Notes from Fr. Bob...

SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT

“A teacher once asked her class of ten-year olds:


“What would you do if one day there was a ring at your front door and when you opened it you found our Lord standing on the doorstep?” One little boy knew what he would do. “I’d run upstairs,” he said, “and I’d get the big bible from my Mom’s room and I’d hand it over to our Lord and I’d say: ‘Jesus, this is your life!’”

The boy was closer to the mark than his teacher may have realized. Of course something like three-quarters of the Bible was written before Jesus was born – it’s the part we call the Old Testament, the part which usually provides the first of our Sunday readings. Naturally, the Old Testament can’t speak directly of Jesus’ life and teachings, and yet without it our understanding of him would be impoverished; without it, his life’s story would have no context, it would seem to have been parachuted in from nowhere. We’d be meeting him in two dimensions rather than three, so to say, in black and white rather than in color. St. Paul says that “everything that was written long ago in the scriptures” – he’s thinking, of course, of the Old Testament – “was meant to teach us.” It has not lost its significance. The point is perfectly illustrated in the readings we’ve heard today.

In the first, Isaiah, who lived eight centuries before the birth of Christ, looks towards a time when God’s people will rejoice in a ruler on whom the Spirit of the Lord will rest, who will rule with justice, who will bring peace, who will fill the country with knowledge of the Lord. The responsorial psalm, also from the Old Testament of course, takes up the same theme – a coming king who will rule “from sea to sea”, who “will save the poor...and the needy” and “have pity on the weak” and in whose days “justice shall flourish”.

When we turn to the gospel, there is John the Baptist crying out: “Repent, the kingdom of heaven is close at hand.” And if the kingdom is close at hand, so too is its king, the king that was promised long ago and the promises of the old are about to be fulfilled in Jesus. And so the call goes out: Make ready for the coming of the King! Without the Old Testament we would never have known how perfectly Jesus fulfills the hopes and yearnings of men and women who lived long before him. It would be like hearing the climax of the story of our salvation without hearing the lead-in to the final chapter first.

In Advent we are invited to share in the longings and yearnings of Old Testament times so that we may



celebrate
worthily the birth of
the King at Christmas. The infant
of the stable is the fulfillment of the whole of the Old Testament, the realization of everyone’s hopes and dreams, and he is also destined to come again in glory at the end of time. We are to repent, says John the Baptist: that means that we’re to have a change of heart. It may well result in our finding a little extra time for prayer and scripture reading during these days before Christmas, but the main part of the preparation will be the way we lead our daily lives. After insisting that “everything written long ago in the scriptures was meant to teach us,” Paul sets before his readers some very practical consequences of listening to the scriptures; you must live together in harmony, he says, striving “to treat each other in the same friendly way as Christ treated you” – apparently squabbles were not unknown among the early Christians! A similar appeal is made to us today: how can we be ready to receive the Prince of Peace if we are not at peace with our brothers and sisters?

But there is something more. Paul speaks of the immense hope that the scriptures bring, for they are centered upon Jesus who is the God of hope in our midst. And so Paul concludes with a prayer – which unfortunately is not included in today’s reading – a beautiful prayer which includes in it such wonderful Christian key words as hope, joy, peace, faith, and the power of the Spirit. It’s a prayer that we might make our own on this Advent Sunday. ‘May the God of hope fill (us) with all joy and peace in (our) faith, so that in the power of the Holy Spirit we may be rich in hope’ (Romans 15:13). Amen.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Did St. Francis of Assisi invent the Christmas crib? Not exactly, but his devotion to the Incarnation and his love for the poverty of the Christ Child certainly popularized this beloved custom. Long before Francis, it was a custom at the Basilica of St. Mary Major in Rome to enshrine a rich image of Mary, gilded and bejeweled, embracing the child Jesus. This church was founded as a kind of home for the feast of Christmas in the fourth century. In 1223, Francis was ready to celebrate this feast in a new way. In the tiny city of Greccio, he asked friends to prepare a place where they could experience the poverty and suffering embraced by Christ in his birth. It was a living scene: an ox from the barn, an ass from the stable, and peasants standing in for shepherds and kings. The night of the celebration was beautiful, the weather was warm, and people came in crowds, bearing candles and singing hymns that echoed through the forest. Francis himself chanted the Gospel and preached. The custom spread quickly, and by the sixteenth century cribs were seasonal features not only in church, but in the home.

On December 17, the liturgy begins to unfold the Lord's birth before us, and it's the right time to follow this beautiful tradition. In Germany, each night throughout Advent children prepare a bedding for the manger. At bedtime prayer, a child places a single straw in the manger for each act of devotion or virtue performed during the day. If the children are good, then the Christ child will have plenty of soft bedding when he is placed in the manger on Christmas.

WELCOME TO THE GOSPEL OF MATTHEW

As we begin this new liturgical year, we will be hearing the Gospel of Matthew.

Each of the gospels is unique and in some of its content. Each gospel is shaped by the needs, the problems, and the trials and challenges of the community for which the gospel was written. Matthew's gospel was written for the Jewish followers of Jesus who had continued to attend the synagogue regularly. Matthew presents Jesus as the new Moses by having him do "Moses-like" things: he gives the people new rules of behavior—the Beatitudes; he has miraculous powers (healing, curing, forgiving); brought hope to many people. The main theme of his gospel is that "the kingdom of God is like..." a reign of peace and love, of harmony and serenity, of forgiveness and mercy.

WHAT IS TAIZE? Today, ecumenical services “in the spirit of Taizé” are held around the world. As the Taizé community explain the service: “This is meditative common prayer. Gathered in the presence of Christ, we sing uncomplicated repetitive songs, uncluttered by too many words, allowing the mystery of God to become tangible through the beauty of simplicity.” As people gather quietly in church, they pick up a worship aid and a candle. A few lit candles are surrounded by a few icons, symbols of the faith. People sit during the first few songs and then all stand and a few people (often children) come forward to light their candles which, in turn, they light the congregations’ candles. When all candles are lit, an Alleluia is sung and Scripture is read. A song follows and each person comes to the front and places their candles in the pots provided. When all have presented their candles, all sit in silent prayer for about 10 minutes. A time for sung prayers for our brothers and sisters near and far, follows, concluded by the Our Father. A final hymn is sung and all are invited to share a sign of peace.

EXTRAORDINARY MINISTERS OF COMMUNION AND MINISTERS OF CARE

On the weekend of December 17th-18th, Extraordinary Ministers of Communion and Ministers of Care will be mandated for a three year period. A mandate is an order or commission given by the Archdiocese to individuals who have completed a course of training to serve or continue serving a particular parish as a Minister of Communion. It implies a commitment on the part of the ministers to serving the parish. The pastor reviews those ministers' service who have already been mandated and authorizes their re-mandating (if already in service) or commissions new ministers to be mandated. This occurs every three years. This takes place throughout the Archdiocese on one of the Sundays of Advent marking the beginning of the new liturgical year.

A blessing will be offered for these ministers at each of the weekend Masses Dec. 17-18.


