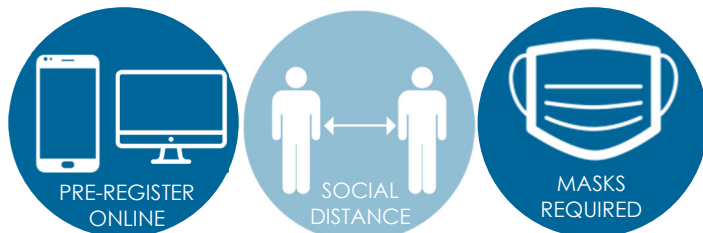

## Notes from Fr. Bob...

### MOST HOLY BODY AND BLOOD OF CHRIST

People cannot match God for faithfulness; the Covenant was constantly breached. And so Jesus came, God's own Son. The Law became a person, obedience became a relational response to a person, and the rule became love. The writer of the letter to the Hebrews deliberately describes the work of Christ as renewing, even replacing the old Covenant between God and people. The New Covenant is the person of Christ. This brings us to consider the first day of Unleavened Bread.

God's new covenant with people has gradually unfolded in the person and teaching of Christ. He is revealed as Savior in his ministry of healing, teaching, and forgiving. But the old Covenant is still in place, and people are still bound by the Law. Jesus re-states the Law, showing its heart of love. He points out that the two greatest commandments are loving God and loving neighbor, and lives these commandments to the full. He spends his final hours on earth fulfilling, in his obedience, the Old Covenant, and putting in its place the New. Only he could fulfill the demands of the Law perfectly, and so only he could bring the New Covenant into being. And only his blood could seal it.

In the upper room, Jesus took bread and wine and used them to announce his own death, and the salvation it would bring. Ever after, bread and wine, broken and poured out in his memory, would be a sign of the New Covenant between God and his people. Christ made the one, perfect offering to the Father, and enables us to share in that offering. We have nothing else to offer the Father; we could have nothing else to offer. In the Eucharist, we associate ourselves with the ultimate offering, Christ himself.

But the Eucharist is not a morbid proclamation of the sacrifice of Christ; it is a celebration of a sacrifice unto death, which brought and brings only life. The Law alone was not enough – we cannot relate to law. But when Christ himself became the sign of the Covenant, we entered into a personal, dynamic relationship with him who is our salvation.

In our Eucharist, bread and wine are signs of the New Covenant. They are signs of Christ who is the Covenant, and signs of the blood by which he sealed the Covenant. This has profound implications for us who gather around the table of the Lord to share this bread and wine. We are not people under the obligation of law; rather, we are people in a covenant relationship with God. This means that external obedience is of no importance. Obedience of the heart is what is crucial. Our commitment to the commandments of love will be manifest in our lives, and so our behavior is renewed from the inside to the outside.

Our sharing the bread and wine is a celebration and a demonstration that we are not individuals with private contracts with God, but we are a people who share a

Covenant with God. Our living of the Covenant is not private, but social; it is something we do together, with each other. We become what we celebrate: the Body of Christ, the presence of Christ in the world, and we pour out our lives in service of God and of our neighbor.

### **THE SOLEMNITY OF THE MOST HOLY BODY AND BLOOD OF CHRIST**

Today we celebrate the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. I was reading an article by Jeannie Ewing that I thought was really interesting, and wanted to share an excerpt with you. It is her journey to understanding the Eucharist:

“I was sixteen years old when the concept of the Transubstantiation became clearer to me. Until that time, I attended Mass with my parents half-heartedly and out of obligation. It wasn’t until I left my Catholic elementary school and entered public high school, riddled with all varieties of unbelievers, that I began to question what I believed and why in terms of religion.

My parents reluctantly permitted me to attend a megachurch youth group with my closest friends from school, as long as I agreed to continue attending Mass on the weekends with my family. The terms seemed mutually beneficial, so I concurred without much thought. However, the megachurch had a worship band, and I was feeling the vibrancy and zeal from the hundreds of local youth who charismatically raised their hands in praise during the service. It was like nothing I had ever experienced before.

At one point, several months into altar calls and accepting Jesus into my heart, I became disillusioned. It happened after a faint and fleeting prayer I uttered during Mass one Sunday morning. Mass felt familiar to me, but it wasn’t alive in my heart, and I knew this. All I could think of was the megachurch and the alternative Christians who seemed so fiercely and genuinely excited about God. I wanted that, and I hadn’t discovered it in Catholicism at that time in my life.

So I offered a weak petition, asking God with the sincerity of an adolescent to please *show me Truth*. I wanted to find where I belonged and claim my own Christianity, but ultimately I sought to know *truth*. This was a vital impetus of finding my way back to Catholicism. Shortly after I asked God to know Truth, my heart was restless during the megachurch worship services. *Something was missing*, but I didn’t know what that something – or *Someone* – was. The interior intensity was swelling within me, but I dared not share this with anyone, because I didn’t fully understand what was happening to me.

Then, when I could bear no more, I began to silently sob during a subsequent Sunday Mass. I was so desperate to find spiritual fulfillment and was genuinely perplexed at the lack of substance I experienced at the megachurch. Bewildered and broken, I lifted my tear-filled eyes at the precise

moment our pastor elevated the Consecrated Host during the Eucharistic Prayer. It was as if a veil had been lifted from my eyes, because suddenly I saw *Truth* with newfound clarity, and the tears of frustration transformed into tears of gratitude and joy. Peace flooded my soul as I recognized *Jesus, fully present, His Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity* in that hidden Host. I *knew* it was truly Jesus, and I had found my way back to the faith of my childhood, much to my parents’ delight.”

Teaching our children about the Eucharist is challenging, especially when many adults still have difficulty wrapping their head around the mystery that the ordinary bread and wine become Jesus – body, blood, soul and divinity. Although I don’t have all the answers, here are a few helpful hints on teaching your children about the Eucharist – the source and summit of our faith:

**Use the metaphors found in nature** - A great symbol of faith is the butterfly. There is great spiritual significance in the message of metamorphosis. The caterpillar represents the plain bread and wine before Consecration. The cocoon symbolizes the words of Consecration said by the priest *in persona Christi*, and finally, the butterfly signifies the Body and Blood of Jesus. The butterfly is no longer a caterpillar due to the phenomenal act of metamorphosis, much like the words of Consecration during the Liturgy of the Eucharist literally change the mere bread and wine into Jesus’ actual Flesh and Blood.

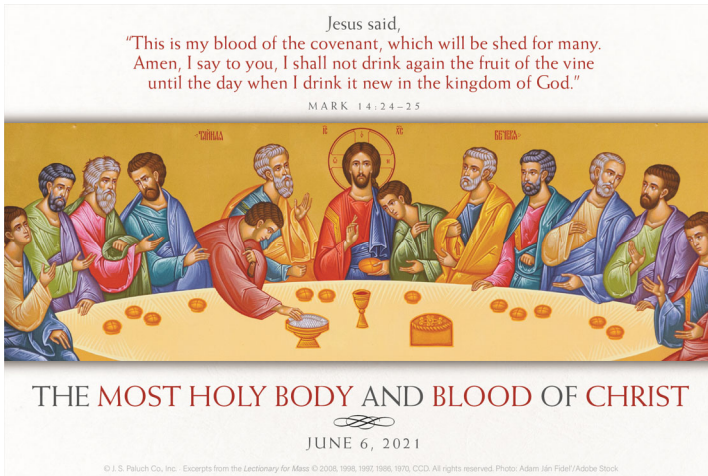
**Role-play** - It may sound strange, but allowing your children to play “Mass” at home is one of the most powerful teaching tools we can use with children. Allow your children to wear a towel as a stole and a robe for the chasuble. Allowing your children to play in this way isn’t sacrilegious. It is allowing them to learn about one of the most sacred and beautiful mysteries of our faith.

**Read Scripture together** - Reading stories related to the Eucharist are really important with our children. The Gospel of John has the Eucharistic Discourse in Chapter 6, the Gospels of Mark, Matthew and Luke tells us about the feeding of the 5,000 and the Last Supper. So many times Scripture is overlooked by Catholics, even though it is the Living Word of God. Every time we read scripture stories, they become new and alive for us.

Each of these suggestions provide opportunities for you to engage with your children about the centrality and importance of the Eucharist in our faith tradition. Don’t ever underestimate the encounter with Jesus that your child can have when you discuss the Eucharist. God provides grace in each of these teaching moments.

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## Sunday Notes



### SACRIFICE

Today the Church focuses on the Eucharist. Today's readings remind us how connected to ancient blood sacrifices we are when offering our unbloody sacrifice. The reading from Exodus describes a solemn ritual designed so the Israelites would never forget their covenant with God.

The reading from the Letter to the Hebrews turns us from those ancient animal sacrifices, the first efforts to worship the living God. Our sacrifice is the body and blood of the Son of God. Because of Christ we have a new covenant.

The Gospel from Mark retells the establishment of that covenant, the familiar story of the Last Supper. Juxtaposed with the story of animal sacrifice as it is here, we are challenged to listen with new attention, to remember the great price paid for our salvation. Jesus gave his body and every drop of his blood for us.

**First Reading** — This is the blood of the covenant that the Lord has made with you (Exodus 24:3-8).

**Psalms** — I will take the cup of salvation, and call on the name of the Lord (Psalm 116).

**Second Reading** — Christ is the mediator of a new covenant (Hebrews 9:11-15).

**Gospel** — This is my body. This is my blood (Mark 14:12-16, 22-26).

### FEAST OF FAITH

#### The *Corpus Christi* Procession

In the thirteenth century, a Belgian nun by the name of Juliana had a vision: she saw the full moon silvery and radiant except for one dark spot. The meaning of the vision was revealed to her: the moon was the Church's liturgical year, the dark spot a missing feast in honor of the Blessed Sacrament. Today's feast of *Corpus Christi*—the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ—grew from Juliana's vision.

On this feast, many parishes observe the traditional *Corpus Christi* procession, giving honor to the Eucharist by carrying this greatest treasure out of the safety of our churches and into our streets. At the end of every Mass we are not just let out, we are sent forth, strengthened by the Eucharist, to be the Body of Christ in the world. The *Corpus Christi* procession is the dismissal writ large! We take Jesus with us, not only in our hearts, but carried in our midst and exposed in a monstrance. It is a public profession of faith and a blessing of the world. Jesus walks with us on these streets that we walk day after day, among those who know him but yearn to know him better, and among those who do not know him. The Eucharist is a mystery to be believed, to be celebrated—and to be lived.

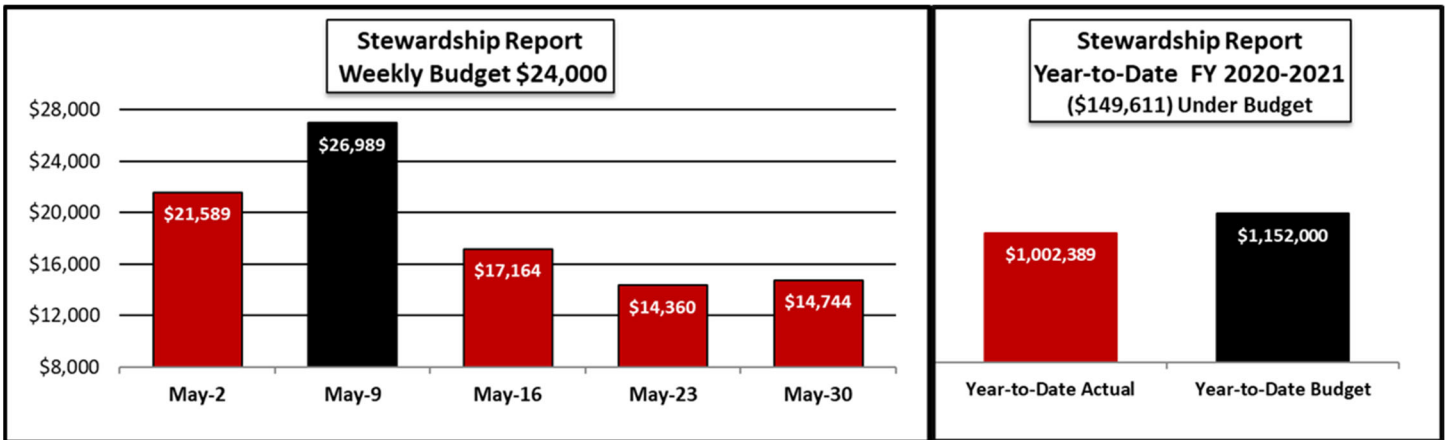
