Dear Friends,

How often do we intentionally pause and take the time to notice God in our lives? How attentive are we to our longing and search for God? How sensitive are we to the faith development and growth of our children? Children have a beautiful faith and relationship with the Lord. They have a genuine and pure love for God. When they pray, they always radiate joy, peace, and love. They love to pray. They know how to bless the Lord.

Our children are like Ezra, whom we encounter today in the first reading. He was born in 480 B.C. God chose him to be a prophet for his people. He was able to read and write, hence he was called a Scribe. He knew the law, meaning the first five books of the Old Testament. He offered accompaniment, prayers, and the love of God to those who just returned to their holy land from seventy years of exile in Babylon. Ezra knew and felt their longing for God. He prayed for half a day with them, from sunrise to noon. Notice that Nehemiah says (8:9), "all the people were weeping."

Today (1/26) at our 10:30 AM Mass we are having our monthly Family Mass. We will be praying and blessing the Lord with our children from our parish school and faith formation program who will come accompanied by their parents and family members. It will be a special moment for all of us. Together, we will hear the living word of God and be nourished by the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ. Together, we will notice and acknowledge how God continues to bless us each day. Perhaps he is inviting us to notice, thank, and pray for those who have been Ezra in our lives, the lives of our family, and parish.

A Letter from the Associate Pastor's Desk

Compassionate Care Ministry Update

Back in November, I called for a meeting for anyone who was interested in assisting in any way with the Compassionate Care Ministry. That meeting saw about 10 new people who were interested. I was pleased with that number. What has been happening since then has been admittedly slow even though the number of funerals has not decreased. Here is what I find encouraging.

Strangely, it really doesn't happen very often, some people have not been able to find time to meet face to face to plan a funeral Mass. Of the ones who was able to meet with us, I've had three times where some of the people who were at the meeting were able to sit in on the meeting with the families. I was at Hallowell and James on 55th about 10 days ago and ran into a couple of those same ministers who want to share their gift of simply being present to said families. There is still more training to do on preparing families, but that part is at least off to a good start.

Then, thanks to a couple of people who were already involved in the ministry, a couple have begun training to be sacristans for funerals. These are the ministers who work behind the scenes in setting up the items needed for the Mass – bread, wine, the chalice, the Roman Missal, lighting the coals for incensing, and other important pieces. They then simply make sure the Mass runs smoothly, being sure that the altar gets set and assisting with duties altar servers would normally do.

Our Gusher Ministry, which is a combination of being greeters and ushers for Mass, really gelled into being a crucial piece of the CCM. It was born out of the pandemic. The ushers, the way I understand, were basically already doing "double duty" in being asked to be welcomers – greeters – too. Each time the funeral team members are notified about a funeral, the gushers ministry is notified, and several will sign-up to be present. Recently, we celebrated the funeral of a woman who was a faithful attendee of the 7:15am Sunday Mass. So, some of the gushers that signed up for the funeral already minister at 7:15am on Sunday. Others attended the woman's wake service. In my humble opinion, it shows that our ministers in every ministry care about the people they see every week. Obviously, that is not only at 7:15am. Our gushers go above and beyond at all weekend Masses. What a dedicated ministry!

The last piece I want to acknowledge is the music normally provided at our funerals. There is a small version of our regular chancel choir who give of their time to sing at funerals, along with a cantor. The Good Shepherd choir (as they are known by) is yet another very dedicated group. There were a few days recently when there were about 5 voices that could be available. That's still 5 more voices than most other parishes use. And most of the members of the Compassionate Care Ministry volunteer their time and energy to be sure the family and friends are treated with respect and dignity in their grieving. The only paid employees normally in attendance are the clergy and the music accompanist. All others simply offer themselves.

In this Jubilee Year for the Church, Pilgrims of Hope, that is the heart of our CCM. I personally hope that makes your heart warm in these cold days.

Sharing Reflection of Kindness

The Gospels are rich with examples of kindness. When "Jesus is moved with pity..." that is Kindness Himself caring for fellow human beings and willing their good. There are many different stories in both the Old and New Testament where God's people show kindness. A favorite example of mine in the Old Testament is the story of Ruth. Both she and her mother-in -law, Naomi, lose their husbands. Ruth, although now a widow, unselfishly decides to take care of the widowed and elderly Naomi rather than returning to her homeland. Though Ruth was poor and from an unliked clan, she chose to stay loyal to Naomi and gave everything she had to care for her.

The Gospel reading from Friday, January 18, is one I love for its message about kindness. In my own words, the story goes like this: Jesus returns to Capernaum and is at home. So many people heard Jesus was back in town that they sought Him out at His house to be healed of sickness and problems. This healing gathering was so packed that lines stretched down the block, with no way in through the front door. The story proceeds to tell about a paralytic and his four friends. The friends, seeing the mass of people at the door, did not say, "the line is too long, we'll come back another time." Instead, these men performed a heroic act of kindness. Though the details of "how" are unclear, they somehow managed to climb onto the house, open the roof, and lower their friend to Jesus. I'm unsure what first-century Judean houses looked like, but I imagine climbing to the roof while carrying a full-grown man was a very challenging feat. Not only did their unshakeable faith in Jesus matter, but their act of kindness shows us what lengths we should go to care for our friends and neighbors.

Modern examples of people I admire who have shown incredible acts of kindness include Mother Teresa, Maximilian Kolbe, Father Michael McGivney, and Dorothy Day. But as admirable as these people are, I don't need to look any further than my own family or place of work to experience sincere acts of kindness every day. Whether it's my husband picking up something he knows I'll like at the store, the volunteer coaches who spend inordinate amounts of time with the St. Cletus School teams, the volunteer who steps up to sell concessions for home games, the volunteer who freely gives his talent to design a St. Cletus Athletics T-shirt, or the parent who raised money to buy St. Cletus new basketballs for the season – I find myself constantly blessed by the kindness shown by others.

Dear Friends in Christ,

On Christmas Eve, our Holy Father opened the Holy Door of St. Peter's Basilica inaugurating the 2025 Jubilee Year of Hope. Indeed, Christ is our Hope and in Him we place our personal hopes for the year ahead. Yet amid this call to hope, many of our brothers and sisters on the margins are experiencing great fear and anxiety. I am thinking in particular of our immigrant communities.

Much has been said of what might happen to some of our neighbors beginning in the coming weeks and months. As people of hope, it is important that we do what is right and necessary to instill confidence in those who are afraid, letting them know that the Church is with them

As the Body of Christ, we serve those in need, respecting and promoting the inherent dignity of every person who arrives on our doorstep. At the same time, parishes, schools and entities of the Archdiocese of Chicago must adhere to federal, state and local laws and regulations.

The Archdiocese of Chicago is working with the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, Catholic Charities, state and local governments and other groups to coordinate our activities of support in Cook and Lake Counties. As we are called to do, we will prioritize bringing Christ into this time of fear and uncertainty. By asking, "What is God telling us in this moment?" we help families see that God is with them, even in their fears. This approach—rooted in prayer, solidarity, and tangible action—demonstrates that the Catholic Church, through its unique resources and faith, offers a beacon of hope. Together, we bring love, accompaniment, and the reassurance that no one is alone.

Speaking this year to the ambassadors accredited to the Holy See, the Holy Father observed that migration governance needs to balance regulation with human rights and dignity. "We are quick to forget that we are dealing with people with faces and names." Pope Francis has also been clear that "the principle of safe and voluntary repatriation of those who are forced to flee must be strictly adhered to. No one should be repatriated to a country where they could face severe human rights violations or even death."

Let us continue to work together in this spirit, and be faith-filled instruments of mercy honoring the human dignity of all persons.

Plenary Indulgence for the Observance of the Jubilee of Hope Holy Year

December 29, 2024 – December 28, 2025

Pope Francis has granted special Indulgences to the faithful who observe and take part in the celebration of the Jubilee of Hope.

By participating in any Pilgrimage to the designated Jubilee pilgrimage sites, and while fulfilling the usual conditions (see below), one may gain this special Indulgence. The Pilgrimage could be by an individual, or it could be a group of the faithful from the parish. For example, a parish might organize a group to go to a particular site for the celebration of Mass, or they might organize a group to go together to a particular site for a visit.

WHAT MUST ONE DO IN ORDER TO RECEIVE THE SPECIAL PLENARY INDULGENCE?

In order to gain this special Indulgence, a Catholic is required to make sacramental Confession before or after visiting a designated Jubilee pilgrimage site (it may be fulfilled by celebrating the sacrament at the site during the parish's regularly scheduled times), receive the Eucharist at Mass before or after visiting a designated Jubilee pilgrimage site (it may be fulfilled by participating in Mass during the site's regularly scheduled times). In addition a person is to make a profession of faith and offer prayers for the Holy Father's intentions.

In addition to and in conjunction with fulfilling these conditions, one may then take part in any of the following observances of the Jubilee of Hope.

Make a pilgrimage to Holy Name Cathedral, or any one of the designated Jubilee pilgrimage sites and there participate in Mass, or the Sacrament of Penance, or take part in another liturgy or devotion (e.g., a liturgy of the word, the Liturgy of the Hours [Morning Prayer or Evening Prayer], the Stations of the Cross, the Rosary).

One may also gain the Plenary Indulgence by visiting one of the designated Jubilee pilgrimage sites and there, for a suitable period of time, engage in Eucharistic adoration or meditation before the tabernacle, concluding with the Our Father, the Profession of Faith (Nicene or Apostles' Creed), and invocations to Mary, the Mother of God.

Sites designated in the Archdiocese of Chicago can be found on the Archdiocesan Jubilee of Hope website (pvm.archchicago.org/jubilee-2025)

Those who for various reasons cannot participate in a Pilgrimage or visit, particularly the sick and people who are elderly and alone, e.g., confined to the home, those incarcerated, can obtain the Jubilee indulgence, under the same conditions if, united in spirit with the faithful who take part in person, they recite the Our Father, the Profession of Faith and invocations to Mary.


