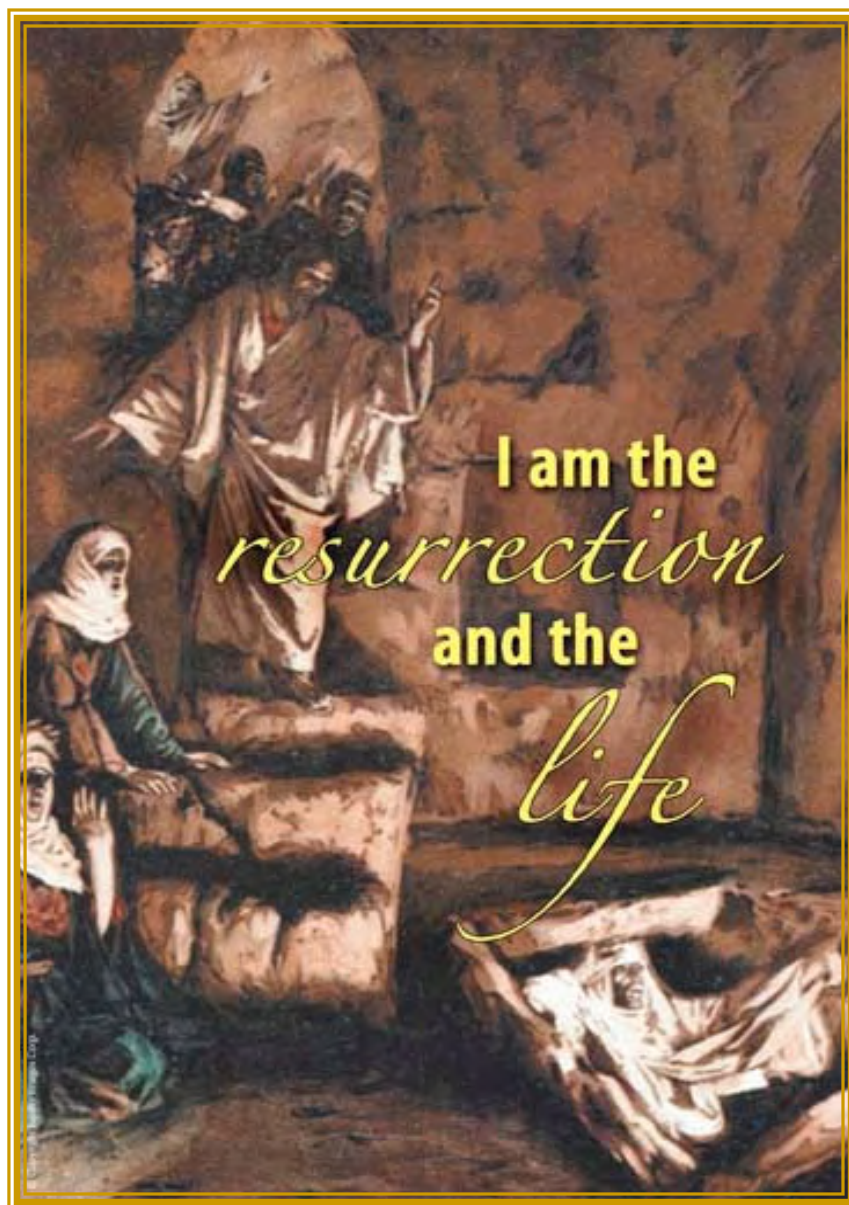

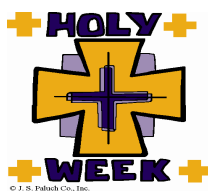

Notes from Father Bob...

Fifth Sunday of Lent 2008

“THE SPIRIT OF GOD HAS MADE HIS HOME IN YOU.”

When Jesus’ friend, Lazarus, falls ill and dies, the opportunity presents itself for Jesus to show to the world that he is the Lord of life. To show that no death, no evil or corrupting power will win the victory over the Lord of life. Neither physical death, nor spiritual death, will have the mastery. Whoever believes in Jesus will never die. Life beyond the grave is a tremendous promise, but life before the grave is desperately important as well. What is the point or purpose of living, if we can never know happiness? And happiness is the spiritual delight in being alive. It is the spirit of God living within us. It is the life of the Beatitudes which Jesus preached to the crowds.

The poor, the humble, the gentle, the patient – these are the people whose spiritual lives bring them the great gift of happiness. These are the people who have the power to raise others from spiritual death.

“If you had been here, my brother would not have died.” This is the heart-broken cry of Martha over her dead brother, Lazarus. It is also a cry addressed to us by the broken-hearted people of our world. Wherever people suffer from the death-dealing blows of a violent and cruel world, they look to the healthy ones for care and compassion. They look for help and healing.

By God’s grace, you and I are the healthy ones of this world. Not because we are perfect – far from it! Not because we are holy – God help us! Not because we are faultless – God forgive us! No. It is for a most amazing reason, of which we are not worthy. “The Spirit of God has made his home in us!”

If the Spirit of Jesus lives in you, then not only will you be alive, but you can help others to be alive as well. You can, as a member of Christ Jesus, call others from their graves, unbind them and help them to be free.

**FIFTH SUNDAY OF LENT; THIRD SCRUTINY OF THE ELECT
Don't miss the meaning**

As we celebrate the third and final Scrutiny of the Elect, it's good to remember that these rites are not solely for those who have not yet been baptized. In the scrutinies, as in all sacramental actions, the entire community of believers is transformed. To imagine anything less is to forego much of their power and beauty. In the words of T. S. Eliot, "We [will have] had the experience but missed the meaning."

One way to prepare for the third scrutiny is by asking this question of ourselves: "Where do I experience being bound up like Lazarus and yearning to be free?"

TODAY'S READINGS: *Ezekiel 37:12-14; Romans 8:8-11; John 11:1-45*

"Jesus said to them, 'Unbind him, and let him go.'"

MONDAY, MARCH 10

LENTEN WEEKDAY

Lay that burden down

The story of the woman caught in adultery (one wonders: Where was the man?) is another in which Jesus is presented with a false dilemma by those who see life and God in either/or terms: Either condemn the woman as the Law prescribes or let her go and break God's Law. Jesus' challenge, "Let the one among you without sin throw the first stone," defies such an overly simple view of life. Jesus regards the woman. Yes, there is sin here but not condemnation. "Go, and sin no more." When's the last time you presented yourself before such justice and mercy in the sacrament of reconciliation?

TODAY'S READINGS: *Daniel 13:1-9, 15-17, 19-30, 33-62; John 8:1-11*

"Jesus said, 'Neither do I condemn you. Go your way, and from now on do not sin again.'"

TUESDAY, MARCH 11

LENTEN WEEKDAY

Pledging allegiance

Jesus draws a clear line between those who live in their sins and those who live in the Father above. Yet it seems that the more definitively Jesus uses his terms of either being "of this world" or "not of this world," the more questions his audience throws back at him. The more unambiguous he is, the more incredulous they become. We, as followers of Christ, struggle to accept the choice between this world's demands or those eternal ones. How often we try to question Jesus' bold stance, while seeking a compromise. Try living every part of your day as a clear choice for God.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Numbers 21:4-9; John 8:21-30*

"He said to them, 'You are from below, I am from above; you are of this world, I am not of this world.'"

WEDNESDAY, MARCH 12

LENTEN WEEKDAY

Chip off the old block?

When we're young, we're often compared to our parents in superficial ways: "You have your mother's eyes." "The way you swing a bat, you can tell you're your father's kid." More significantly, we take on the identity of our parents when we begin to demonstrate their deepest values and defining qualities. That's the kind of resemblance Jesus was looking for when he considered the claim of those around him to be children of Abraham. Abraham trusted in God enough to take a long journey on nothing but a promise. Spiritually complacent people don't come from biblical stock.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Daniel 3:14-20, 91-92, 95; John 8:31-42*
"Jesus said to them, 'If you were Abraham's children, you would be doing what Abraham did.'"

THURSDAY, MARCH 13

LENTEN WEEKDAY

Names hurt

"Sticks and stones can break my bones, but names will never hurt me." Most of us don't graduate childhood without learning how untrue that is. Names *do* hurt. Some cause emotional wounds, while others are libelous and destroy lives. And when it comes to the name Jesus uses in John's gospel—"I AM"—the bottom line is blasphemy for many in his audience. It's shorthand for the name "I am who I am," which is how God defines the divine mystery to Moses. The only way Jesus isn't blaspheming is if he actually is divine. To believe that, you have to be ready for stones thrown at you.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Genesis 17:3-9; John 8:51-59*

"Jesus said to them, 'Very truly, I tell you, before Abraham was, I AM.' So they picked up stones to throw at him."

FRIDAY, MARCH 14

LENTEN WEEKDAY

Good trumps bad

During those dark moments in your life when you are sure God has forsaken you—when you are angry, hurt, and feel God owes you an explanation for your fate—follow this simple practice endorsed by Jesus: Count your blessings. Think about all that you've been given, the love and mercy that God has shown you and others. Did you demand explanations for those gifts—wonder at their fairness or equity? Our suffering may never make sense, but it will be redeemed—in fact it has been redeemed many times over. God's love is stronger than sorrow and death. Abide in that love.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Jeremiah 20:10-13; John 10:31-42*

"I have shown you many good works from the Father. For which of these are you going to stone me?"

SATURDAY, MARCH 15

FEAST OF JOSEPH, HUSBAND OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY;

PATRONAL DAY OF THE CHURCH

Well done, good and faithful servant!

So what's all this about a "patronal day of the church"—especially in connection with a person, Saint Joseph, who gets no spoken lines in scripture? The word *patron* comes from the Latin for "defender," and as we know, a patron saint is a saint to whose special protection and intercession a person or place or activity is dedicated. In Joseph's case, he gets to protect and pray for the whole church! But this righteous man, who did such a good job protecting his wife and child—Mary and Jesus, that is—is up to the job. Say a prayer to Joseph for the protection and guidance you need.

TODAY'S READINGS: *2 Samuel 7:4-5a, 12-14a, 16; Romans 4:13, 16-18, 22; Matthew 1:16, 18-21, 24a or Luke 2:41-51a*

"Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, for the child conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit."

FIFTH SUNDAY OF LENT

A RELATIONSHIP WITH GOD - CLEAR OF CLUTTER

Jn 11:1-45; 12-20-33; 8:1-11 One characteristic of a “de-cluttered” relationship with God is the willingness to wait. Think of Martha and Mary. They sent word to Jesus that Lazarus was ill. Jesus did not answer their prayers the way they wanted, but what a glorious end to the story!

MONDAY: “WHOEVER AMONG YOU IS WITHOUT SIN...”

Dn 13:1-9, 15-17, 19-30, 33-62; Jn 8:1-11 Jesus was merciful and gentle to the woman caught in adultery. Is there anyone “caught in sin” that I could treat more as Jesus dealt with this woman?

TUESDAY: ‘I ALWAYS DO WHAT IS PLEASING TO GOD’

Nm 21:4-9; Jn 8:21-30 Only Jesus can say these words. But Jesus is always there to forgive if I only “look up” and give him the chance.

WEDNESDAY: ‘YOU WILL KNOW THE TRUTH...’

Dn 3L14-20, 91-92, 95; Jn 8:31-42 God shows me the truth if I stay in touch through prayer. Relationship is all about sharing. Do I share myself with Jesus and let him share himself with me?

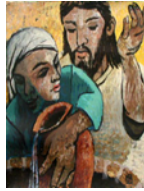
THURSDAY: CHILDREN OF ABRAHAM

Gn 17:3-9; Jn 8:51-59 “Whoever keeps my word” is a true child of Abraham, Jesus said. How do I keep God’s word?

FRIDAY: “THE FATHER IS IN ME AND I AM IN THE FATHER” **Jer 10:10-13; Jn 10:31-42** Through Jesus’ death and resurrection, I am also “in the Father” in a deep, intimate relationship. How have I experienced this?

SATURDAY: THE EVERLASTING COVENANT

Ez 37:21-28; Jn 11:45-57 God’s deepest wish for us is: “I will be their God, and they shall be my people.” This is the essence of what prayer should be. How does this change my image of what my relationship with God should be?



EVERY PERSON HAS BASIC RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES THAT FLOW FROM OUR HUMAN DIGNITY AND BELONG TO US AS HUMAN BEINGS

As we progress through Lent, we continue our Lenten Almsgiving, the African Well Fund. Thank you so much for your generous donations so far (more than \$5,700). Over the rest of the Lenten season, we hope to raise enough money to provide people in Africa with clean water. Water wells will benefit people in so many ways. Women will no longer have to walk miles each day in order to retrieve water, villages won’t need to store water in makeshift containers such as buckets and hollowed out melons, people will have more time for education and spending with their families, and most importantly, people will be protected from harmful diseases.

Here are a few interesting facts:

- More than half of Africa's people lack access to safe drinking water.
- People are more protected from disease and less likely to get sick if they have clean water.
- Guinea Worm and other parasites found in unclean water throughout most of Africa are very harmful to people when they drink it.
- Contamination of drinking water with naturally-occurring arsenic or fluoride threatens the health of people who drink it. Exposure to fluoride causes fluorosis which can leave people crippled and lead to death. Low concentration of arsenic in drinking water causes painful skin lesions and can result in cancer. -UNICEF

Donation bottles are available at each Mass. If you have a child at St. Cletus School, there are donation buckets in each classroom. Thank you so much for helping to build a well, and for helping to build hope...one well at a time.

My name is *Melissa Cepek*: I am a physical therapist at an outpatient clinic affiliated with Mercy Hospital. I live in La Grange with my wonderful husband Don and our cat Nellie. I would have never considered conversion had it not been for him. He was born and raised Catholic with a strong faith and belief in God. I was baptized Methodist, but spent most of my adult life attending Catholic Mass. The RCIA process is not only allowing me full entry into the Catholic faith, but will provide the opportunity for my family and I to worship together. We feel very blessed to have found a new home near St. Cletus parish. Everyone has made us feel so welcome from our very first visit. We have met wonderful people and have made many friends. I look forward to many more years of worship with our new St. Cletus family.

My name is *John Larson*: I was born in Chicago, Illinois in 1964 and baptized into the Lutheran faith. I never considered the Catholic faith (even though everyone in my family had converted over the past ten years) until I met Beata (my sponsor). Beata has been Catholic her entire life. She and her family had what I considered to be the “best family” I had ever met. I do admit that when I began the RCIA process I had very little hope that I would like it. I can’t say at this point I feel like a full-fledged Catholic but I can say that going to these RCIA classes with Pat and Brad at the helm I have learned so much about the Bible and the Gospel readings. I used to “sleep” with my eyes open in church and now I find myself reading ahead to the Gospel for the day. When we leave the church after the homily we go to RCIA class and discuss the Gospel. It helps us understand what was written and why. I have to say that in a few weeks when we have no more classes I will feel at a loss. Finally, the relationships developed with the other members, sponsors, and teachers has been an added plus. I would recommend this class to all who want to become Catholic.
