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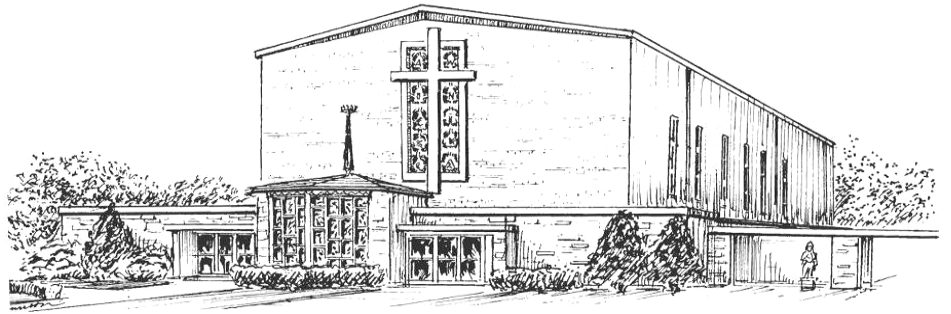



NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...



CHRISTMAS 2011

In Christian homes across the world, the crèche occupies a place of honor. People, especially children, pause to gaze on the serene figures of the itinerant couple and their child, as well as a supporting cast of angels and humans. Does this scene correspond at all to the life we live each day?

The first reading is the famous Emmanuel prophecy of Isaiah. While this text has been associated with Christmas, its origins are in the worship of ancient Israel. It was likely composed as a liturgical anthem to be sung on the occasion of the coronation of a Davidic king. As such, it expressed the enduring hope of the people that this occupant of the throne would prove to be the ideal ruler – just, compassionate, wise, and capable. The nation prayed for peace and prosperity, for autonomy and religious integrity. The second reading opens with the stirring proclamation, “The grace of God has appeared, saving all.” The passage refers to the two comings of Christ: his humble birth long ago in Bethlehem and “the appearance of the glory of our great God and Savior Jesus Christ” at the end of time, “the blessed hope” we await. Thus it unites the two poles of the Christ-event and recalls the strong eschatological thrust of Advent. The Gospel tells of Jesus’ birth and the angelic announcement of the event to the shepherds in the neighboring fields.

There is a tendency at times to romanticize the shepherds, making them noble representatives of the ANAWIM or of lowly humankind. We must remember, however, that in the ancient world shepherds were universally regarded as thieves and ne’er-do-wells. They were looked down upon as practitioners of a despised trade, like tax collectors and prostitutes. So great was the general disdain for the shepherds that Jesus had to emphasize that he was the GOOD shepherd! Their presence at Jesus’ birth, and especially their status as the first recipients of the good news of the birth of the Savior, lays the foundation for the Lucan theme of outreach to the poor and disregarded, a hallmark of his Gospel. The inescapable fact of the incarnation is that the eternal Word of God entered a world filled with stable smells and the stench of sin (in our day, a world racked by violence and war such as 9-11, terrorism, or wars in the Middle East. Sanitize this, and the incarnation is robbed of its real meaning and its power. What does this say about the extent to which God would go to redeem us in Christ? What does this say about how we are to embrace the world and its joys and its hopes?

SOLEMNITY OF THE NATIVITY OF THE LORD

Not so fast

One year during Saint Francis of Assisi's life, Christmas fell on a Friday. Knowing the holy man's love of fasting in imitation of Jesus, the brothers asked Francis if he wished them to fast even though it was Christmas. "Fast?" Francis replied. "How can we fast on the feast of the Lord's birth? Rather we should smear the walls with meat!" Obviously not a vegetarian, and perhaps prompting a little queasiness in his hearers, Francis' point was that in celebrating the God-who-becomes-flesh even the walls rejoice! Nothing is held back from the God who held nothing back from us but who embraced our whole humanity. In your joy today, in your compassion, reconciliation, forgiveness, mercy, and justice, don't hold anything back.

FEAST OF STEPHEN, FIRST MARTYR

Let your life be your witness

What does it mean to be a martyr? Does it mean to be like Saint Stephen, willing to give your very life for what you believe? The root of *martyr* is "witness," and there are many ways we are called to testify to the gospel. These can be familiar but they are no less courageous than the path Stephen took. Being a good parent, a loving partner, honest in business dealings, compassionate—these are powerful forms of attesting to the Good News. How will you testify to the gospel with your life today? On this second day of Christmas let us pray for a spirit of courage for that witness not only in words but with our lives.

TUESDAY, DECEMBER 27

FEAST OF JOHN, APOSTLE, EVANGELIST

Tell what you know

Each of us has firsthand knowledge of the presence of Christ in the world. First and foremost, in the bread and wine of the Eucharist. But not only there: We've experienced Christ in the community of the church. We've encountered Christ in the grace of many sacraments and received from his tender hands the forgiveness of our sins. We've known the love of Christ in faithful marriages and felt his healing touch in times of sickness and despair. And daily, we see Christ in the eyes of the poor. On this third day of Christmas, imitate the memorable testimony of Saint John, and tell others about your own encounters with Christ.

WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 28

FEAST OF THE HOLY INNOCENTS, MARTYRS

Light in the darkness

King Herod's order to kill every male child in and around Bethlehem under the age of 2 is surely one of humanity's most terrible moments. It's a dark story for a dark time of year. Yet darkness, whether it belongs to the whole of humanity or resides in our own soul, has much to

teach those who desire to deepen and grow spiritually. As the poet Pablo Neruda advises, "We need to sit on the rim / of the well of darkness / and fish for fallen light / with patience." On this fourth day of Christmas, let us pray for the gift of compassion and courage to explore our shadow-side so that its influence on our actions might be diminished and our inner light can shine more brightly.

THURSDAY, DECEMBER 29

FEAST OF THOMAS BECKET, BISHOP, MARTYR

Let's collect our prayers

In Catholic liturgy, a *col-lect* (stress on the first syllable) is a liturgical act that calls us to pray together in dialogue with the presider, as in the opening prayer of the Mass. From the website *CatholicCulture.org*, here is a collect we can pray together today, the fifth day of the Octave of Christmas, as we bring to mind Saint Thomas Becket, who died in defense of his faith: "O God, who gave the martyr Saint Thomas Becket the courage to give up his life for the sake of justice, grant, through his intercession, that, renouncing our life for the sake of Christ in this world, we may find it in heaven."
