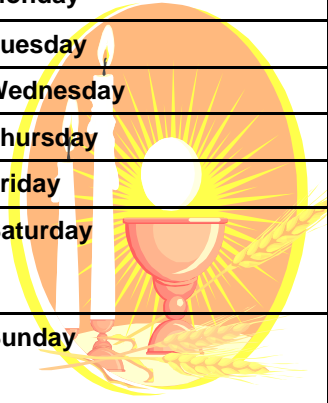

Notes from Father Bob...

Sixth Sunday of Easter

All religions attempt to respond to the problem of suffering. Christianity's answer has always centered on the person of Jesus himself, the God who emptied himself to be like his creatures, to the point of suffering and dying on our behalf. Peter uses his example when trying to explain and encourage good Christian belief and practice. It is very human to get into violent argument in defense of cherished beliefs. Peter argues for a more peaceful approach. Right from the beginning people tried to attack Christians on the grounds that they were practicing strange and occult rites. It was a world in which such magic and superstitions abounded, so it is understandable that this new belief should immediately be confused with such excesses. To counter such mischievous misunderstanding, Peter counsels the giving of explanations with courtesy, respect and a clear conscience. Slandorous accusations lose their power when their victims are living transparently good lives. If God asks the victims to suffer still from such attacks, it is better to do so for living good lives than living badly. This is what Christ himself did. He was able to do so because he was empowered by the Holy Spirit. In a similar way, the Acts and John's Gospel argue, we who call ourselves Christian need to be empowered by the Spirit in the same way. It is not by our own strength that we live out the gospel. Both our understanding and the practice of our belief come through the Holy Spirit living within us.

There have been times in the past when we could take for granted that people in general had some knowledge of Christianity. The language of the Bible and its stories underpinned art and architecture, music and culture. In fact the western world used to proclaim itself to be Christian, even if it never practiced very well what it preached. But there are few countries now that could call themselves Christian in this way. There are few in which a knowledge of even the major events of the Christian story can be presumed. At a superficial level this means we can be laughed at for being Christian. It also means that we are more than likely to be misunderstood. In some parts of the world this misunderstanding reaches the form of downright opposition, physical oppression and persecution. The living out of the Christian message as exemplified in Christ himself is by no means over. Whether we are able to follow his example and live up to our belief depends on how far the gospel message is real to us. It is only if we really reverence the Lord Christ in our hearts and remain open to his Spirit that we will be able to continue to offer his gospel of love to all we meet. We do not follow Christ through our own strength. It is only through the mystery of his grace given in his Spirit that we too will be able to communicate his life serenely in both word and deed.

Altar Server Training

I am pleased to say that Father Charles and I have had the great pleasure of working with and re-training our dedicated Altar Servers over the past several weeks. We were both impressed with their attentiveness and commitment to this most important ministry at the altar. We have had the opportunity to review all the Mass parts with our servers and have been able to discuss and practice their role during the liturgy.

We are currently beginning the initial training of our new servers who are finishing up their 6th grade year in school. We have more than 35 new servers who have asked to be trained. They are very prayerful and excited about serving the Lord at His altar.

Once we have completed all re-training of our veteran servers and training of our new servers we will formally install them in the ministry of service at the altar. We look forward to presenting them to the entire parish community at one of our weekend parish liturgies. Please keep each one of these dedicated young men and women in your daily thoughts and prayers. Remember to thank God for their willingness to serve God's people at the altar.

FEAST OF CATHERINE OF SIENA, VIRGIN, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH Catherine the great saint

Catherine of Siena (1347-1380) lacked formal schooling and died at a young age, yet she managed to become a counselor to popes and a renowned philosopher and theologian. Her many letters are considered a treasure of early Italian literature. She even achieved the rare distinction of being named doctor of the church, one of the first two women to be so honored in 1970 by Pope Paul VI (the other being Teresa of Ávila). Yet perhaps her greatest witness was her dedication to the ill and the poor, whom she served in hospitals and homes. She packed several saintly lives into her brief lifetime and provides us a lifetime of inspiration.

WEDNESDAY, APRIL 30

EASTER WEEKDAY - Religiously speaking

You hear a lot about how many people these days are "spiritual but not religious." That they pick and choose the pieces of their spirituality without much connection to organized religion. But recent surveys paint a different picture: More than half of Americans between the ages of 21 and 45 are not involved in religion. Any religion. They live without it, don't understand it, and think it's pretty much inhabited by the backward-thinking and occasional pathological examples they see in the news. This situation, however, does not call for condemnation but education and reaching out. Those who believe know that faith is a natural and even necessary part of life; in fact, it's the most important. So try to guide—gently—a "nonreligious" person to recognize the need for a loving God that's in all of us.

THURSDAY, MAY 1

EASTER WEEKDAY; NATIONAL DAY OF PRAYER

A day to pray

Today is our National Day of Prayer. It is a day whose roots reach all the way back to the Continental Congress of 1775, when the delegates declared that a day be set aside to pray for our fledgling nation. It has had an uneven history since then (largely because of our unease with "government-mandated" prayer), but some of our most illustrious presidents, including Washington, Madison, and Lincoln, were advocates for a day of prayer. Harry Truman finally signed the bill into law in 1952.

It's good to be reminded that our prayers are needed for the benefit of something larger than our own narrow circles of concern. Today, plan to set aside a few extra moments to pray for our country and our leaders.

FEAST OF ATHANASIUS, BISHOP, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH

Trouble ahead, trouble behind

It was not unusual for Saint Paul to be hauled before courts and officials because of his preaching of the gospel. He had a way of stirring things up. So did Saint Athanasius, the fourth-century bishop of Alexandria in Egypt, who spent a total of 17 years in exile for defending the doctrine that Christ was both fully human and fully divine. God calls us to stick with our beliefs whatever the cost to our personal comfort zones. And as God did for Paul and Athanasius, God changes those costs into the blessedness of closeness to the divine.

Believing is seeing

How many times have we thought, "If I could just receive some sort of sign that I'm on the right track. If only I knew where I am going. If only I were sure!" When we find ourselves being caught up in these anxious thoughts, we have only to remember the apostles, the ones who were with Jesus from the beginning. To the very end of his life they weren't sure exactly who he was. They wondered, they questioned, they doubted. Nevertheless, they followed Jesus in spite of their uncertainty. There is no proof in matters of faith. In the realm of the spirit, "seeing is believing" holds no currency. To see, we must first believe.

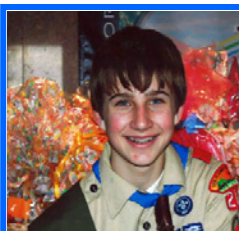
