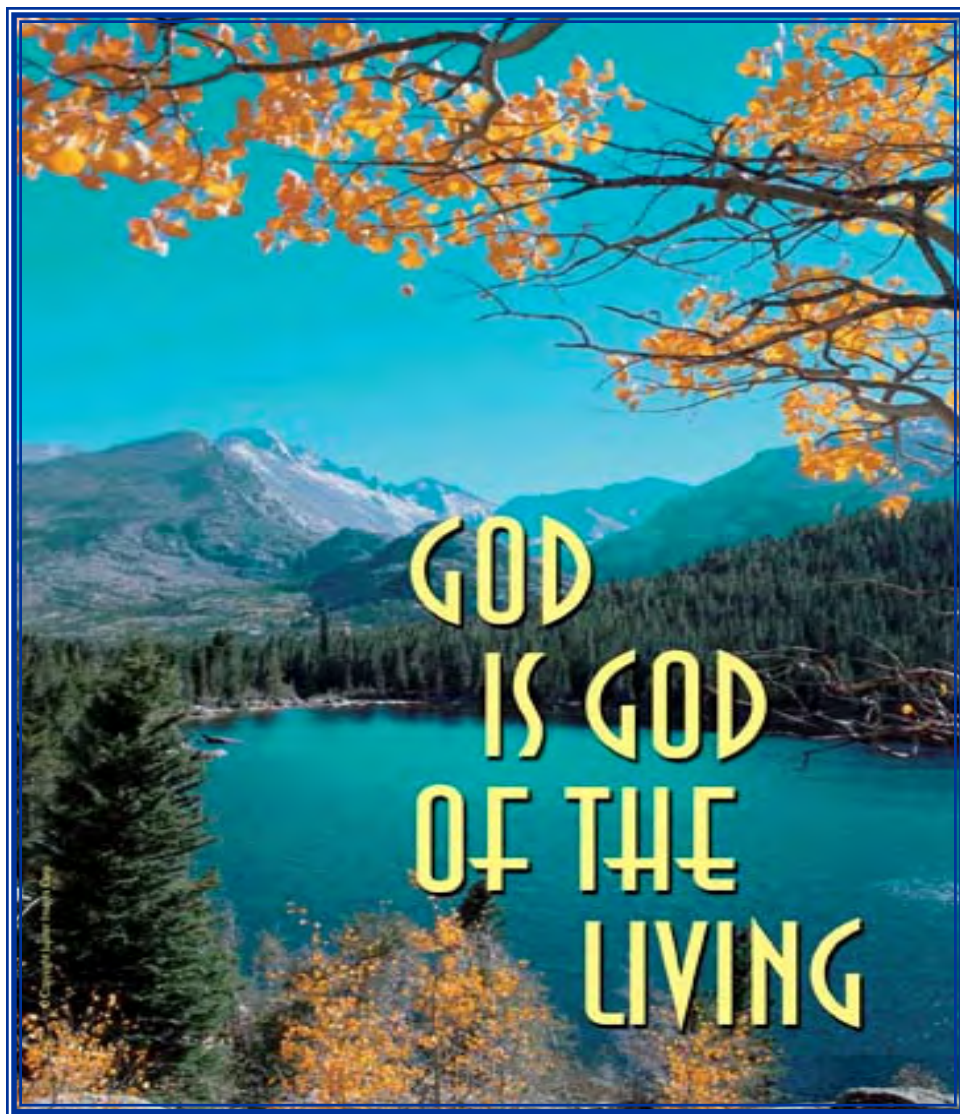

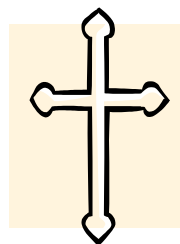

Thirty-Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

New Life in the Resurrection

The controversy in today's gospel passage demonstrates an intra-Jewish dispute that was on-going between the Pharisees and the Sadducees. One of the doctrines that the Pharisees embraced, but the Sadducees rejected, was that of the resurrection. This doctrine taught that God would give new life in the next world to those who had died. This teaching is not to be confused with a later notion of the immortality of the soul. Here the Sadducees are attempting to ridicule the doctrine of the resurrection by creating a hypothetical problem around the ancient practice of levirate marriage. This practice was an attempt to preserve a deceased man's name and memory, protect property rights, and secure the safety of the widow. The Sadducees think that, by pushing this practice to its ultimate extreme, they have shown how useless a doctrine of the resurrection is.

The argument Jesus makes is that the Sadducees have understood nothing at all about the real meaning of the doctrine of the resurrection. Resurrection is not connected with life as we know it on earth. Resurrection is a term that means a totally new kind of life that is given by God and is not subject to the principles of earthly life. The Sadducees' question is totally irrelevant because it assumes that resurrection is some kind of quantitative extension of earthly life. Resurrection life is something qualitatively different. This new kind of life makes those who receive it similar to the angels and thus they can be referred to as "the children of God." Jesus finds evidence of resurrection in the fact that Moses called God the God of the patriarchs: From a Christian perspective this passage bears witness to the teaching of the resurrection as a gift of radical new life which is bestowed only by God, thereby radically transforming those who receive it.

The Virtues

- 377. **WHAT IS A VIRTUE?**
A virtue is a habitual and firm disposition to do the good. "The goal of a virtuous life is to become like God" (Saint Gregory of Nyssa). There are human virtues and theological virtues.
- 378. **WHAT ARE THE HUMAN VIRTUES?**
The human virtues are habitual and stable perfections of the intellect and will that govern our actions, order our passions and guide our conduct according to reason and faith. They are acquired and strengthened by the repetition of morally good acts and they are purified and elevated by divine grace.
- 379. **WHAT ARE THE PRINCIPAL HUMAN VIRTUES?**
The principal human virtues are called the CARDINAL virtues, under which all the other virtues are grouped and which are the hinges of a virtuous life. The cardinal virtues are: prudence, justice, fortitude, and temperance.
- 380. **WHAT IS PRUDENCE?**
Prudence disposes reason to discern in every circumstance our true good and to choose the right means for achieving it. Prudence guides the other virtues by pointing out their rule and measure.
- 381. **WHAT IS JUSTICE?**
Justice consists in the firm and constant will to give to others their due. Justice toward God is called "the virtue of religion."
- 382. **WHAT IS FORTITUDE?**
Fortitude assures firmness in difficulties and constancy in the pursuit of the good. It reaches even to the ability of possibly sacrificing one's own life for a just cause.
- 383. **WHAT IS TEMPERANCE?**
Temperance moderates the attraction of pleasures, assures the mastery of the will over instincts and provides balance in the use of created goods.

THIRTY-SECOND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME - **Alive in God's sight**

People liked to get after Jesus with trick questions: If a woman outlives seven husbands, whose wife is she in the resurrection? Using earthbound terms to uncover eternal truths is just playing games with infinite reality. Jesus, always trying to persuade folks to give up the habit of possession, asks them to consider that dispossession is the secret to the kingdom. It's being alive in the sight of God that matters—not who gets to hold onto the little woman. Chances are that tired woman, seven husbands later, would appreciate some time alone!

MONDAY, NOVEMBER 12- FEAST OF JOSAPHAT, BISHOP, MARTYR Those "onion-capped" churches

Josaphat, a 17th-century bishop, dedicated his life to bringing together the Ukrainian and Roman churches, a reminder of how much remains undone some 400 years later and nearly 50 years since our last ecumenical council. We remember today our catholicism, our universalness, because the Eastern Catholic communities, as Father Richard McBrien points out, are "distinct churches, not just 'rites.'" In our Western view, the rituals of the Eastern Churches may seem exotic and mysterious, but we are drawn to brothers and sisters not because of the splendor or beauty of their liturgy but because of our oneness in Christ, something Josaphat deemed worth dying for.

TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 13

FEAST OF FRANCES XAVIER CABRINI, VIRGIN

-A woman on a mission

The Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart, the religious institute founded by Frances Cabrini (1850-1917 and the first U.S. citizen saint), say about Mother Cabrini that it is not what she accomplished or how far she traveled that made her a great missionary saint. It was how she allowed God to accomplish remarkable achievements in and through her. Her immense love of God empowered her to reach out to the poor, the needy, and immigrants. By the time she died, Cabrini had overseen the establishment of 67 missions in the U.S., Italy, France, England, Spain, Brazil, Argentina, and Nicaragua with ministries in healthcare, teaching, caregiving, and other social services. Frances, no doubt, was confident that she was doing only what she ought. Pray for such confidence.

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 14 - One of a kind

Where do we find ourselves in the story of Jesus' healing of the 10 lepers? We'd like to believe we'd be the one healed leper who returned to thank Jesus, but the story speaks volumes of the human tendency to call upon God when times are bad but to forget God when times are easy. Suffering is not good, but it does serve to remind us of our dependency on God. Health and well-being are good, but we do well to remember the loving God who makes them possible.

"Were not ten made clean? But the other nine, Where are they?"

THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 15

FEAST OF ALBERT THE GREAT, BISHOP, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH Seeing and believing

Sure, scientists don't have to believe in God; plenty of fine scientists don't. And religious people don't need to be up on the latest findings of quantum mechanics to be faithful. But, as Albert Einstein once said, "Science without religion is lame, religion without science is blind." In their fullest expressions, science and faith have the same goal: ever-deeper knowledge of creation so as to give ever more praise to the Creator. The more we know about creation—whether through the eyes of science or faith—the more appreciation we have for the marvelous works of God. Rather than an unnecessary conflict, where science tries to "disprove" faith while faith blissfully ignores science, we should recognize different ways of seeing that complement one another. Today we remember an earlier Albert, a man of science as well as faith, who more than 700 years ago let science walk and gave religion sight in ways Einstein would have approved.

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 16 - FEAST OF GERTRUDE THE GREAT, VIRGIN Join the mystical union

Saint Gertrude (1256-1302) is one of the great mystics of Catholic tradition. According to Gertrude biographer Benedictine Sister Evangela Bossert, Gertrude's "focus on the mystery of Jesus turns less on his historical life and more on the humanity he shares with all humans. Her emphasis is not so much that we should imitate Jesus, but that we are invited to participate in a human-divine union that already is. In prayer and sacrament, we encounter this blessed union." Reconnect with the divine today through prayer that includes this plea of Gertrude's: "O God . . . invite us into your heart, that we may be totally transformed into love."

FEAST OF ELIZABETH OF HUNGARY, RELIGIOUS

No rest for the weary

"She died of exhaustion," the biographies say. At the age of 23, Elizabeth of Hungary (1207-1231) had already accomplished much. When her royal husband perished on crusade in 1227, Elizabeth found herself and her three children barred from the courts by relatives who did not care for her generous ways with the poor. Selling her jewelry and clothes, she opened a hospital and continued her good works as a Third Order Franciscan. She remains the patron saint of bakers—and an inspiration to those who work tirelessly for what they believe in. Honor Elizabeth today by sharing with someone in need.

Charitable IRA Rollover Expires December 31, 2007

For many of us, an IRA is one of our largest assets and a great potential resource for giving to our parish and other charities. From a tax standpoint, charitable giving from our IRA accounts during life had never been an ideal way to donate, however. That has changed. A new law makes it possible, if you are age 70½ or older, to transfer up to \$100,000 a year from your IRA to qualified charities without incurring income tax on the withdrawal. The provision is effective for the remainder of the 2007 tax year only, so you must act by December 31 to take advantage.
