Notes from Fr. Bob...

11TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Like other artists of his time, the Flemish Early on in the famous novel “Les Miserables”, written by Victor Hugo, we are introduced to one of the main characters, Jean Valjean. He has just been released on parole after serving a sentence of nineteen years of imprisonment in the galleys. He had been convicted of stealing a loaf of bread to feed the starving children of his sister. Now he tries to rehabilitate himself in society. But it proves impossible, for everywhere he goes, as soon as he is recognized as an ex-convict, he is rejected and cast out. Finally he knocks at the door of a kindly old bishop, who receives him and shows hospitality by giving him a meal and a bed for the night. But during the night Jean steals the bishop’s silver and flees. He is arrested by the police and brought before the bishop. Instead of condemning him, the bishop pretends that he had given the silverware as a gift and in fact then adds two candlesticks, which he claims Jean had forgotten to take. This unexpected act of forgiveness and gift of great generosity gives Jean Valjean the chance to make a break with his past life.

In Luke’s Gospel, just before the verses that we read today, we are told that John the Baptist was criticized by his contemporaries for being too ascetic and not drinking wine while Jesus was attacked for being “a glutton and a drunkard, a friend of tax collector and sinners”. And today’s incident in the Gospel gives an example of this behavior. What we see is God’s kingdom breaking in as Jesus reaches out to those who are condemned by the law. Jesus is invited to a meal by Simon the Pharisee, but once he is seated at table a woman with a bad reputation gatecrashes the party and starts behaving in what the other guests believe to be a very inappropriate manner. She begins weeping over Jesus’ feet, kissing them and finally anointing them with ointment. Imagine if that happened today. Think of the embarrassment.

For Simon the Pharisee, this proves that Jesus has no real prophetic insight into the type of woman who is touching him. But Jesus catches him with a parable. Simon has to admit that a debtor forgiven a huge debt would show more love to the creditor than one who had only been forgiven a small amount. This sinful woman has been accepted, forgiven by Jesus. Such unexpected generosity releases in her those extravagant gestures of love that match God’s hospitality. She reflects the abundant grace of God, which unexpectedly breaks through boundaries that human beings seek to impose. The restraint and sobriety of John the Baptist have their place, but we are called to rejoice in the extravagant love of God who welcomes sinners and forgives them. The woman has experienced that forgiveness for her many sins and in a sense she can’t restrain her love. Simon the Pharisee, rather like the elder brother in the story of the prodigal son, does not want to celebrate God’s unlimited




forgiveness; he disapproves of it. We are invited to imitate the extravagant love of the woman and not the response of Simon.

And yet Christian communities can often respond as Simon did. We can disapprove of too much divine generosity, especially to people who seem to be breaking the rules all the time. It seems as though we think the Lord should not be too free with his graces or the supply might run out. Religion can encourage a kind of respectability that would disapprove of Jesus’ behavior and his indulgence towards the sinful woman. We might have a certain sympathy with of hard-working peasants who turned away the ex-convict Jean Valjean because he represented too much of a threat to their security. No doubt the bishop who gave him hospitality was seen as a silly old man who was out of touch with reality.

But in the Gospel Jesus shows us that God is determined to reach out to the lost sheep and share meals with sinners and tax collectors. Of course God’s love seems disruptive and even dangerous. How else do we expect to overcome the divisions and hostilities that divide families, communities, and nations in our world unless we allow God’s unlimited forgiveness to work in us, so we can witness to God’s healing love in our lives?



WHAT'S HAPPENING IN RE?



Great things grow from small beginnings!

In today's Gospel, Jesus tells a parable comparing the mustard seed to the kingdom of God. A parable is a simple story that is told to teach a lesson. Have you ever seen a mustard seed? They are one of the smallest seeds I have ever seen. A mustard seed is so small that if you were holding one in your hand and dropped it on the ground, you might not be able to find it. Even though the mustard seed is one of the smallest of all seeds, when it is planted in the ground, it grows into a plant so large that birds can perch on its branches and can even build their nests in it. I have read that these tiny seeds can produce a plant that grows ten feet high or more!

So, how is a mustard seed like the kingdom of God? Well, when Jesus first began his earthly ministry, he had no followers. The Bible tells us that Jesus was walking along the shore of the Sea of Galilee when he saw two fishermen, Peter and his brother Andrew, casting their nets. "Come, follow me," Jesus said to them. They immediately followed Jesus. As they continued on their way, they saw two other brothers, James and John, mending their nets. Jesus called them and they immediately left their nets and followed him. One by one, Jesus called his disciples until there were twelve of them. That is still a pretty small beginning. Jesus sent out the twelve and they brought others to Jesus and the kingdom of God grew. From a very small beginning, the kingdom of God has grown and grown until it has spread over the entire earth.

Jesus started growing the kingdom of God with a handful of disciples. Every follower of Jesus is a part of the kingdom and that means that you and I are a part of God's kingdom. Every time we tell someone about Jesus, or love like Jesus, or serve others like Jesus, we are helping to grow the kingdom of God. Isn't it great to know that we are like Jesus' disciples, and have an important job in growing God's kingdom?

MUSIC MINISTRY

Many of you have expressed appreciation for the fine organ music that we have been enjoying in the past few weeks. Financing of these musicians has been provided by a special donation received from an individual who attends mass at St. Cletus. The original gift was to cover music through Eastertide (May 23rd) but through a second generous donation from this same individual we will now be able to fund organists through the weekend of July 11th.

As we are not in a financial position to hire a full time Sunday organist, we have filled the masses with three (and soon to be four, maybe even five) highly qualified part-timers. Most recent to join the rotation is Michael Surratt. I hope you will enjoy reading the following summary of his marvelous career in music.

Michael Surratt began his career as a church organist at the age of twelve in his native state of North Carolina. He graduated from High School at the University of North Carolina School of the Arts in Winston-Salem, where his organ teacher was Margaret Vardell Sandresky. Mrs. Sandresky celebrated her 100th birthday on April 28, 2021.

Michael holds a Bachelor of Music degree in organ performance from Oberlin College, where he studied organ and harpsichord and a Master of Music degree in organ performance from Northwestern University. He served as Director of Music and Organist at First Congregational Church of Wilmette (1971-73), Village Presbyterian Church of Northbrook (1974-79) and Union Church of Hinsdale (1979-2011). In addition to overseeing Union Church's Music ministry, he led the Allegro Handbell Ensemble on 32 summer tours which included performances in 32 of the 48 contiguous states, Canada, Mexico, and 12 countries in Europe. Michael now serves as Organist at First United Church of Oak Park.

Michael began piano lessons at age eight and organ lessons at age twelve. He expresses deep gratitude for the many musicians and teachers who have inspired and influenced him throughout his life, but most of all, for his cousin Martha Godwin, who was the organist for 75 years at the church in North Carolina where Michael and his father were baptized, and where his paternal grandparents and many uncles, aunts and cousins are buried. Michael sat in the corner of the choir loft and watched Martha play the organ every Sunday from age 4 to 11, when he and his parents moved to another town and church where Michael eventually became the church organist. By the way, when

Michael's cousin Martha had been playing for 73 years, she was listed in the Guinness Book of Records as the organist on record with the longest tenure in the same church.

Michael has been organ soloist with the Elmhurst, Evanston, DuPage, and West Suburban Symphonies and with the Hinsdale Chamber Orchestra. He has taught at Elmhurst College, and has played organ recitals in the Southeastern and Midwestern United States and in Europe. He remains active in many musical organizations including the American Guild of Organists, United Church of Christ Musicians Association, Handbell Musicians of America, and local music clubs in Western Springs, Hinsdale, and Downers Grove. He currently serves on the Board of Directors of the Elmhurst Symphony and Agape Ringers. When not making music or quarantining because of Covid, he enjoys attending live concerts, travel of all sorts, and, in the summer, driving his 1973 Buick convertible. (*Editor's note: It's a real "boat" – see if you can spot it in the St. Cletus parking lot!*)



Sunday Notes

GOD'S TIME

We either pay attention to or ignore “clock time” as we play in the summer sun and note the earth’s tilt and the lengthening days. We live by time. We reckon time in seconds and minutes and hours, or we use broader chunks like supertime and summertime.

God keeps another sort of time. God speaks to us of “saving time,” that is, the time of salvation. This sense of time is called *kairos*, and this time is always now, always present and available, always revealing, often surprising.

This Sunday’s readings alert us to the reality and the import of God’s time. Ezekiel and the Gospel of Mark remind us that our labor and our plotting and our planning rest in God. For God takes our smallest efforts and makes of them great works. Paul points us to the “harvest” time, urges us to be watchful for its coming, and calls us to recognize that we must spend our time pleasing God.

FEAST OF FAITH

The Preparation of the Altar

The altar is the focal point of our churches. It is a sign of Christ in our midst; indeed, it has been said that “the altar is Christ” (*Dedication of an Altar*, 4). The altar is a table “on which the sacrifice of the cross is perpetuated in mystery throughout the ages until Christ comes”; but it is also the place for a festive meal: “a table at which the Church’s children assemble to give thanks to God and receive the body and blood of Christ” (*Dedication of an Altar*, 4).

Both these functions of the altar are clear in the rites for the preparation of the altar that follow the general intercessions, which remind us of the preparations we make at home for a festive meal. The deacon or altar servers come forward and, bowing, place a cloth known as a corporal (from the Latin for “body”) over the altar cloth. They place the chalice, the cup to be used in the celebration of the Eucharist, and the *Sacramentary* or *Roman Missal*, which contains the prayers of the Mass, on the altar. These reverent preparations help us to focus on what is about to happen: the sharing of a holy meal, a solemn sacrifice.
