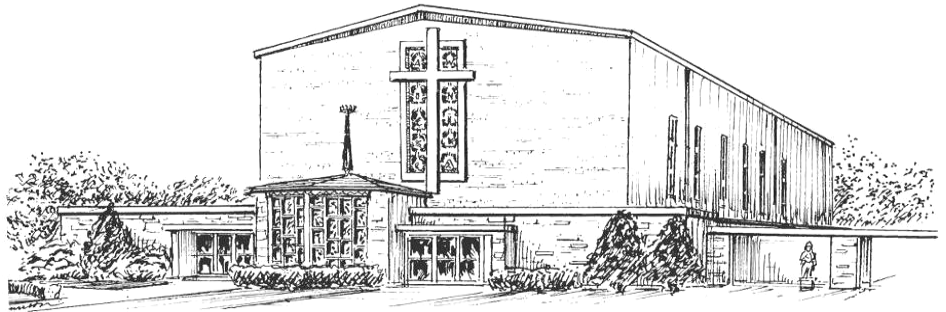

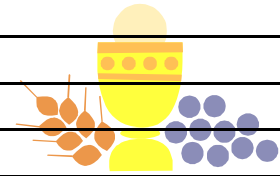

NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

SECOND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 2010

Celebrations are always a mixture of tradition and innovation. To some extent it depends on our personality and character which we prefer. It can also depend on how old we are. Arguments about weddings often take place because parents and children cannot agree on the right mix. Should the wedding take place in a church or on a beach in the Caribbean? Should the father give the bride away or should she march in by herself or with her mother? Should bride and groom exchange rings or other tokens? Should the music be traditional or modern? What should everyone wear? Does the bridal couple walk or travel by limousine? Who is to be invited? What and where do they eat? Weddings do not have the monopoly on such decision making. Even children's parties can cause similar problems in the Western world today. Traditional societies may be more concerned to ensure that all the old practices are respected and retained. But always there is the desire to get it right, to fulfill the varieties of expectations. Rituals are important. They often articulate, even in ways that at times may seem irrelevant, the letting go of the old and the encounter with the new.

In the story of Cana St. John weaves together the encounter of the worlds of the Old and New Testaments. In this encounter the Old is not discarded but provides the material to be transformed into the New. It is fitting that this all takes place at a wedding, for the law of the new life is nothing other than love. The Old is represented by the mother of Jesus, by the old rituals and the water, the New is represented by Jesus and his disciples and by the new wine that is poured out for all. Not evident in translation, John's use of tenses in the original Greek reinforces the contrast between the two worlds. Until Jesus acts he used the past tense. The difference between the two worlds is most highlighted in the words of Jesus in response to his mother's request: "Woman why turn to me? My hour has not come yet." His mother is the representative, even the pinnacle of all that has gone before. The first reaction of Jesus points to the break that has to happen if the New is to be born and flourish. And yet it is his mother who calls forth the initiation of the new, and it is the ceremonial water pots of the old legislation that he now takes to transform into the wine of the new. The most important symbol of creation and cleansing, water, is transformed into the higher symbol of life-giving love. It is in the nature of such love that it cannot stay untouched or stagnant. It has to be poured out, and in being poured out the full nature of the transformation is revealed. The old expectations are reversed. The old wine cannot compare with the new wine of God's love.

As human beings we often struggle with the complex relationship between past, present and future. Depending on age and attitude we can prefer one or the other. We expect the young to yearn for the new and the elderly to muse fondly on the past, but we also meet old heads on young shoulders and pensioners who never cease to delight in the new. As Christians this tension is experienced in different ways. We have traditional and modern liturgies, we feel comfortable with different forms of architecture and different forms of language. The Gospel message cannot be used to buttress any of these choices. It is more a challenge to endure with the new life of God's love all forms of expressing our belief. The whole of creation is our artistic palette. The question is how we transform the ordinary into the extraordinary, the two-dimensional into the life-giving. For this to happen there has to be a pouring out of ourselves in love. We are the new wine that only finds its true destiny in being shared and enjoyed. Where our acts and practices of worship and life turn inwards and become defensive, we fall back into the old world. Where we are able to give of ourselves with the generosity shown by Jesus himself, at that point the clay we are working with, whether sacred or profane, is transformed into the new life of Christ himself.

Reading the signs

Ever notice how God never requires us to “say when”? The extravagant gesture is God’s signature statement. In the time of Elijah a jar of meal and a jug of oil refused to go empty, no matter how many times a certain widow dipped into both. On the occasion of Jesus feeding 5,000 people with one boy’s lunch, there was enough for leftovers. And when Jesus turned water into wine, it was a *lot* of wine, and the best kind, too. Abundance is God’s way of doing things. In your charitable giving count on God’s making it up to you—and then some!

MONDAY, JANUARY 18 - United we stand

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity began in 1908. The dates of the week were proposed by Father Paul Wattson, cofounder of the Graymoor Franciscan Friars. Popes Pius X bolstered the concept and Benedict XV encouraged its observance. Protestant leaders in the mid-1920s also proposed an annual octave of prayer for unity. In 1948, with the founding of the World Council of Churches, the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity became increasingly recognized by different churches throughout the world. Take a moment today to pray that, despite our differences, Christians of various backgrounds and traditions may indeed “all be one.”

TODAY’S READINGS: *1 Samuel 15:16-23; Mark 2:18-22*

“One puts new wine into fresh wineskins.”

TUESDAY, JANUARY 19 - Listen and speak

The theme for this second day of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is from the Gospel of Luke: “You are witnesses of these things.” The word *witness* is both a noun and a verb. We are witnesses because we are Christian: We have experienced the reality of Jesus in our lives. But witnesses also speak: We are called to share our stories of faith with others. In our culture of deeply divisive language, politics, and, particularly, religion, we must actively strive to find creative ways to share our encounters with Jesus and hear the stories of other Christians. Our intention, though, begins with some reflection: How willing am I to share my faith stories with others? How willing am I to listen to theirs?

TODAY’S READINGS: *1 Samuel 16:1-13; Mark 2:23-28*

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 20

FEAST OF FABIAN, POPE, MARTYR

The accidental pope

Can a layperson be chosen pope? It happened in the year 236, when it is said that those who had gathered to elect a new bishop of Rome saw a dove alight upon the head of Fabian, an unknown layman and farmer who happened to be visiting the city. He was at once proclaimed bishop of Rome by acclamation. Fabian made important contributions to the church, including his decision to send seven bishops to Gaul to evangelize the region we know today as France and Belgium. Be prepared for service

both great and small at any time of day or night.

THURSDAY, JANUARY 8 - Across the great divide

While Christian unity comes to our attention each January, in the daily “culture wars” what divides people (including Christian from Christian) seems always more prominent. In the health-care debate for example, we focus on divergent views on issues rather than a common goal like securing health care and insurance for the poor or illegal immigrants. Yes, *illegal*. See what I mean? Immediately the voices of righteousness and indignation (like that of the elder son in the story of the Prodigal Son) rise—even to belligerence. What of the borderless kingship of Christ? Christ’s unconditional compassion is real only insofar as it is acted in *our* flesh. Unity among Christians will elude us as long as any of us clings to anyone or anything other than Christ.

TODAY’S READINGS: *1 Samuel 18:6-9; 19:1-7; Mark 3:7-12*

FRIDAY, JANUARY 22 - Please take this call

To what will you be called this day? Will it be to reconciliation and right relationship with a friend or coworker? To lead the way on a project using your gifts and a bit of inspiration from the Spirit? To lay down your own good ideas, your plan, or perhaps even your own pride or reputation in order to help another person? To make someone smile? You may not see it coming, and you might not even realize it when it is happening, but throughout this day, indeed this and every day, you are called by God to some small or large part of bringing about the gospel of Christ Jesus. Listen, and be ready!

TODAY’S READINGS: *1 Samuel 24:3-21; Mark 3:13-19*

SATURDAY, JANUARY 23

The challenge of Christian unity

In the opening verses of 2 Samuel, David mourns the death of Saul, the king of Israel. Never mind that Saul spent most of 1 Samuel trying to kill David. But David understood that there was something in life bigger than his own concerns, his own problems. The king had fallen, and that needed to be mourned. Jesus taught the people to love their enemies, too. Maybe that’s why his family thought he was crazy. And maybe the first step toward Christian unity, for which we pray this week, is understanding that there’s something more important than our differences. All Christians need to love one another.

TODAY’S READINGS: *2 Samuel 1:1-4, 11-12, 19, 23-27; Mark 3:20-21*
