NOTES FROM FATHER BOB

Fourth Sunday of Easter

May 3, 2009

“I AM THE GOOD SHEPHERD”

There are many depictions of the Good Shepherd in our churches. Sometimes he is a tender figure holding a young lamb close to his breast. In today's Gospel, John uses the image of the shepherd to link Jesus to the shepherds of old. King David, before he became the protector of Israel, developed his skills minding sheep. Despite the romantic myths surrounding this occupation, a shepherd's life was in reality a tough one. Accompanying one's flock through the mountains and open spaces could be a life-threatening task. A good shepherd would have to show a deep concern for his sheep and more than a little courage in the face of danger.

The so-called leaders in the time of Christ enjoyed the status and privileges of authority but did not go out of their way to lift the burdens from God's people. They are likened here to the hired hands who will always think of number one. Jesus, in contrast, will give everything that we might be saved. He calls each of his disciples by name. He will freely endure the cross that the lost might be saved in every generation.

Being a true shepherd is for him both a human and divine task. It means walking with his sheep, comforting our fears, enduring the mud and mess with us, dignifying our humanity by being stripped of his in a most horrendous way. The story of the good shepherd becomes the Easter story.

As followers of Jesus we know that he touches every area of our lives. We encounter him when we gather as one around his table; but his voice is also heard in the most unlikely of places and from the most unusual of people. Our task is to be willing to listen for his voice, and as his flock to act in the power of his name. Just as Peter brings healing to a man in the name of Christ, so we are called to seek out the marginalized and shepherd them back into the community of faith. By our words and example we can help to show Christ's love to those who may feel they have gone too far for anyone to care, or bother to find them once more. The flip side of this is that we must speak out against anything that causes people in our community to feel unwanted or unloved.

We are united to Christ the Shepherd through the waters of baptism. We are also intimately connected to all other Christians and people of goodwill. How much people need to hear that joyous cry from John: “See the love the Father has for us by letting us be called children of God.” There are many who would be leaders today but few who will give of themselves in the service of others, or reach out to the stranger who has yet to hear of the wondrous fact that Christ died for us.

FIRST COMMUNION AND CONFIRMATION 2009

Last Saturday we celebrated First Holy Communion at two separate liturgies and witnessed more than 112 young boys and girls receive our Lord in the Eucharist for the very first time. It was indeed an inspirational day for all concerned. These young people not only received Christ for the first time in Holy Communion but served to remind each of us of the joy of receiving him body and blood each time we approach the altar. Our prayers are with each of these new communicants and we thank God for their holy and innocent model of what it means to be a true and faithful disciple of Christ.

This Sunday afternoon we will witness another 100+ of our young high school students as they are confirmed in the Holy Spirit at Confirmation. They have spent the past two years in study, discussion, prayer, reflection and service preparing to receive this joyous sacrament. Once again we thank God for their commitment to their faith and their modeling for us of what it means to be faithful disciples. May the Holy Spirit of God grow and prosper within each of them today and always. Our prayers are with them as they continue their journey of faith.

Wanted: More shepherds

Today the church invites us to pray for vocations. Consider starting with a prayer about your own religious vocation. Have you considered religious life, holy orders, or lay ministry? Living a life of Christian witness carries with it much responsibility, but when practiced with humility and compassion it engenders a life of great joy. The church needs you and your commitment to serve. Be open to unexpected options, and in the words of Pope John Paul II, "Trust Christ, because he trusts you."

TODAY'S READINGS: *Acts 4:8-12; 1 John 3:1-2; John 10:11-18*

"I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep."

MONDAY, MAY 4

EASTER WEEKDAY

Cleanliness and godliness

The notion of what is "clean" and "unclean" is very important in Judaism, especially among Orthodox Jews. Purification rituals are observed for a variety of occasions, and many of them require the ritual washing of the hands, or at times a full immersion. Early Christianity had to struggle with questions of purity as it grew and encountered the Gentile world. Some say that baptism represents a form of ritual purification adapted from Judaism, and that even the dipping of fingertips in holy water upon entering church is part of that tradition. The apostle Peter helped the early church move beyond a narrow definition of purity. Spend some time today reflecting on what helps you feel "clean and pure" spirituality, and then practice it.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Acts 11:1-18; John 10:1-10*

"What God has made clean, you must not call profane."

TUESDAY, MAY 5

EASTER WEEKDAY

Do as I do

In Elizabethan England many Catholic priests traveled in secret; if captured, they faced possible death at the hands of the government. At one such execution, of the Jesuit Edmund Campion, a young man standing at the front of the crowd was struck by Campion's blood. That man, Henry Walpole, became a Jesuit himself and in his time a martyr. At another execution much earlier in the history of the church, that of Stephen, the first Christian martyr, stood another bystander, then a leading persecutor of Christians and later one of its greatest saints: Paul. In these stories the sacrifice of one inspired a life of sacrifice in another. Isn't that the calling of Christians in all times: to see in Jesus' sacrifice the model for giving oneself to God and others?

TODAY'S READINGS: *Acts 11:19-26; John 10:22-30*

"Now those who were scattered because of the persecution that took place over Stephen traveled as far as Phoenicia, Cyprus, and Antioch."

WEDNESDAY, MAY 6

EASTER WEEKDAY

Your mission, if you choose to accept it

One of the most important questions we can ask ourselves is "What is my mission in life?" Perhaps no question is as critical to living a life of purpose as this one. The author Frederick Buechner wrote, "The place God calls you to is the place where your deep gladness and the world's deep hunger meet." So ask yourself, *What do I love to do? What feels life-giving, as opposed to life-draining? What would be most helpful to my family, my community, the world? If,*

after answering these questions, you still don't know what your mission is, ask God to help you find it. Then prepare to be amazed.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Acts 12:24-13:5a; John 12:44-50*

"Set apart for me Barnabas and Saul for the work to which I have called them."

THURSDAY, MAY 7

EASTER WEEKDAY

"Are you talking to me?"

In the gospels Jesus' words are often directed to a particular group of people—to the Pharisees and scribes, the crowd, his disciples. Most of us regularly hear the Word of God in a large group, the liturgical assembly where, Vatican II reminds us, the presence of Christ is as real as the Eucharist. But faith can also be enlivened in other gatherings like Bible study groups, small Christian communities, a men's or women's group, in the family. Paying attention to what Jesus says when we pray with an open Bible, or with a group of believers, can help to assure that we are becoming more transparent to the Christ within.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Acts 13:13-25; John 13:16-20*

"Whoever receives one whom I send receives me; and whoever receives me receives him who sent me."

FRIDAY, MAY 8

EASTER WEEKDAY

Help in troubled times

What is troubling your heart today? What causes anxiety? The economy? Keeping a job? A family member or friend in difficulty? Loneliness? In Christ we have the foundation no trouble can shake. Jesus spoke of his troubled heart in the garden before his crucifixion. Yet not even death could keep him from the fulfillment God the Father promised. The disciples worried about their world that came apart when Jesus was arrested and put to death. Even after they encountered the risen Christ, they were fearful. Yet he promised them "another Advocate," the Spirit that would uphold them and sustain them through hard times—and will support you through any trouble.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Acts 13:26-33; John 14:1-6*

"Do not let your hearts be troubled. Believe in God, believe also in me."

EASTER WEEKDAY

Somebody's got to do it

Living the gospel can be a thankless job. In fact, it can be downright dangerous. Persecution has been part of the life of Christians since the church began. Paul and the first disciples faced beatings, imprisonment, mockery, and derision. Yet something about their experience of God was so compelling that they couldn't help but preach and live the good news. Though understandably discouraged at times, and probably even doubtful, the early disciples persevered and, as scripture records, they were "filled with joy and the Holy Spirit." Today we still face emotional and sometimes physical persecution from folks who don't quite get the gospel, including those with "high standing" in our lives. Let us pray for the courage of our foremothers and forefathers to resolutely live the gospel.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Acts 13:44-52; John 14:7-14*
