
Notes from Fr. Bob...

THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD

Children singing “twinkle, twinkle little star, how I wonder what you are” are a reminder of the innocence of childhood and the way in which a child captures the wonder and mystery of the world in which we live. For children, the stars have a magical, mysterious character. For an adult, a starlit night in a dark sky can still evoke a sense of wonder. The thought of radio-telescopes penetrating the furthestmost points of the galaxy looking for dust and the presence of black holes sweeping up matter in the universe deepen the idea of the mystery in which we live. No wonder for ancient people the star pointed towards God’s activity in creation. For the wise men, the sight of the mysterious new star led them to go on pilgrimage to the Christ Child.

The second reading captures the heart of the message of Epiphany. The message of Christ is for all people; the death and resurrection of Christ saves all women and men and offers them the hope of eternal life. All are part of one body whose head is Christ. A light has shone in the darkness; through Christ there is a new meaning to human life and a new promise from God to his people.

The wise men that come bearing gifts help us to understand the person of Christ and the meaning of his birth. This birth is surrounded by mystery in the power and work of God is active. The star unites the work of God in the heavens and on earth. Three gifts point to the meaning of the person of the Christ Child. Gold is the gift which is a sign of Kingship. Christ reigns over all people as Christ the king. His kingship can be likened to a Shepherd king who cares and tends for his flock, who seeks out the lost sheep and wants to restore it to the fold. Frankincense is the gift which indicates that Jesus is the Son of God. The promise of God is fulfilled; God becomes flesh, lives among people, heals the sick and forgives sin. Myrrh is the gift which points to the fact that the Christ Child will die and be buried. He will be anointed with myrrh at burial. The feast of the Epiphany looks forward to the great celebration of Easter morning when the women come to the tomb and discover that Jesus has risen from the dead. God is triumphant over death.



The wise men worshipped and then returned home by a different route. The poet, T.S. Eliot, writes of the wise men looking back many years later and reflecting on this event. Their life had been changed. While they returned home, they were no longer at home there. The old life had lost its flavor and it seemed stale. The things that had been important now seemed unimportant. Life had been changed. They began to see life in a new way.

At the end of twelve days of Christmas celebration, we go back to our regular routine of daily life. Putting away the Christmas tree, the decorations and the tinsel is a sign of moving into the New Year. What has changed? At one level, very little. At another level, we have celebrated that the Epiphany speaks of the Good News of the birth of Christ for all people. Many images describe the Christian as a pilgrim, an alien in the world, living in the world but not of the world. The Christian will never be fully at home in the world. For Christians, as people on pilgrimage, the journey continues because there is no lasting city on earth. At the end of the pilgrimage is the joy of eternal life with God. Being a pilgrim is a reminder that the meaning of life has been turned upside-down by the birth of Christ. The Feast of the Epiphany reminds the family of the Church of its true priority; to see Christ’s face in one’s neighbor and to praise God.

Jubilee Year of Mercy

The Epiphany of the Lord January 3, 2016

In this *Jubilee Year of Mercy*, Epiphany celebrates God's mercy shining on the magi from a guiding star. Their kingdoms were far from Jerusalem, their religions far from God's covenant with Israel. At first the star led the magi to Jerusalem, where they could "recalculate" their quest with the help of God's own "GPS," the Jewish scriptures. How challenging and humbling for the magi to discover that they would find the world's Messiah not in a palace but with a poor couple in an insignificant village. That's where God's mercy, shining in the star, led the magi to worship Jesus, the Prince of Peace. Today the magi invite us to "recalculate" our life's journey during this Jubilee Year—to follow the star of God's mercy along the way of humble love, to discover a renewed personal relationship with Jesus ourselves and so become "guiding stars" leading other seekers to find Jesus, too.

The Epiphany of the Lord



LOOKING IN THE RIGHT PLACES

“Appearances can be deceiving,” as the saying goes. As we celebrate the *epiphania*, the “appearing” of the eternal Word of God on earth, this is still true.

What rapturous foresight must have filled Isaiah as he wrote the words we hear today. How, for four hundred years, they must have filled the hearts of the people of Israel with hope for the day when God’s glory would shine on them. How deceived some must have felt when the glory of God came to them in the lowliest and humblest of human lives.

We have many expectations about how the divine presence will appear among us. But we can also set ourselves up, through these expectations, to miss the divine glory when it truly appears. We get caught up in looking for the star, forgetting that the star is not the divine sign, the babe is. It may take a persistent journey for us to come upon the true appearance of God’s glory in our lives: Jesus Christ.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Over the next few weeks, if you were to stroll around Prague or Budapest or Kraków, you might see curious graffiti scratched in chalk over some doorways:

“20 + C + M + B + 16.” The families dwelling behind those doors have celebrated the Epiphany door blessing. They have gathered before the feast-day meal, probably after Mass, and the head of the family has traced the sign of the cross on the piece of chalk. Standing on a ladder, the leader traces the numbers for the new year, and the letters C M B for *Christus Mansionem Benedicat*, Latin for “May Christ bless this house.” The letters also point to the names that tradition has assigned to the mysterious magi, Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar—although scripture tells us nothing of their number, their country, or their names.

The blessing speaks of journeys ended and journeys begun at the doorway, and prays that all journeys be as satisfying as was the magi’s. It prays that the house beyond the door have the quality of love and peace that the magi marveled at when they at last arrived in Bethlehem. In some countries where the Soviet Union tried to impose a harsh atheism, the vigor of this household custom survived all efforts to erase Christian customs. In the years of struggle, the chalked blessings were a pervasive sign of defiance, and now in the light of new freedoms, they are a sign of the resilience of our tradition and the fulfillment of the magi’s quest for meaning and peace.

This year we celebrate the important milestone of 50 years of solidarity with the Church in Latin America and the Caribbean. The Church there faces many challenges, including lack of access to resources the faithful need to nourish their spiritual lives. Often, there are too few priests to meet the needs of the many communities they serve, or the communities themselves are simply too isolated to have access to other important resources for the faith. For the past 50 years, through the Collection for the Church in Latin America (CLA), you have helped the Church in 25 countries in Central and South America as well as the Caribbean to address challenges to the faith. Only with your committed support can we continue help develop evangelization and catechetical programs and fund activities that promote an encounter with Jesus Christ, so that the faithful can become missionary disciples. Your renewed support funds several ministries and projects that ensure the people in Latin America and the Caribbean can share their faith and strengthen connections with members of the church community.

In Peru, the 14 villages of Chazuta, in Moyobamba, are all located away from the city center, with the most remote only accessible by boat. The faithful in these communities do not have access to catechetical formation, and members often feel separated from the life of the universal Church. Through a grant from the Collection for the Church in Latin America, the religious congregation of the Missionaries of Jesus was able to provide faith formation, spiritual retreats, and workshops to nearly 250 people. Upon completion, participants were better equipped to help others deepen their faith

and answer questions. The program also renewed their sense of commitment to their parishes and created stronger bonds within their own families. Through this program, members of the Chazuta villages felt the love and support of the universal Church.

In the Archdiocese of Santiago de Los Caballeros in the Dominican Republic, many people are very dedicated to their parishes but do not have access to formation resources to fully understand the mission of Jesus to spread the gospel message. To address this problem, the archdiocese developed a three-stage plan to prepare people to become missionary leaders. Thanks to a grant from the CLA, the archdiocese was able to implement the first stage of the plan to provide workshops, retreats, and door-to-door missions.

Now, 90 participants are leaders in their communities. They offer formation and catechesis as well as seek out parishioners who may be interested in becoming missionaries themselves. This program strengthened both the participants' connections to the universal Church and their bonds with their neighbors and fellow parishioners. As one participant noted, "This training and course helped me, as a mother and wife, to feel loved by Jesus, to know a God that is alive, and to carry my burden each day with love, patience, and strength."

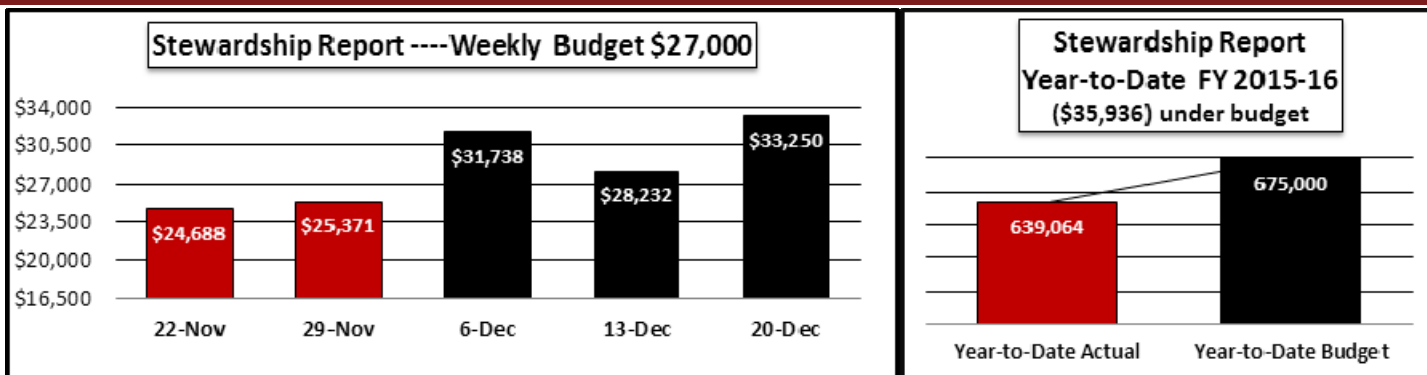
