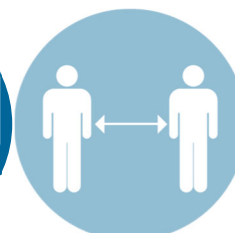

Notes from Fr. Bob...

THIRD SUNDAY OF EASTER


At some point in your life you will have met someone really special. Perhaps it was a famous celebrity from film or television. Maybe it was a sportsman or woman renowned for their world records. It could even have been an old man who, in his seventies, jumped from a plane (with a parachute), bungee-jumped from a bridge in New Zealand and learned to scuba-dive in the Bahamas. Perhaps it was somebody a little more ordinary, a next-door neighbor or friend who made a huge impression upon you. They seemed to be so alive, generous and loving, that you found their company exciting and liberating.

When these meetings occur we try to make the moment last as long as possible. We find out as much as possible in case we will never get the chance to speak to them again. Then we always want to get back home or back to work and tell everybody all about it: “you’ll never believe who I met this morning when I took the dog out!” Usually people will be interested for a little while but if we go on a little too long about this marvelous encounter our friends and family will soon begin to get bored. They may eventually try to change the subject altogether.

It is important for us to understand how others can be so disinterested in this remarkable encounter. “Why don’t you get it? This is amazing and you don’t seem too interested at all! If only you could have been with me when I met so-and-so you would be excited too!”

The disciples are huddled in the upper room and have been listening to the two disciples who met Jesus on the road to Emmaus. The lives of these two disciples were turned upside down by their meeting with the Risen Lord and they wanted the other disciples to hear all about it. What were the feelings in the room at that moment? Perhaps some were jealous that it wasn’t they who had met Jesus on the way to Emmaus. Maybe a few were still sitting in stunned disbelief – “Can this be true?” There might even have been a few who believed that what the disciples had told them was true, but were angry because they didn’t know how they could meet Jesus.

Immediately after the telling of their story Jesus himself appears in the room. He interrupts all their solitary musings and the tender emotions of that moment and wakes everybody up with his presence. Some are still slow to understand what is going on – “Is it a ghost? How do I get out of here?” But Jesus reassures them, “It is I.” And he gives them his peace. He is the same Master they had known but he is changed and glorified. The telling of the Emmaus story had set the scene and prepared the hearts of the disciples. However, the telling of their story could not substitute for the other disciples’ own meeting with the Risen Lord. They no longer need to speak about

peace of the
Risen Lord for all the
disciples now experience it for
themselves.

Each of us is called to share the Good News of the Risen Lord. A vital part of that sharing is the telling of our own experiences of God and God’s saving love for us. Yet, it is vital for us to remember that, powerful though our sharing may be, it can never truly bring someone else to faith. Only a personal meeting, an encounter, with the Risen Lord can truly bring the peace that the world cannot bring. We are bearers of Good News but it is the Lord himself who will bring the word we share to fruition.

As servants of the word we share the Good News freely, but we do not assume responsibility for everything that happens afterwards. Perhaps someone may be resistant at first to the knowledge of God’s love for them; perhaps they may even be hostile because of some past hurt. Whatever the situation, we simply share our trust in Jesus and pray that, in the fullness of time, the person may come to a personal knowledge of God for himself or herself.

The Emmaus disciples told their story and prepared the other disciples for the appearing of the Risen Lord. Let us be bold and generous in sharing the Good News we have received. Let us also be gentle, trusting that the Lord’s desire for these people to draw near to him is much stronger and more influential than our meager words.

FEMA

COVID-19 Funeral Assistance

FEMA will begin providing financial assistance for funeral expenses incurred after Jan. 20, 2020 for deaths related to coronavirus (COVID-19) to help ease some of the financial stress and burden caused by the pandemic.



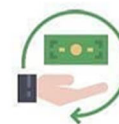
WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

- Applicant must be a U.S. citizen, non-citizen national, or qualified alien who incurred funeral expenses
- Death must have occurred in the United States
- Death certificate must indicate the death was attributed to COVID-19.



HOW TO APPLY?

- An official death certificate
- Funeral expenses documents (receipts, funeral home contract, etc.)
- Proof of funds received from other sources specifically for use toward funeral costs.



HOW ARE FUNDS RECEIVED?

- You will receive a check by mail, or funds by direct deposit, depending on which option you choose when you apply for assistance.

Greetings from the Music Ministry....

Organ music throughout Eastertide!

It is with profound appreciation that I wish to share the news surrounding the organ music that we are currently experiencing at weekend masses!

You may recall that at our weekend masses during Advent last year, we had the pleasure of prelude music which was provided by organist, Ray Horsley. Unfortunately for us (but good for him!), shortly after Christmas, Ray quite unexpectedly decided to return to Guatemala where he makes a living as a jazz pianist! (Just as an FYI...I kept the door wide open with Ray, and eventually, when he returns to the LaGrange area, he will be invited back as a guest organist! He seems agreeable to that offer!)

So, it was at Ray's last mass I announced who he was, our appreciation for his music (which was met with great applause) and how I hoped that the budget would allow for more organ music in the future.

I was extremely pleased when I was contacted in January by a parishioner who commented on how uplifting it had been to hear the organ played with such fervor and how they would like to fund a future organist...perhaps during Lent.

In discussion with Fr. Bob, it was determined that Lent might not be the best time for great organ music, but that perhaps the Easter season might be more appropriate. So, in discussion with our generous parishioner, we agreed that they would fund the refurbishing of our (quite old) organ AND cover the cost of an organist for three masses each weekend for the seven weeks of Easter, ending on May 23rd, Pentecost.

We are truly blessed as a parish to accept this generosity and I know that you all share my sincere gratitude to this anonymous benefactor!

Next week's Canticle will feature some bio information on the two organists, Kelly Dobbs-Mickus and Cathy Hlavacek, who will be "on the bench" with us until, for now, Sunday, May 23rd!

Just one more thing...please offer prayers of thanksgiving for the entire music ministry: for our cantors, extra accompanists (who played at the Parish Center on Easter), instrumentalists and our organists who have shared their talent with our Parish throughout the pandemic, especially during the Triduum and Easter weekend and continue to do so!

May God bless us all.

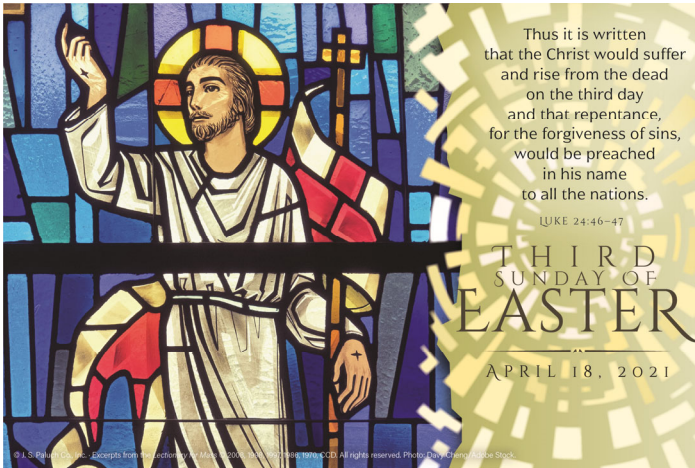

Sunday Notes



FULFILLMENT

It is interesting that during the Easter season, when we do not hear a reading from the Old Testament, it becomes so important. This is particularly true today. Peter's speech begins with a prayer formula familiar to Jews: "The God of Abraham . . ." (Acts 3:13). It likewise contains the potent phrases "Holy and Righteous One" and "mouth of all the prophets" (3:14, 18). Peter was stating in no uncertain terms that the law, psalms, and prophets had been fulfilled in Christ. This is reinforced by Jesus himself in the Gospel passage, when he states that everything in the scriptures (to the early Christians "the scriptures" were what we call the Old Testament) had to be fulfilled. Above all, Jesus and Peter both emphasize that we are witnesses to all of this, and are sent forth to bear witness to it in the world. The Latin *Missa*, from which our word "Mass" comes, means "sent" (as in "mission"). As we leave Mass today, let us remember to be witnesses to all that has been fulfilled in the risen Christ.

FEAST OF FAITH

The Second Reading

The Liturgy of the Word generally follows a consistent pattern of three readings and a psalm. The second reading is always taken from one of the New Testament epistles or the book of Revelation, and generally is not intentionally aligned with either the Gospel or the first reading.

Where would we be without these letters in which great saints and apostles like Paul, Peter, James, and John share their wisdom and pastoral good sense with the early Christian communities? It is in these letters, even more than in the Gospel narratives, that we learn what it means to be church: to live with each other, in the world yet not of the world, in these days after the Lord's resurrection. Each New Testament letter was written by a particular leader for a particular community at a particular time. We are reminded of this at the beginning of the proclamation—"A reading from the letter of Saint Paul to the Ephesians," or the Corinthians, or the Thessalonians. These texts were shaped by their particular historical and cultural context, but at the same time, through the liturgy, these letters are written to us, here, today. They speak to the realities of Christian living no matter where—or when—we live. They are truly "the word of the Lord" for us.

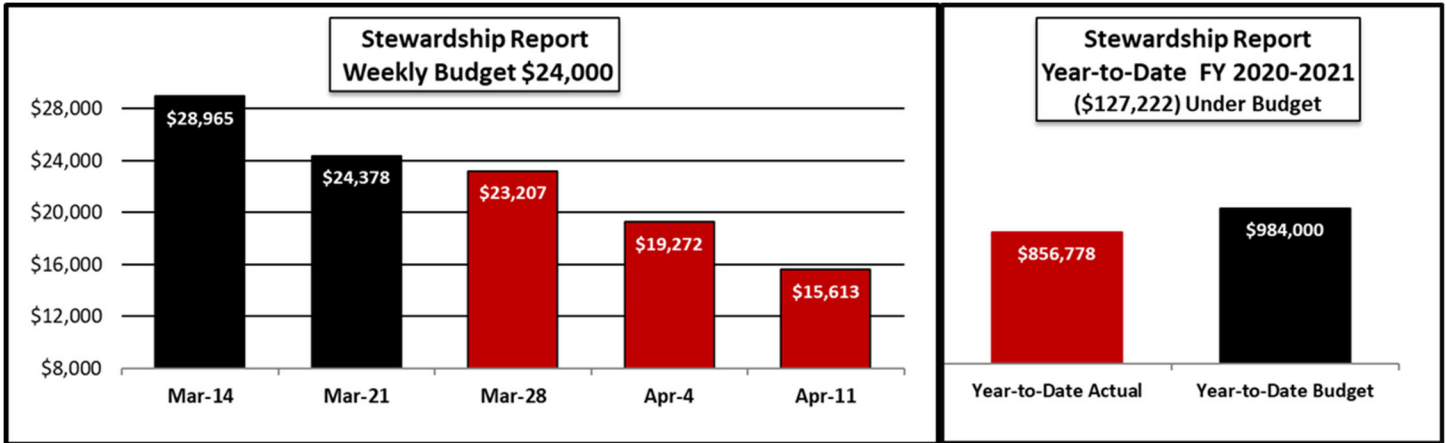

Online giving is an easy, safe and convenient way to make offertory contributions to St. Cletus. Your contribution is debited automatically from your checking, savings, or credit card account.

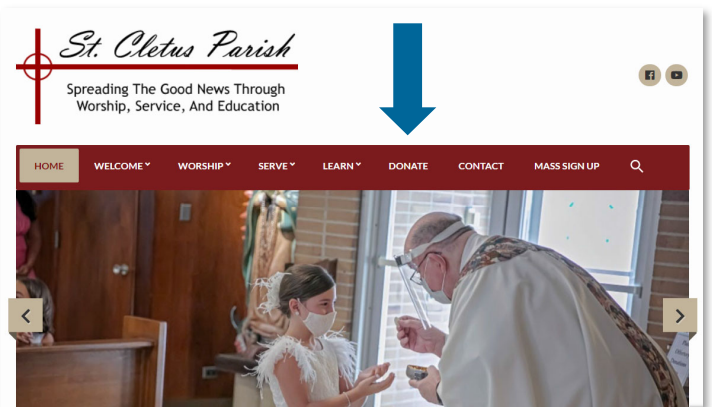
