





Notes from Fr. Bob...

TWENTY-NINTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Jesus has made his third and most detailed prophecy of his Passion. The Son of Man is going to be handed over to the chief priests and the scribes, and eventually he will be condemned to death. We might have thought that by this time the Twelve would be beginning at least to understand if not accept this message. Not a bit of it: James and John approach Jesus and want a special favor. They want positions of power. But the only thing Jesus can offer them is a share in his sufferings, to drink from the cup he will drink from and be baptized in his baptism of suffering. To any other fantasy they may have Jesus responds with stern negatives. To their initial request he replies that they do NOT know what they are asking. Again, to grant the positions they request is NOT within his power. Then, turning to the rest of the Twelve, who are muttering at the brothers' audacity, Jesus insists that the ways of the pagans, which is lording it over others, must NOT happen among them. It is not the way of the true disciples. Rather their aim must be to be of service to others, just as Jesus himself has come to be of service and even give up his life to bring about others' redemption. John and James claim to be able to follow in the footsteps of Jesus, but the events of his Passion, when "all his disciples deserted him and ran away", show that their eyes are still blinded to reality. Later, of course, the disciples will follow the road Jesus has shown them, but it will be a long learning curve for them.

If we are honest, this severe central tenet of Christ's teaching proves a long learning curve for us as well. We live in a world that loves comfort and praises the attainment of material wealth, fame and security. There are still rewards for public service, and latest figures show a remarkable percentage of people claiming to spend regular time in voluntary work in order to help their neighbor and the community in some way. But these latter people are not the ones the media constantly hold before our eyes for admiration and envy. Perhaps their lives are too unexciting and insufficiently lurid. But if we are to follow Jesus along the road to Jerusalem, then our eyes need to be focused on what we can do in service rather than on what is going to make us richer or more highly regarded. Here too there may be the temptation to wish to be seen doing good rather than a genuine concern with doing it. To keep us




we monitor whether what we are doing really helps those we are aiming to serve or whether our activities are aimed at earning us brownie points on some divine scale of our own devising. We too can be Sons of Zebedee, promising everything but really only for ulterior motives. The desire to sit on the right hand of the master dies hard, but the mixture of the stern negatives from Jesus and his constant support for the true way forward can remove even the greatest obstacles.



Our 30th shelter season began October 1st. Last year, our shelters reached 306 people over the course of 224 days for a total of 13,516 nights of shelter. 





TOO MUCH INFORMATION!

There is a common expression: "Too much information!" We usually use it when people tell us details about their lives that we don't want or need to know. Today, when James and John ask Jesus a simple question, making their request for places of honor in the kingdom, a simple answer might have been in order. Instead, as he often does, Jesus answers a question with a question; today it's about drinking the cup of suffering. Then, once the others are indignant over James and John's outrageous request, he proceeds to give them what may have been "too much information" for followers who were simply interested in the pursuit of glory. But this information, though it can sometimes seem "too much" for us, is essential for our lives as disciples. In Isaiah, in Hebrews, and in Mark today, we learn this information. It is in suffering, in weakness, in self-giving service to others, that we come to understand the kingdom. It is the information we need to find our place and come to be honored in the reign of God.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

As election campaigns move into high gear, sometimes the phrase "the Catholic vote" is heard. It's an interesting concept, since Catholics started out in this country as a very fragile group: fewer than forty thousand of us at the time of the first census in 1790, and only about 2 percent of the population by 1830. It was a priestless church for all intents and purposes, lay-led clusters of Catholics waiting patiently for the occasional visit of a priest, sustained by gathering when they could on Sunday for devotional prayer like litanies and the rosary. They tried to hold on to their ancestral faith as best they could. Archbishop Jean-Louis Cheverus told one family in Maine to "every day say your prayers on your knees with affection, and every Sunday gather to hear the Gospel, to pray in common, and to guiz the children on the catechism."

Inevitably, some became Protestant, but many more stayed Catholic from generation to generation, with very little encouragement or sacramental ministry from the clergy. Archbishop John Carroll, the first American bishop, tried to make Church law flexible: shortening the length of the fast before Communion, easing the Lenten fast, and even relaxing the rule of Sabbath rest at harvest time. Catholicism in England had been quietly sustained in this way for two centuries, and the first American Catholics carried on as had their ancestors, providing a fertile soil for the unprecedented success and phenomenal growth of the Church in our country.

Dear Parishioners,

Your associate pastor, Fr. Lorenzo Gamboa, will soon be participating in the Catholic Leadership 360 Review process. This review process is part of the ordinary structure required by Archdiocesan Policy of every diocesan priest approximately every five years. It is an opportunity for Fr. Gamboa to recognize his talents and to grow to become a better priest and pastoral minister. Selected members of the parish staff and parish leadership, your Dean, and myself will be asked to be reviewers using this instrument.

According to Archdiocesan policies lay leadership and parishioners are to be given the opportunity to recognize Fr. Gamboa's gifts and to share their sentiments about his ministry. So, we are providing a parish-wide survey as part of his review process. The survey can be easily accessed by going to the Archdiocese's web page (www.archchicago.org) and clicking on Offices and Ministries on the top panel. This will bring you to an alphabetical listing of offices. Under 'M', select Ministerial Evaluation. You will then be directed to the Ministerial Evaluation webpage. In the middle of the page, you will find "360 Catholic Leadership review for priests". The survey is available in English, Spanish, and Polish. Please click on the word 'Link' next to your appropriate language to access the survey.


