Dear Friends,

Why am I here, dear God? What am I supposed to do with the precious life you have given me? How do you want me to use and share the gifts, talents, and blessings I receive daily from you? How much longer do you still plan in keeping me around? These are some crucial questions we reflect on and ponder quite often if not daily.

Saint Augustine (354-430), after turning his life to God, spent his whole life contemplating and growing in friendship with God who was always so close to him. In The Confessions (c. 400) he writes, "You have made us for yourself, O Lord, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you." God blessed him to come to know the reason of his existence. After discovering his why, he spent the remaining years of his life helping others to come to know this amazing God. He wanted everyone to know, including us, that we were made for God and that our hearts will be restless until they rest in him.

Saint Ignatius of Loyola (1491-1556) is another excellent saint who can help us see and understand our why. In his Spiritual Exercises (1522-1524) he wrote, "Man is created to praise, reverence, and serve God our Lord, and by this means to save his soul." We were created to praise, reverence, and serve God. Wow! This is awesome. This is a very good reminder. It requires further exploration.

Simon Sinek, in his book "Start With Why" writes, "I get to wake up every day to do something I love. I get to inspire people to do the things that inspires them. It's the most wonderful thing in the world." Wow! How often do we hear something like this? Any idea? Simon is on to something here. He is inviting us to find our purpose in life, which we all have. Simon's works are worth exploring.

The talented and gifted cantors and musicians captured our full attention with their peaceful and angelical voices. A Letter from the Associate Pastor's Desk

Life is Good

Everyone in the world has some sort of motto or theme by which they live their lives. My dad's older brother (God rest his soul) lived by the above motto "Life is good." Back in the early 1980s, my own father would say "Hi. I'm Ed and I'm charming." My motto for how I try to live out my priesthood is what I have called "professional fun," which I define as "If you are not having fun in what you do for a living, you probably need to change direction." I came to this conclusion in watching my dad with his siblings, friends, workmates, and customers. Even in the darkest of times, and even when someone might have had a bad day, getting up the next day is worth the effort. Jesus had his own motto – "Love one another."

If you look throughout the gospels, this is not only what Jesus spoke about but how he lived in relation to others. I remember something from a retreat this past year which I know I have used in past articles, but recall "God is relational before He is rational." And the relation begins within himself as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. The Trinity exists before God speaks. That is such a great image for me. The Father and the Son share their love for each other in the Holy Spirit. How did Jesus himself live his life? "Love one another." Everywhere he went, even from the manger at the beginning of his life outside of the womb, he shows his love for others not only for Mary, Joseph, the shepherds, and the Magi, but for ALL people. God the Father, in the gospel for this weekend, the Father speaks to show his love for us such that Jesus loves us.

Last Sunday, I witnessed a young person (maybe 8 years old) run to the front doors of the church, and instead of just going in, he stopped and looked back to see a person getting out of their car into a wheelchair. As if it were simply all of time stopping, the young person decided to wait so that they could hold the door open for the person in the wheel chair. As I type this, I am tearing up to cry tears of inspiration. How many adults would be so aware of their surroundings to do something so selfless, let alone a child? I don't know what that child's motto or theme for life will be when they grow up, but it should be something very cool like "kindness is not an option" or "stay human – be kind." I think that would be fitting. My hope, however, would be that the child remembers that moment for the rest of their life. I hope that not only do they remember the moment but that through their example others might be inspired to do similar acts of kindness.



Sharing Reflection of Kindness

"Here, I thought you might need these," a mom said to me as she handed over a bag of gently used school uniforms in the school parking lot. This was not the first time someone gave me something I needed, even though I hadn't asked. Was there a sign on my back that said, "Mom of four young children - needs your help?" Accepting the act of charity was awkward; nevertheless, I was grateful and thanked her for the items. She was right; I did need the uniforms.



At some point, that mom must have been looking through her children's drawers, saw things that they had grown out of, and thought of me. "Yes, I'll give those to her because her children are younger and will use them," she thought. The "yes" is what lies at the center of an act of kindness. Kindness is both the recognition of a need and the willingness to do something about it. It is not only a commentary on a situation. How many times at the supermarket, with a

toddler on my hip and a baby in the cart, had I heard someone say, "Wow, your hands must be full!" How many times had I jokingly wanted to reply, "They sure are. Would you like to hold one of these kids for a bit?" Kindness is also the humility to receive someone else's help, even when that help is unbidden. Who was I to decline someone else's "yes" to generously giving of their material things when I was at the same time saying

decline someone else's "yes" to generously giving of their material things when I was at the same time saying "yes" to giving of my time as a volunteer at my children's grade school? We were both engaging in acts of kindness to each other and to the greater community. Therefore, kindness exists in both the giving and the receiving, the perception of the need and the meekness to accept assistance.

When I ponder the scripture passage about the centurion in the Gospel of Luke, I reflect not only on the centurion's great faith but on the words of the elders to Jesus: "This man deserves to have you do this because he loves our nation and has built our synagogue" (Luke 7:4-5). In other words, just in case you missed it, Jesus, this man has been kind to us. As if Jesus, in his divine wisdom, needed the info. At the heart of the elder's words, though, is a knowledge of being loved by someone. Kindness is a reminder that you are loved and compelled to love in return. What does Jesus do but recognize their acknowledgment when He goes with the elders toward the centurion's house?

At work, we have a saying in our department: see a need, fill a need. Kindness sees the need and fills it with no expectation of a return. We are all called to see the needs around us and fill them out as we are able. In this way, we keep each other's cups full.

Students are learning to let go and "Let God" work in their lives to create an environment of kindness both in and outside of their school experience.

Together, let's continue to spread kindness like confetti to everyone. Christmas Blessings and Happy New Year 2025!





Food Pantry Updates

It has been such a joy and honor to work with Colin, Luke and Dylan in the past few weeks with their project on homelessness in our community. These three young men are students at Gurrie Middle School. They first approached me while volunteering at food pantry distribution. They had some thoughtful questions about homelessness in the United States and asked if they could interview me for a school project.

Before the interview, they sent about two dozen questions that they had. I was blown away! It was clear that they had given this lots of thought and were very concerned with this issue. At a recent food pantry distribution, they surprised me with donations and this letter below.

I've been so inspired by the kindness of these young men. Their initiative to learn more about a problem and take action is exactly what we need in this world. Thank you Colin, Luke and Dylan!

Dear Mrs. Kendall Grant,

We cannot express our gratitude enough for you and your charity. It means so much to not only us at Gurrie, but all of the community, knowing that everyone can wake up to heat in this chilly winter, and food on their plates. It is so important what you guys do and there's really no way to show the amount of thanks that you deserve.

For our group project, we wanted to take on the challenge of homelessness. First, we decided to explore what homelessness really is, and how it happens. Once we got the full understanding, it was time to learn how we could help. While we looked into many organizations, we were especially intrigued by yours. We thought that the St. Cletus Food Pantry was strictly taking on food insecurity, but boy were we wrong. Throughout our experience with you, we learned that you do so much more than just food insecurity. Like how you help when people are experiencing trouble with heat, or lights. Also, helping people who cannot afford Christmas presents.

To raise money and awareness for the food pantry, we did a 50/50 raffle throughout LaGrange. We raised a grand total of \$151, and sold around 50 tickets to the residents of Spring Ave. When it came time to bring the winner their money, they decided to donate it back. We then went to the local Dollar Tree and bought 12 toiletry kits, which included a toothbrush, toothpaste, soap, deodorant and razors. Those cost around \$4 each. While we were there, an anonymous individual donated enough money to purchase 2 dozen cans of tuna and 10 boxes of cereal.

Once again, thank you, it is an honor to have you helping us with our project.


