Notes from Fr. Bob...

EASTER SUNDAY 2020

The old man had been a soldier of the Second World War, and then a coalminer. When he died, his grave was a simple place, with a black headstone, bearing his name and the dates of his birth and death. The earth itself is simply grassed over. About a year after his death his daughter came over from Germany, accompanied by her German husband, and they brought with them a beautiful black lantern, which they placed on the grave. Apparently, it is a familiar custom in Germany to adorn the graves of loved ones with lanterns, and to light candles within them on those special days in November when the dead are commemorated. How poignant, too, that a German son-in-law should place a lantern on the grave of an American soldier. Sadly they never got the chance to light the lantern on that grave, for within a few months of it being placed there, the beautiful lantern was stolen.


This stealing from graves is nothing rare these days. "Is nothing sacred?" someone asks. Apparently not. Yet it remains a most upsetting thing to have anything stolen from a grave. Our loved ones are so precious to us, and their graves are sacred places. Though they are gone from us, we tend their graves and keep them neat and tidy, just as we hold their memory ever dear in our hearts.

On the morning of Easter day, the women who went to the tomb were about to begin the process of tending the grave, by anointing the dead body of Jesus and then re-closing the tomb. How shocked they must have been to see the stone rolled away, and how much more upsetting it must have been for them to discover that the body was not in the tomb. It must have been stolen! "Someone has taken it," Mary Magdalen cried. Going back to the disciples how sad the women would have felt to bring the terrible news.

This news has to be verified, so Peter and John run to the garden where the tomb is located, and the evidence is lying there before them. Grave cloths left on the ground. Head cloth rolled up in a place by itself. What does it all mean? What has happened here? This is not the work of grave robbers. Why would they unwrap the body? No. Something stranger still than grave robbery has happened here. This is death robbery. Death has been robbed of its power. It has been robbed of its power to devastate and to destroy. Life has returned to this place, and to this world, and to our lives.

"Until this moment," the Gospel of John says, "the disciples had failed to understand the teaching of scripture, that he must rise from the dead." Some things are very hard for us to understand. Some things are outside of our experience, and some are beyond our wildest expectations. For many people some things are beyond the realms of possibility. Rising from the dead is one of those things. It just does not happen. All the evidence tells us that death is pretty final. It is the end of everything. It is our dissolution.

Acceptance of the fact of death is in many ways a mature attitude, a realistic response to the fact of our mortality. Yet there is another response, a rebellion against death, a protest, that Dylan Thomas, the poet, so eloquently expressed when he told us to "rage, rage against the dying of the light". Is it not



true that
death in so
many ways makes a
mockery of life? It is almost an insult
to all that life hoped to be, for to die is to lose life.

Now, here, on this Easter day, we have the great discovery, the great find. Life wins. Love wins. John, the beloved disciple, who was to write so eloquently of life and love, went to the tomb, "he saw and he believed". What he saw was an empty tomb, but he also "saw" more deeply into the mystery of what the empty tomb means. It means that the Lord is risen, and in him the fullness of life has been restored to us. So, even the stealing of a lantern from the grave is not the end of the world. Christ is the light of the world, a light that darkness cannot overpower. St. John saw that for himself on that first Easter morning. May that same Easter light shine on us today.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE OUTREACH

Catholic Charities Expands DV Services

Catholic Charities has taken a bold step, creating a multidisciplinary program on domestic violence at the Fr. Augustus Tolton Peace Center in Chicago's West Side Austin neighborhood. Thanks to generous donors, CC is responding to deficient health services in communities of color and expanding its work on domestic violence. Four full-time staff make up the team: director, therapist, case manager and outreach worker. Beth Klieger, LCSW, CDVF is the director, with years of experience in domestic violence counseling and child welfare. Staff is already conducting training sessions for local hospital and clinic staff to sensitize them to issues of domestic violence and acquaint them with Tolton's services. Outreach work will extend to churches, schools and other community organizations so that this underserved area will gain access to the services it needs.







REJOICE AND BE GLAD

During the first three or four centuries of Christianity, if you asked a Christian to name the feast days of the church, your answer would have been a puzzled stare, for there was only one feast: the Resurrection of the Lord. Every Sunday was a feast celebrating the one great feast. Even though our calendar now has many beautiful and holy feasts, we must continually be called back to the fact that all these other feasts exist because of the feast of Christ's passover from death to life. The psalm today proclaims this message well: "This is the day." It is not one of many days, but it is the day of all days, the one that gives all the others their origin, purpose, meaning, and destiny. Listen carefully to Peter's speech in Acts with its recollection of the Passion, to the words of the apostle Paul, and to the account of Mary Magdalene, John, and Peter finding the empty tomb, and you will hear the many wonderful works that God has done for us through Christ.

Rejoice and be glad!

FEAST OF FAITH

The Eucharist: Food for Resurrection

How do we celebrate Easter, the greatest of our Christian feasts? By doing what we do every Sunday and every day: celebrating the Mass. On the first Easter, as the heartbroken disciples walked the road to Emmaus, the Lord was with them but they did not realize it. They only recognized him "in the breaking of the bread" (Luke 22:35).

It is the same for us. In the Mass—the breaking of the bread—we meet the risen Lord together. We meet him in each other—for by our baptism into his death and resurrection, we have become members of one body, the Body of Christ. We meet him in his word—in the liturgy the scriptures are proclaimed to us, that they might take root and grow in us. And we meet him in a special way in the Eucharist, the sacrament of his Body and Blood, which is food for resurrection: "whoever eats this bread will live forever" (John 6:51). The Lord is risen indeed, and it is the Risen One who truly presides at this and every Eucharist.


