

NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

TWENTY-FIRST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 2011

The Baltimore Catechism was an absolute “God send” for teachers, students, and priests alike for many years. From that book we could learn, in a very concise way, who and what God is. All we had to do was memorize the appropriate question and answer. So really, it was our memories that enabled us to get in touch with God. It was simple. The Baltimore Catechism was a great tool and was ingeniously constructed; however, it may have had a few drawbacks. Knowing all the answers meant that we didn’t have to think too carefully about who God was and what he meant. If we had any doubts, we just had to go through our memorized questions and answers to find the appropriate set, which would quell our doubt. The Baltimore Catechism was a wonderful thing, but it was never meant to be the end of the story.

Jesus asks a fairly innocuous question: “Who do people say the Son of Man is?” The phrasing of the question meant that the answer is out there somewhere, and that in answering it, the person responding did not have to give anything away about their own feelings or ideas. The disciples happily respond with a litany of eminent worthies. However, Jesus is quick to turn the question around and personalize it: “Who do you say I am?” Now the disciples have to show their true colors, and say who they believe Jesus to be. The Gospel tells us that “then Simon Peter spoke up”. The word “then” would suggest that there was a pause, whether brief or long, an uncomfortable few moments when the disciples sat looking at each other, praying that someone would say something. It was Simon Peter just blurting these words out, and then wondering where on earth they came from. After all, his declaration is quite stunning, to say to his friend and master, “You are the Christ, the Son of the living God.” As Jesus himself tells Simon Peter, this knowledge did not come from another human being, but had been revealed to Peter from the Father in heaven. By being with Jesus and having a personal relationship with him, Peter was open to the working of the Spirit, and thus he was open to the Father in his own life. It was on this openness and this act of faith which Peter had just made, that our Church was founded. It is probable that Peter did not fully understand what he was saying and what his act of faith might cost him in the future, but nonetheless, the faith was there and that was enough for Jesus.

If one of your non-believing co-workers asked you tomorrow, “Who is this Jesus that you believe in?” how would you respond? Is Jesus some remote figure in your life or is he a real live person who you can relate to and have a personal relationship with? Jesus reaches out to us in many ways, not least through the Scriptures, the Mass and the sacraments. Today, he is asking us the same question that he asked his disciples many years ago. He is asking you personally. He is not asking you who the Church says he is, or who the media say he is, he asks YOU. How are we going to respond?

The question is obviously a theological one, but it is not an academic one. At the end of the day, we will all have to answer that question for ourselves. Who do you say I am? Do we, like Peter, have the faith that enables us to proclaim Jesus as our Lord, as the Messiah? Many in our world are looking for and talking about a need for a messiah. Our Messiah and savior is already in our midst, as one of us. His kingdom is here now, and we are called to work for the building of that kingdom. Perhaps we could consider ways in which we can continue to build up his kingdom now, in our homes, in our parish and in our local community at large. However, we will only be able to do that if we can answer for ourselves the question Jesus put to his disciples. If our faith enables us to answer, “Yes, Jesus, you are the Christ and I believe,” then what happy people we will be.

Wonder as you wander

Poets can see the world through the eyes of a child. They are forever trying to get us to perceive the extraordinary in the ordinary: the outlines of bare trees in winter, the loveliness of a simple yellow rose, or the way a late afternoon shadow falls on a wall. We don't often see these daily miracles without prompting; their very familiarity renders them all but invisible. As the poet John Donne observed, "Nay, the ordinary things in Nature would be greater miracles than the extraordinary . . . if they were done but once." Being a grown-up doesn't have to mean we're hopelessly blind. Today, ask God for the gift of wonder and awe.

This idol you don't want to win

Idolatry—the worship of false gods—gets a lot of attention in scripture. Turning to other gods than God was about the worst thing the Israelites could do. Jesus spoke out about it, too, and reserved some of his harshest language for the Pharisees and scribes who valued the gold of the Temple more than the One whom the Temple wealth was supposed to serve. In other words, they made an idol out of money by putting it ahead of God. Do you have idols in your life? What is between you and God? Take some time to examine your life and if necessary rearrange your priorities.

FEAST OF ROSE OF LIMA, VIRGIN

It's always family hour

Saint Rose, who lived in Lima, Peru some 400 years ago, is considered patron saint of the resolution of family quarrels. To live the ascetic life she desired, she herself had to struggle against her family's wishes. Given the degree of family strife we hear about, witness, or perhaps even experience ourselves, no saint could be more timely for our troubled age of fractured families. One sees the evidence of wounded families at every turn—in crime and drug abuse, prison populations, among friends and acquaintances. Perhaps we, too, in our own small way, can be a "patron of family healing." Reach out to a hurting friend or relative—perhaps under your own roof—with prayer and compassion.

WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 24

FEAST OF BARTHOLOMEW, APOSTLE

Be quiet!

For all the airtime the 12 apostles receive, there are some we know precious little about! Saint Bartholomew, for example, is mentioned only four times in the Bible as merely a line item in the list of apostles. But don't let that fool you into thinking that our veneration of Bartholomew is misplaced. While tales of healing and conversion, mission trips and heroic faith are great sources of inspiration, there is also a place for the many apostles and disciples who lived faithfully yet in relative obscurity. They remind us that our own hidden acts of kindness, personal sacrifices, quiet prayers, and

humble works are infinitely valuable in the kingdom of God.

The measure of success

How do you determine how well you're doing? By having the right friends? Saint Joseph Calasanz was friends with Galileo—not a good idea at that time in the church. He was also well-born but renounced his inheritance in favor of the priesthood. Founding a community for the education of poor children, he was accused of causing social unrest by encouraging the under-classes to seek better for themselves. Considered incompetent, Joseph was removed as superior and lived to see his order, the Piarists, dissolved by the pope. After his death the order was reborn and continues its good work today. The measure of our lives is more than meets the eye.

Don't worry about dates and times

Whether it's Harold Camping and his followers who were ready to be raptured on May 21, 2011 or those who believe the so-called winding down of the Mayan calendar in December will trigger cosmic cataclysm, some people see the need to set a precise date for the end of the world. For Christians, however, the exact scheduling of The End flies in the face of Jesus' own words on the subject: "Stay awake, for you know neither the day nor the hour" (Matt. 25:13). It also ignores the fact that in a sense he *never left*: He has been, is, and will be with his people until the end of the age. If you are attentive to Christ's presence in each and every hour, you'll be ready when The Hour rolls around.

Monica is the patron of mothers of difficult children. As the mother of Saint Augustine she knew more than a little about the subject. She followed her wayward son from Carthage to Rome and Milan, all the while weeping and begging him to reform his ways. She also prayed—a lot. We know the story ends happily: Augustine was baptized and became one of the most influential thinkers in all of Christian history. Yet even Monica would probably admit it was not her crying and cajoling that helped turn her son around. It was her prayers. Being a parent is hard, to put it mildly. If you are struggling with an errant child, take a page from Monica's book and pray—a lot.

About Joplin...

We visited our son and his family in Joplin, Missouri in mid-July, and saw for ourselves the devastation that the May tornado took on that city. My son's home and his neighborhood were not affected, although people that worked with him were. It made us very sad to see stores and homes leveled, leafless trees, and much debris on the area hardest hit. St. Mary's Catholic Church and School were destroyed and just a semblance of the building stands, but the cross and the flag, symbols of hope, are still intact. St. John's Medical Center was so damaged that it is not being used. It will be rebuilt at another site. Joplin High School was also damaged as well as other schools in the affected area. When school begins in the coming week, the students displaced for the schools that were destroyed, will be assigned to other schools. We attended St. Peter the Apostle Catholic Church for Sunday Mass. Many in the congregation were from St. Mary's Church and the pastor spoke to them about having faith that things would get better. He also told the congregation that if they had items they had found from the church or school, to keep them until the pastor of St. Mary's had time to inspect them. Walmart, Walgreens and Home Depot, destroyed in the tornado, are in the process of being rebuilt. Many homes need new roofs. Many have left Joplin when their homes were totally destroyed. Last week there was a report on the weather channel, that Joplin food pantries are running out of food. There is still much to be done in that city, but the people are hopeful. Thank you for your generosity in June when you were asked to help. We appreciated the outpouring of support.

FOOD PANTRY UPDATE

Thank you for your generous donations for the August distribution of food and school supplies. Our clients were most appreciative. This summer we have experienced a rise over last summer in the number of families who need our assistance. Past history and current trends tell us that we can expect the numbers we serve to continue on this path. As Fall approaches, here are some reminders that will help our pantry keep up with the need:

- Please add an item or two for the Food Pantry to your weekly grocery list. At this time we are in need of most of our staples, including cereal, dry pinto beans, canned beans, pasta, pasta sauce, boxed sides, macaroni & cheese, canned vegetables, canned fruit, meals in a can/box, soup, canned meats, jelly, tuna, and paper products.
- We are often asked what size bags of pasta, rice, beans, etc. are best to bring. Since we do not have satisfactory facilities to break down larger bags into smaller portions, we prefer mostly 2-3 pound bags at the largest. We do give the larger bags and canned items to our larger families as supplements to their bag of staples. So all sizes are used and welcomed.
- Each month we have a “specials table” where we have extra items from which our clients choose a couple of things. Some favorites include coffee, oatmeal, juice, condiments, evaporated or condensed milk, crackers, boxed side dishes, baby food, diapers, toiletries, cleaning supplies, laundry detergent and dish washing soap. (If available, one of these extra items is also put in each pre-packed family bag.)
- Please check expiration dates to avoid out-of-date goods which we cannot use.
- These items can be dropped off in the Church vestibule in the designated food bins located in the Madonna della Strada shrine area, when you come to weekend Mass or daily, from 7:45 AM – 4:00 PM.
- We plan on having a “Share the Wealth” fresh produce drop-off in the afternoon of September 15 for the evening distribution. Watch future Canticles for drop-off times and further details.

Again, thank you for your faithfulness to this ministry, especially during the months of summer vacation.
