Notes from Fr. Bob...

18TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

On April 14, 1912, at 11:40 pm, the Titanic struck an iceberg in the North Atlantic. Within four hours, this "practically unsinkable" ship lay on the seabed some 12,600 feet below. Of the 2, 228 people on board, only 705 survived. Originally, the Titanic had been designed to have 48 lifeboats on board (enough for all passengers and crew if needed). However, so great was the confidence of the ship's designers that they reduced this to just 20 lifeboats, apparently in order to prevent the decks from appearing too cluttered. This was enough for about half the people on board. The designers had got their priorities tragically wrong. They had placed appearance before safety, elegance before lives. Even as the ship began to sink, passengers were reluctant to leave the apparent security of the liner to take their chances on the open sea in small lifeboats. This meant that many of the first lifeboats to be lowered were more than half empty – a further example of misplaced confidence and wrong priorities.

When the man in the crowd asks Jesus to settle a financial dispute with his brother, Jesus refuses to get involved. He knows that the man's underlying problem isn't this particular squabble over money, but lies in his fundamentally covetous mentality. Jesus warns of the dangers of greed, which can lead us to misplace our trust. We can look to wealth and riches for security, but Jesus warns that they will not only let us down but also will lead us to get our priorities all wrong.

In the parable of the rich farmer, Jesus depicts a man who thinks that life is all about riches. Once he has more than enough, he thinks that his life is complete, that he has nothing more to worry about. He places his trust in wealth to make him happy and fulfilled. Jesus does not accuse the man of being wicked or sinful. He is simply wrong. His wealth blinds him to what is important in life and makes him shortsighted. He thinks that his life is nothing more than eating and drinking and being comfortable. He is the ultimate materialist, and in this he sells himself short. It is as if the man is only worth the sum of his possessions. He is what he owns.

And he is also blind in thinking that this life is all there is; he cannot see beyond the horizon of his own comfort now. His wealth has blinded him to his responsibilities to his neighbor and to God. He is totally self-centered. He talks to no one but himself and he thinks of no one but himself. His thoughts are all "I", "me" and "my". He has

no one to celebrate his good fortune with, and no one he wants to share it with either. His wealth has blinded and isolated him completely.

The farmer's materialist philosophy- which is so prevalent today – tells us that life is all about possessions, money, and status. It makes us poor in those very areas of life which in fact should make life worth living: love, relationships, neighborliness and hope for a future beyond death. It also robs us of our true worth as human beings. It tells us that our value is to be measured only by the size of our bank accounts. If we live like that – if our jobs, our status, our money are more important to us than our family, our friends, our own spirit, then we have got our priorities totally wrong. We work to live, not the other way round. We need money for the essentials - but making money is not the essence of life. Life is far richer than that. As the parable illustrates, money cannot save us. St. Paul tells us that greed is in fact the same ad idolatry: it is God alone, not money, who provides us with ultimate security and purpose of life.

Like the designers of the Titanic, it is easy for us to get our priorities wrong – to think in terms of what looks good, what appears attractive on the surface. And like those passengers who were reluctant to get into the lifeboats, we can be afraid to let go of what we have been told provides security. Greed blinds us to what is essential. It blinds us to our duty to God, to the needs of others and ironically, it blinds us to our own needs too. It isolates us from our community. Security is not to be found in possessions. We are rich when we put on a new self – the life of Christ. He is the only security we need.


Religious Education

Jubilee Year of Mercy (December 8, 2015 – November 20, 2016)

JUBILEE YEAR OF MERCY REFLECTION: EIGHTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

"You fool, this night your life will be demanded of you" (Luke 12:20). Hardly sounds like mercy! Unlike some contemporary rich folks, there is no indication of lying, stealing, or cheating in Jesus' parable. The rich man made a living, not a killing. Why does Jesus name him "fool"? First, because of presumption. Five times in nine verses, the rich man declares, "I shall." God's not in charge here, I am! Second, selfishness—four times, "my/ myself." No God, no neighbor; he talks to himself, about himself: my possessions, my productivity, my plans! So, instead of chasing "treasure for ourselves," Jesus and Pope Francis' Jubilee Year of Mercy bid us grow "rich in what matters to God" (12:21), namely, the corporal and spiritual works of mercy. Give food, drink, clothing, and healing; visit the imprisoned; bury the dead. Heal with Jesus' own gentleness the doubt, ignorance, and sins of others; comfort, forgive, be patient; and pray for the living and dead.

HOW TO HELP A FRIEND IN AN ABUSIVE RELATIONSHIP

Each year countless women and men are physically and emotionally abused by their partners. Chances are you know someone – sister, friend, neighbor, co-worker, etc. – who is a victim of domestic violence. And it can be hard to know what to do. Here are a few things you can do to help someone who is being abused:

Be willing to listen, without judgment. If someone tells you they are being abused the most important things are to believe them and to be non-judgmental. A few other tips for how to respond to someone who tells you they are being abused are

- Stay focused on the abusive behavior, not the abusive person
- "It is never ok to slap someone."
- Empathize and tell them it is not their fault
- "I'm sorry that happened to you. It's not your fault. You don't deserve it."
- "This seems hard for you. It takes a lot of courage to admit that someone you love is hurting you"
- Express concern
- "I'm concerned about you and your safety."
- "You sound scared. You can always call back here if you need to talk."

- Let them know they aren't alone
- "If you ever need someone to talk to, you can come here."
- "There are a lot of people who experience the same thing, you are not alone and this is not your fault."
- Provide information and options
- "Would you like the number of a domestic violence advocate that has helped others in similar situations?"

Respect their choices. Victim/survivors have been stripped of power in their relationships, so it is important to validate your friend's feelings and let her or him make his or her own choices. Furthermore, victim/survivors know how their partner will react more than anyone else. Do not intervene with the partner until you find out if it is safe for your friend to do so. Let your friend know in advance about people you need to tell so that she or he can take precautions if necessary. Tell only those you need to tell to increase the victim's safety and as required.

Focus on their strengths. Victims of domestic abuse are constantly put down by their partners and told they can't do anything right. Give them the emotional support they need to know that they are a good person. Help them find their strengths and skills. Most importantly, make sure he or she knows that they deserve to live a life free of violence.

Suggest creating a safety plan. Your friend or loved one may decide to remain in the abusive relationship. Let them know that you are concerned for their safety and help them see how dangerous the violence could become. Suggest they create a plan for themselves, and possibly their children, should their partner become violent again. This plan should include a list of people to call and possibly a pre-packed suitcase filled with essentials: clothes, money, etc.

Help them find a safe place and resources for support. Help your friend find a safe place to go in the event of an emergency. This may be a battered women's shelter or the home of a friend or family member. Gather information on domestic violence programs in your area. Make sure he or she knows that relationship abuse is a crime and that there are options and services available to them. If they are not happy with the first person or organization they contact, encourage them to reach out to another organization.

You might think that something as simple as talking to a friend about abuse couldn't possibly make a difference. But it really does. Just knowing that someone cares enough to ask about the abuse can break through the wall

of isolation that can exist around victims of relationship abuse.




ADULTS NEEDED: ENCOUNTER GROUPS
