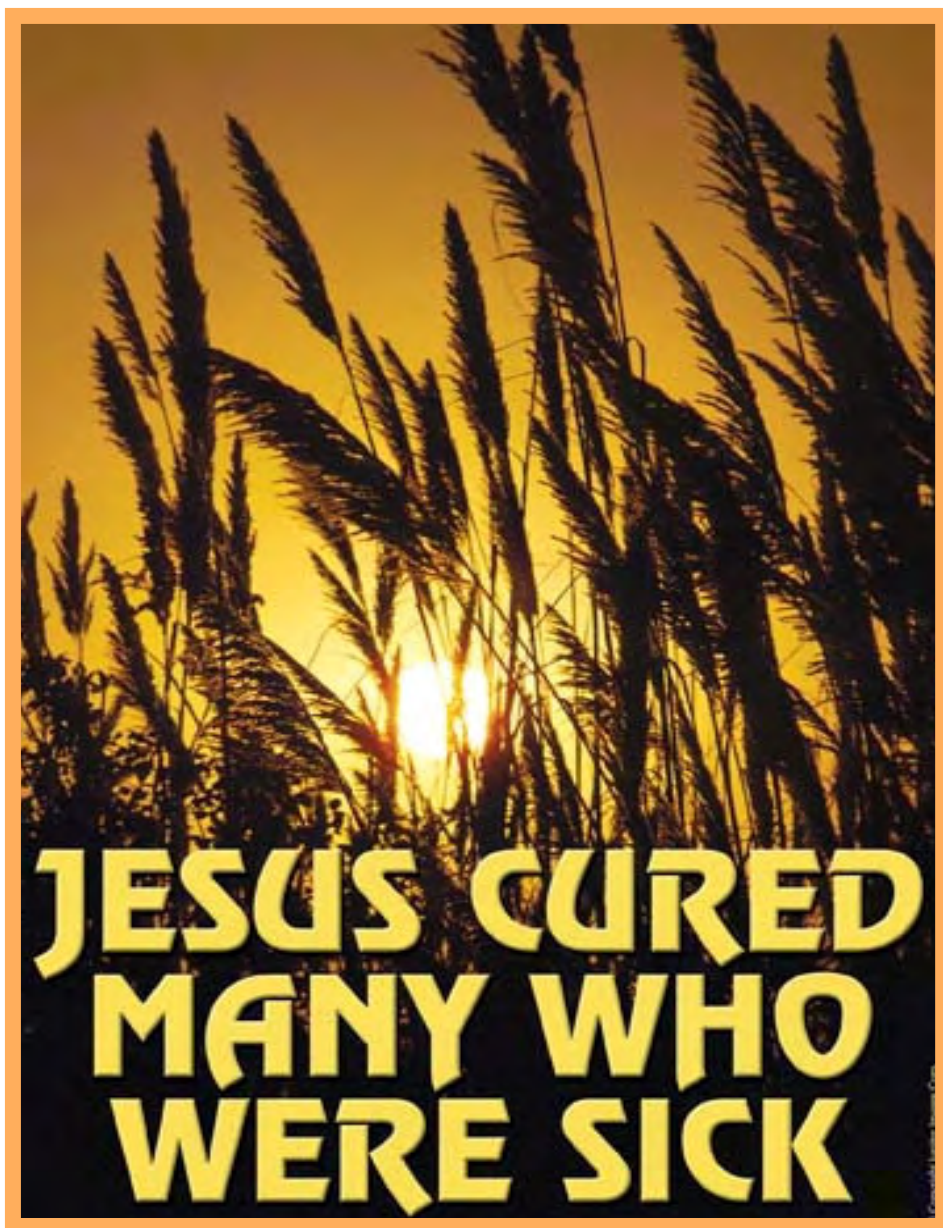

NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time

The story of Bernadette of Lourdes always provokes strong feelings about miracles. Some people are positive and faith-filled, others are skeptical. James, a twenty-year-old student who traveled to Lourdes with a group of sick people, was one such skeptic. From time to time he made cynical comments, but he was intrigued by the question of why so many people traveled to Lourdes. The gaudy tourist shops did not help him, but the joy and faith of doctors, nurses, helpers and the sick changed his mind. There was something mysterious about the experience in Lourdes. It deepened his faith in people and God. He returned home having witnessed many small miracles, cures which were inexplicable to modern medicine. They were extraordinary events.

Miracles cannot be explained. Words also fail when we try to describe the evil in the world. Popular papers sometimes headline people who do very wrong deeds as “evil” or “possessed”. There is an interest in the demonic in many novels, and some people are tempted to experiment with black magic. When we see a crowd turning violent, or the ferocity of ethnic cleansing, we are not only witnessing the effects of prejudice or hatred. There seems to be something more to it. This “something more” has been associated in different ages with the force of evil, dark principalities and powers or the devil. The reality of evil must be named.

To the modern mind, today’s Gospel raises a lot of questions. How do we understand healings and the casting out of devils? The frequency with which these things occur in the gospels shows that Jesus must have been both healer and liberator from evil.

To understand the power of God active in the deeds of Jesus, we must recognize all that stands in opposition to good. It comes in many different forms. Some people suffer from sickness and need healing. Others suffer from the evil deeds of those around them and from sin. Sin causes disorder and breaks communion with others. The power of evil is mysterious, but it cannot be denied. However, the Gospel teaches that the power of God is always greater than any other force, whether sin, sickness or evil.

Why in the Gospel is it that the devils recognize Jesus? Perhaps because the power of goodness always uncovers evil. It is part of the mystery of Mark’s gospel that the disciples do not fully understand Jesus until after his crucifixion and resurrection. Mark does not want the hearers of the gospel to see Jesus as a magician or wonder-worker. Rather his miracles must be seen in the context of the victory of the cross and resurrection. It is this which reassures us that the power of God is greater than any other force. We have confidence that it can liberate from sin, from suffering and from evil.

Modern psychology can lead to a fuller understanding of the human person and the ways in which mental illness is treatable. It can help to overcome the stigma once associated with it, and past associations with possession. On the other hand, we cannot simply reduce evil to psychology or social conditioning. There is another reality, which only God overcomes.

God is involved in the healing of sickness, normally through the ordinary means of medicine, but occasionally in extraordinary ways through the miraculous. God is active when people are liberated from oppression through the establishment of justice in society. The power of God can free people from all forms of enslavement, including the mystery of evil – the “something more” which we cannot explain. We have faith that God has triumphed over evil and will overcome all things. Jesus has promised to be with his followers until the end of time

Good intentions

Whenever we begin something, it is always a good idea to start with an intention. Take a few breaths and ask yourself, “What do I intend to get out of this day, this meeting, this work, this experience?” The dictionary defines *intention* as “the act of determining mentally upon some action or result.” In Latin *in-tendere* means “to stretch toward.” One way to think about intention is to ask yourself what you are willing to stretch toward. Then imagine that our compassionate and loving God is also stretching toward you, intending what is best for you. Now you’re praying. Plan to get up 15 minutes early and write your intention for the day.

Today in the Jewish calendar is Tu Bishvat (or Tu B’Shevat), the “New Year of the Trees.” Customs include planting trees and eating dried fruits and nuts, especially figs, dates, raisins, carob, and almonds. In Israel the flowering of almond trees around the country coincides with Tu Bishvat, and the holiday is often observed by planting trees or raising money to plant trees. How you can get God’s attention

How to be sure God knows our needs? Imitate Saint Scholastica, who knew God can’t resist the prayer of a holy person. Scholastica enjoyed a precious annual visit from her brother, Saint Benedict. At the end of her life Benedict visited as always but was anxious to return home at the appointed time. Scholastica entreated him to stay but he refused. So she literally “prayed up a storm” whose ferocity made travel impossible. “What have you done?” her brother asked. Scholastica answered, “I asked and you would not listen; so I asked my God and he did listen.” Storm heaven with your prayers!

WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 11

FEAST OF OUR LADY OF LOURDES; WORLD DAY OF PRAYER FOR THE SICK

Wishing you well

For 150 years visitors to the shrine to Our Lady of Lourdes have believed in the healing power of water that flows from a natural spring there. Closer to home, some parishes commemorate World Day of Prayer for the Sick by asking pastoral care ministers and ministers of Holy Communion to visit the homebound and hospitalized; placing the names of the sick in a special book displayed in church; writing the names of the sick on pieces of paper and asking parishioners to take a name, pray for the person, and send him or her a card. What can you do today?

THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 12

Unqualified love

There was a time not that long ago when Catholics believed that anyone who wasn’t Catholic was going straight to hell in a handbasket. The Jews during Jesus’ time held similar views toward other religions. Syro-Phoenicians, who were enemies of Israel and didn’t share in the same faith, were, in the minds of Jesus’ disciples, unworthy of God’s help. But Jesus turned that attitude on its head. For Christians, all human life has sacred dignity and is beloved by God, even the lives of our enemies. Stepping up to that truth sometimes requires repentance on our part.

TODAY’S READINGS: *Genesis 2:18-25; Mark 7:24-30*

“Jesus said to her, ‘Let the children be fed first, for it is not fair to take the children’s food and throw it to the dogs.’”

FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 13

Knowledge vs. wisdom

“Knowledge is power,” said Ben Franklin. The serpent said the same thing to Eve, and she bought it. Although knowledge often does give us access to the corridors of power, it doesn’t guarantee us wisdom. An attribute of God, wisdom is acquired only through the indwelling Holy Spirit. In the Bible knowledge is imagined sometimes as tantalizing fruit dangling from a forbidden tree. Wisdom, however, sets a lavish table at which her guests may dine by accepting her invitation. When faced with the choice between fast and slow food, take the opportunity to savor the meal that lasts to eternity.

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 14

FEAST OF CYRIL, MONK, AND METHODIUS, BISHOP

In their own words

There’s a small detail in the gospel story of how Jesus fed 4,000 people with a few loaves and fish: “Some of them have come from a great distance.” Sounds like a simple piece of common sense—the people were tired and couldn’t travel back without something under their belts. But “great distance” here was a code word for “outsider.” Even outsiders, like Gentiles, were welcome at God’s table.

Eight centuries later the brothers Cyril and Methodius were called out of monastic life to be missionaries. They not only evangelized but also translated scripture and liturgy into the language of the people (which also required them to invent an alphabet), and resisted the insistence of other missionaries that everything be in Latin. These saints recognized that truly welcoming everyone—including outsiders—to God’s kingdom called for moving out of established boundaries and starting with people where they were. And that’s a miracle we, too, can be part of.

Sacrament of Healing . . . Anointing of the Sick

The Lord Himself showed great concern for the bodily and spiritual welfare of the sick and commanded His followers to do likewise. This is clear from the Gospels and above all from the existence of the sacrament of anointing which He instituted and which is made known to us in the *Letter of James*.

This sacrament gives the grace of the Holy Spirit to those who are sick, either chronically or acutely; by this grace the *whole person* is helped and saved, sustained by trust in God, and strengthened against the temptations of the Evil One and against anxiety over illness or death.

Those who may receive this sacrament include:

1. All whose health is seriously impaired by sickness or advancing age.
2. Persons who may be facing surgery or risky medical procedures.
3. Elderly persons who may have become weakened even without any serious illness being present.
4. Sick children so they will be strengthened and helped.



It should be remembered that: *chronic* illness as well as *serious or acute* illness qualifies a person for this sacrament; that those who suffer from *psychological, emotional or mental conditions* may also receive; and importantly, that this sacrament should not be conferred on anyone who remains in open and serious sin. The sacrament should also not be used as a substitute for Reconciliation. It would be appropriate for one to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation at another time in addition to the Sacrament of Anointing. This sacrament may be repeated at the discretion of the minister.
