

Each day, we are given the opportunity to acknowledge God in our lives. Each day, we have the blessing to grow in friendship and intimacy with him. Each day, we have the joy to tell others all about him. Each day, either individually or with others, we also give thanks to the Lord for his wondrous deeds in our lives, in the lives of those we love, and especially in our parish community.

As your parish priest and pastor, each day I continue to keep my eyes and my heart on the good things that the good Lord bestows upon our parish. Note From Father Mike

I give thanks and praise to God...

Next Saturday, October 28, 2023, is a very special day for me and my seminary classmates. It will mark the 23rd anniversary of our ordination to be transitional deacons for the Archdiocese. While not everything has gone according to what we might have thought ordained ministry would be like over the years, it has certainly been guided by the Holy Spirit. We can be certain of that.

Being ordained a transitional deacon simply means that (usually) at a later date, one looks to be ordained to the priesthood, whereas a permanent deacon intends on remaining a servant of the altar. Frequently, though not always, permanent deacons tend to be married men; it should be obvious (I would hope) that transitional deacons are not nor have any intent to be married. While there are many people who disagree with this rule, not only do I think it's a good rule, but it is what the Church is giving us at this time. I can't change that. Sorry.

In being ordained a deacon (whether transitional or permanent), the primary focus is to serve at the altar. The iconic image comes from the Acts of the Apostles, Chapter 6, verses 1-6. The story is of seven reputable men chosen to assist with serving with the Apostles at the altar and in the ministry of proclaiming the gospel, who, according to St. Luke (the author of Acts), were being perceived as neglecting some people. In essence, that is the birth of being deacons.

For those of us who were keeping priesthood in our view, being a deacon was an opportunity to gain necessary experience of being in a public person. It was something very foreign to most of us, and serving takes a certain grace. If you ever have a chance, go to an extra Mass on a weekend when a deacon is serving. We don't usually have someone with us. Deacon Ramon Cazales is assigned to St. Cletus' Hispanic Ministry and is very graceful. Deacon Franco Foti is our new Operations Director, whom I'm sure will help at times too. Also, very graceful. Still, if you don't get to see someone serving as deacon here at St. Cletus, I hope you research a little bit. They are trained and formed very well.

I was also great for my class back in 2000 because October 28th is the Feast of Sts. Simon and Jude, two of the first twelve Apostles. It was as if we were getting a real

glimpse of what we were looking forward to being – priests!


Over these past 23 years, I don't have to tell you just how much the world has changed. Ministry to God's people remains a real need in our world. Unfortunately, some of those who were once faithful Catholics, have left the Church or stopped coming because they were feeling like the people in the above-mentioned scene in the Acts of the Apostles – neglected by priests. On top of that, add to the equation that there are so many less priests in our world, the permanent deacons have become quite a "commodity" so to speak. No they cannot do all of the things priests can do (most commonly to consecrate and to forgive sins); however, deacons visit the sick even if they cannot anoint, bring the Eucharist to people, baptize, perform the Sacrament of Matrimony, as well as preside at funeral services outside of the Mass, and SO MUCH more. Again, I can't change what deacons can or cannot do. It's what the Church has in place for now. Who knows if it will change at some later date?

Brothers and sisters, I am so grateful to God for calling me to this ministry. He really deserves all of the credit people offer me. And Lord knows much to learn I still have (as the Jedi Master Yoda would have told Luke Skywalker). I have learned quite a bit over time and have met some of the most amazing deacons in my 23 years at my various assignments at St. George in Tinley Park from 2001-2006, Holy Name Cathedral from 2006-2008, and St. Lawrence O'Toole from 2008-2022, as well as from my home parish at St Christopher (now St. Augustine) during my upbringing in Midlothian. Don't forget the men who now serve here at St. Cletus. I've MET so many others over these years, and there are many more to meet. Grateful doesn't begin to say how blessed I have been to call many of them (along with their wives – I'm not leaving them out) true friends and ones I will never forget. Blessings and prayers,



My Faith Journey and the Eucharist

Three years ago, a series of life crises affected my immediate and extended family. One of the crises would shake me to my core especially with respect to my motherhood. I knew I had to reach out to God. I was raised Catholic, and it wasn't until this crisis that I realized how lukewarm I was in my faith.

I joined a support group for what I was going through and the first connection I made was with the Christian women's prayer group. We would pray, and afterward they would read Scriptures that were pertinent to our circumstances. I was ashamed to call myself Catholic when I knew so little about the Bible. I had a lot to learn. Little by little, I began to read the Bible. I realized why I didn't spend time in the past reading it – I didn't understand it. But now, I'd read something, and the message was so clear; my eyes were being opened to the Truth.

During this time, my father was diagnosed with acute myeloid leukemia. He had only a few weeks to live. I kicked my prayer life into high gear. I began to watch videos from Word on Fire with Bishop Robert Barron and the video series of "Explaining the Faith" made by the Marian priest, Father Chris Alar. I learned of another Marian priest, Father Donald Calloway, who made a huge impression on me. I first saw his testimony video and learned about his wayward and sadly, criminal youth. He had a powerful conversion to Catholicism and eventually became a priest. There were two significant things about him that I connected with: 1) his conversion story gave me hope that someday, by the grace of God, this crisis my family was facing would be rectified, and 2) he brought me back to a relationship with our Blessed Mother, Mary. He has written multiple books on our Lady and on the Rosary. I began to pray the Rosary every day. When I was young, my church had a grotto with a beautiful statue of the Virgin Mary. I would visit the grotto often and pray to Mary when I was lost, depressed, or upset. I felt her love and her guidance. As a got older, my devotion waned. This crisis was the catalyst to get back in relationship with her and more importantly with her son, Jesus.

One day in prayer I heard, "You were neglecting me." I took this message to mean that this crisis was a "gift". It sounds crazy to say it, but the truth of the matter was that the crisis, as bad as it is, drew me closer to Christ. I realized too that The Divine Mercy message, "Jesus, I trust in You" was a message that was the key to my getting through this crisis without feeling like I didn't have the strength to go on. I needed (and still need) to believe this message with all my heart and all my soul. Another thing I heard in prayer was Jesus' saying, "Pray the Chaplet of Divine Mercy every day for _____. I will work on ____."

About a year ago, my husband and I went to the local Catholic bookstore to purchase some books and prayer cards. We struck up a conversation with one of the sales ladies and asked her to pray for our special intention. She told us she would and asked us if we'd ever been to the Adoration Chapel or the Crypt of Saints at Visitation Parish in Elmhurst. We said we hadn't. This started a whole new chapter in my faith journey. Immediately we visited the Chapel and the Crypt of Saints. Entering the Crypt of Saints was healing. I felt the power of all these saints interceding for me and my special intention. My husband and I started to go to the Adoration Chapel a couple of times a month. Before we knew it, we were being drawn into weekly Adoration and monthly Confession. Then monthly Confession became Confession every two weeks. We began going to Mass every first Friday and promoted the Sacred Heart of Jesus in the month of June at our parish.

My faith journey and going to Eucharistic Adoration has taught me a great deal. We are to follow in Jesus' footsteps by picking up our cross daily and by doing so, we honor Him and praise Him for His immense sacrifice. Picking up our cross is our way of saying, "Yes, Your will be done." This is very hard for us because we are weak and broken. We are more often than not, riddled with sin (venial and/or mortal). I had to learn the lesson, that Jesus is hurt when we are not in a state of grace when we take Holy Communion. I blame my poor formation on not knowing this truth. The Holy Eucharist is Jesus' true body and blood – the greatest gift we could ever partake in. We must show respect and reverence for the gift; thus, the need to be in the state of grace when receiving it. Our bodies become the tabernacle and the tabernacle must be pure so as not to taint the gift of the Holy Eucharist.

There are many gifts from the Holy Eucharist. Jesus' is sharing His divinity with us. The Eucharist gives us many graces; we must be able to recognize them when they are given to us. The Holy Eucharist prepares us for the eternal banquet we hope to be partaking in after our earthly life is over. It reminds us of Jesus' sacrifice and His immense love and mercy for us. Partaking of the Holy Eucharist strengthens us and gives us resolve to reform our lives. The Holy Eucharist makes us want to be more of what God wills for us: to be humble, holy, and pure of heart. The bottom line is, the Holy Eucharist is the "Bread of Life". What does bread do for us? It nourishes us. That is why the Holy Eucharist is the source and summit of our faith. Believing that the Holy Eucharist is Jesus' body and blood, and partaking in it, in a state of grace, is to be one with God. We should all strive to do this: be one with God.


