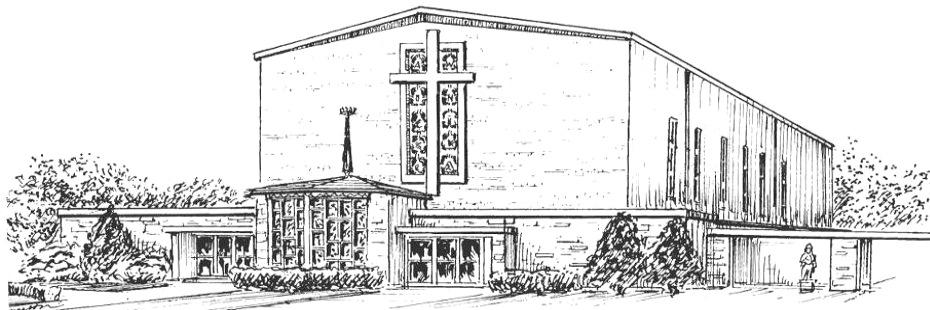

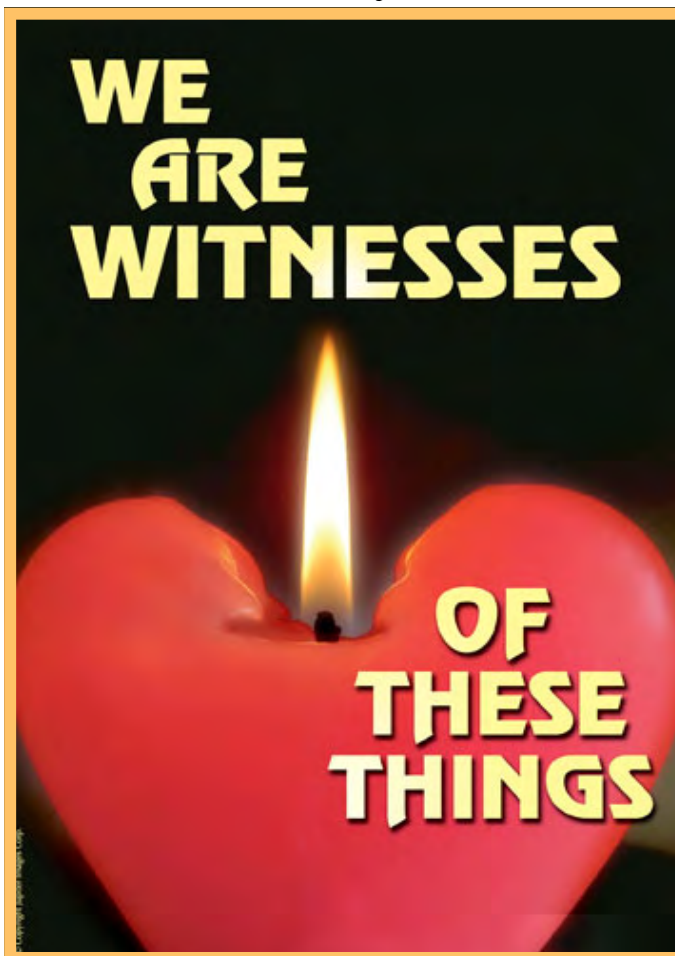

NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

THIRD SUNDAY OF EASTER

When William was diagnosed as having terminal cancer, his whole family went into shock. They found it very difficult to face up to, let alone talk about. Even when William left the hospital to go home to die, Annie, his wife, carried on almost as if nothing had changed. She still fussed about the cleaning, the cooking, the shopping, all the little details which go to make up life, but which you might expect to put on hold as you spend the last few days with your loved one. The truth was that this was the only way that Annie –and her family– could cope with the situation. They were so shocked at the diagnosis that they simply couldn't accept it, and it was only after William's funeral that the reality of his death began to hit home for Annie and the rest of the family. Only gradually were they able to begin to accept that William had really died, so that the long process of grieving and of inner healing could begin.

Perhaps the disciples in today's gospel were in a similar situation. They were in a state of total shock after Jesus' death. Even though the risen Jesus had already shown himself to them, they were unable to take in or accept these strange events. So they carried on with their lives as if nothing had happened. Like Annie with her cooking and cleaning, the apostles turned to what was familiar: they went fishing. They were in denial, avoiding facing up to what had happened, and symbolically, they came back empty-handed – they had caught nothing. Avoidance and denial are not very productive strategies for dealing with life's crises.

Then Jesus enters the scene. Significantly, the night is over and the dawn has broken. Light is always symbolic in John's Gospel, and although at first the disciples don't recognize him, the presence of Jesus signals the end of the darkness and the dawn of a new day for them. He helps them find what they have been looking for – not simply fish, but a way of moving forward out of their state of shock and grief, a way of moving from denial to acceptance, from disbelief to faith, of moving out of death to perceiving the truth of the resurrection. The penny drops – “It is the Lord” – and typically, it is the impetuous Peter who plunges straight in to reach Jesus.

The scene which follows illustrates how Jesus helps Peter to move forward. He gently leads Peter to face up to his past. Perhaps the easiest thing would have been for Jesus to have glossed over Peter's threefold denial. But Jesus knows that if Peter is to move on, he needs to confront his past and grow from it. So, gathered around a charcoal fire, reminiscent of the charcoal fire at which Peter had stood the night he denied Christ, Jesus gently begins the healing process. He knows that Peter's denials would have been eating away inside him, and so he gives Peter a chance to be redeemed, to make good the past. Jesus isn't making Peter sweat it out by his questioning, he is actually helping Peter overcome the wound that he had inflicted on himself, pouring in his forgiveness and healing. This time Peter is able to make more than a merely impetuous profession of love; he makes a deep commitment. This is what Christ elicits from Peter – for Peter's sake – so that Peter will be able to face his future without running away again, without denying the Lord he loves.

In our own lives, we meet situations which cause us shock, which we find hard to accept or deal with. There are things in the past of each one of us which are painful and in need of healing or forgiveness. If we try to avoid them and just focus on the superficialities of our daily lives, these wounds will eat away inside us. They will keep us in the tomb of denial, anger, despair, darkness. We will remain dead inside. But if, like the beloved disciple, we can recognize the presence of the Lord, he will help us face our problems and heal our wounds, as he helped Peter. We find in Christ not condemnation and recrimination, but forgiveness and acceptance of who we are. He is the light which can dispel our inner darkness, the hope which drives away despair. And if, like Peter, we can commit ourselves in love to Christ, he will invite us to follow him and to exercise a loving, pastoral responsibility towards others: “Feed my sheep”. This will undoubtedly lead us to the cross – but the future need hold no terror for us, for the cross always leads us to the light of the resurrection.

When we do glimpse it in the blazing appearance of a charismatic preacher, the gentle eyes of a wise elder, or even the loveliness of a stranger, it stirs in us a longing to learn more, to grow closer, perhaps even to follow. The angelic look isn't reserved for the seraphic among us. We cultivate a heavenly appearance by keeping our gaze on God's beautiful will—just as Saint Stephen did.

Scout's honor

The Boy Scout Law contains 12 points, the first of which states that a scout is trustworthy. *BoyScoutTrail.com* describes the quality in this way: "Being 'Worthy of Trust' means a promise made is a promise fulfilled. It means a scout will do what he says he will do. It means the scout will see things through to the end." Not a bad character trait at all, is it? We are blessed to have a trustworthy God. Let's "be prepared" every day to follow suit.

WEDNESDAY, APRIL 21
FEAST OF ANSELM, BISHOP, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH
Who do you say that he is?

Saint Anselm was a Benedictine monk, archbishop of Canterbury, and a scholar during the 11th and 12th centuries. He is also honored as a doctor of the church and is best known for using reason to prove the existence of God. Throughout his many scholarly writings there are also beautiful prayers, including ones that use different images to speak of God. In *Prayer to Saint Paul* Anselm wrote: "And you, Jesus, are you not also a mother? Are you not that mother who, like a hen, gathers her chicks under her wings?" How does this image of Jesus as

mother speak to you? What other images do you have of God?

Fill up on the bread

Pop quiz on biblical history: What is *manna*? Sorry, it's not the name of an ancient Middle Eastern band or a slang greeting among the Israelites. *Manna* was a sweet-tasting food that, according to accounts of the Exodus, came down from heaven as the morning dew evaporated and nourished the Jewish people during their long desert sojourn. What can manna do for us today? It provides a powerful symbol of the truth, then as now, that *God provides*. Jesus is the living bread that has come down from heaven and offers eternal life—a never-ending feast!

FRIDAY, APRIL 23
FEAST OF GEORGE, MARTYR
Role models

The human need for heroes is deep, so deep that when our assumptions about them are challenged we can become not only disappointed but angry. It may be disappointing to learn that the stories of Saint George as dragon-slayer can be traced to medieval Italian legends while George—who is honored because he gave his life for his faith—lived and died in third-century Palestine. Romanticizing the life of a hero may be good for the imagination, but it can also separate holiness from everyday life. The substance of being a good scout or a good soldier (George is patron of both) is not slaying dragons: It's choosing to be honest, fair, compassionate, forgiving, and honorable.

When in doubt, choose love

Thomas Aquinas, the church's great brain, after years of pondering and problem-solving came to this stark conclusion: "All the efforts of the human mind cannot exhaust the essence of a single fly." Of course that hasn't stopped us from trying. But Thomas' hard saying about the limits of knowledge is a good reminder for us when we're seized with doubt and disbelief. So much of what we experience we will never fully understand. Nagging questions will go unanswered, and we'll wonder about the purpose and meaning of our lives. During those times of mental and spiritual anguish, simply choose to love—love yourself, love your enemies, love life, and love God, who is love.

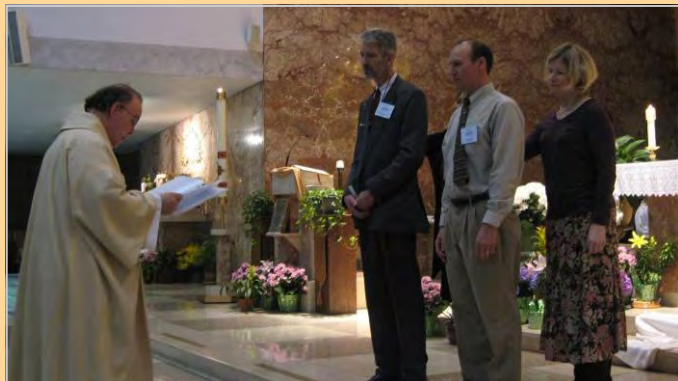
