

Pastor's Note

"Being and praying with you and together growing in friendship with Jesus Christ is my holy moment."

Dear Parishioners,

I am delighted to share with you that our Christmas celebration was exceptional and spiritually enriching. I felt joy and the power of the spirit of Jesus Christ on both days: Christmas Eve, and Christmas Day. Watching everyone praying, singing, receiving, and exchanging joy was beautiful and reassuring. Seeing our church and the Parish Center filled with parishioners on Christmas Eve was special. It was a holy moment that the Lord gave me.

On Monday, December 26, 2022, after the 8:00 AM Mass, Fr. Michael Novick, Associate Pastor, and I had an unscheduled sharing/conversation in the kitchen of the rectory as we enjoyed a cup of coffee. We talked about our Christmas experience at St. Cletus. He was touched by the way we celebrated Christmas. He was encouraged by your witness. I told him, that I was also touched, moved, and inspired. We both agreed that we are lucky to be your priests. We both are very happy and grateful to the Lord for sending us to you. As we concluded our sharing/conversation, we made the decision to share with you our Christmas homily. Please keep both of us in your prayer.

As we embrace and enjoy the new year that the Lord is giving us my prayer is that together we continue to be open and willing to collaborate with the Lord as he continues to bless our efforts to become a parish that is warm, friendly, welcoming, kind, vibrant, and loving.

Below I share with you a holy moment from one of our parishioners and a copy of my Christmas homily. Enjoy.

"I attended a Blue Christmas service at an episcopal church designed to comfort people who have experienced a loss. At one point, we were asked to silently reflect on God's love for us & focus on his presence. I closed my eyes & did feel him near me. This was a holy moment that I hope I will never forget."

"Dear sisters and brothers, Welcome and Merry Christmas! Thank you for celebrating Christmas with us. Your presence, your faith, and the love you have for the Lord is inspiring.

I believe Jesus is smiling at all of us at this moment. I am able to sense his joy as he sees all of us cherishing and celebrating his birth.

As we celebrate his birthday, he wants us to know that we are loved unconditionally by him. He wants us to receive his love. He wants us to let his love warm our hearts. He wants us to allow his love to strengthen our faith. He wants us to let his love remove from us any experience or mistake that is holding us back from receiving his love. He really wants us to know that we are loved! After letting us know that we are loved, he has two invitations for us today.

First, "Remain in my love." This is an amazing invitation. Jesus, the Son of God after letting us know that we are loved by him is inviting us to remain in his love. I am sensing that our hearts want to remain in his love. Why? Because that is not only the right thing to do but because only in his love, do we find true joy and meaning for our lives.

Second, he tells us "Share my love." Jesus wants us to share his love. He knows that many people are in need of his love, perhaps even a member of our own family. Today, he is asking us to collaborate with him in sharing his love. Jesus wants to allow others to receive his love through us. From experience we know that each time we share Jesus's love with others, we ourselves experience joy and peace in our hearts.

After being reminded by Jesus that we are loved, and invited to remain in his love, and share his love, we join the heavenly host of angels, praising God and saying: "Glory to God in the highest and on earth peace to those on whom his favor rests."

Merry Christmas!

Aided by the Holy Spirit may we continue to become aware of the manifestation of Jesus Christ in our lives and share it joyfully.

In Memoriam

POPE EMERITUS BENEDICT XVI

April 16, 1927 - December 31, 2022

Papacy:
April 19, 2005 – February 28, 2013

Joseph Alois Ratzinger was born in Marktl am Inn, Bavaria, on April 16, 1927—Holy Saturday—and baptized that same day—the first person baptized in the new Easter water. It was a sign of blessing, he wrote in a memoir, that his life from the beginning was thus immersed in the Easter mystery. He entered the minor seminary in 1939 at the age of twelve, but his studies were interrupted by World War II, when the seminary was closed and Joseph, along with most of his class, was drafted into the army at the age of sixteen.

After the war he resumed his education in philosophy and theology, and together with his brother, Georg, was ordained a priest in 1951. During the course of a twenty-year career as a professor of dogma and theology at several German universities, he earned a reputation as a gifted lecturer and learned scholar, and was present as a *peritus*, or theological advisor, at all four sessions of the Second Vatican Council.

He was ordained an archbishop in May of 1977 and elevated to the College of Cardinals a month later. He settled in Rome in 1981 and went on to become one of the most influential men in the Roman curia. Of the many offices he held, he was best known as the Prefect of the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, an authoritative advisor on doctrinal issues during his predecessor's pontificate. When he was elected the 265th successor of Peter in 2005 at the age of seventy-eight, he became the first German pope since Victor II in the eleventh century. A central theme of his papacy was the staunch defense of core Christian values against what he saw as moral decline across much of Europe. At the same time, he sought to improve relations with other religions, trying to determine if a "cultural synthesis" was possible without losing the identity of the faith while engaged in discourse with the Lutheran World Federation, Judaism, Islam, the Anglican Communion, and Christian Orthodox Churches. He also spoke out against human rights abuses and ongoing political conflicts and warfare, and advocated better protection of the environment. He called for a radical rethinking of the global economy, criticizing the growing divide between rich and poor, and pressed for a "true world political authority" to oversee the economy and work for the common good.

Ever true to his episcopal motto, "Fellow Worker in the Truth," Pope Benedict XVI's teaching and prolific writings always defended traditional Catholic doctrine and values.

On February 11, 2013, Pope Benedict XVI announced that on February 28, 2013, he would resign as supreme pontiff due to his advanced age and deteriorating health and that a conclave would be convened shortly thereafter to elect a new pope. He returned to Rome and remained there as Pope Emeritus after Jorge Bergoglio succeeded him as Bishop of Rome.

Eternal rest grant unto him, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon him.

People on the Move

Epiphany may be normally on January 6th, but the Church (especially in the United States) celebrates it on the second Sunday after Christmas. So, while it will have passed by the time you read this, there is something that I want to address.

While I was still a deacon, I was introduced to a special ministry that came to me through a former associate pastor of St. Cletus, Fr. Charles Watkins. There is an office at the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops called the Office for Migrant and Itinerant Workers which oversaw circus, carnival, Indy Car racing, and other organizations of people who make a living while traveling from town to town, state to state by various ways of entertaining people. I know that some of you have told me that you remember that Fr. Watkins' circus connection. Well, as a deacon, Charles asked me to help out one of the priests who was going to be celebrating Mass for one of the Ringling Brothers, Barnum, and Bailey Circus troops AT THE UNITED CENTER. Honestly it was pretty cool overlooking the Michael Jordan statue in the venue before Mass began (I was concentrating on Jesus at Mass, not on Jordan – HA

I haven't been with the ministry for several years now, especially after Illinois passed a law which, in essence, banned one of the most popular acts from Illinois – the elephants – after being pressured by several activist groups that were for animal rights. I was heartbroken because of my initiation into the circus world, a world unto itself. I watched just how wrong the activists were as every animal in their shows were treated with love, not abuse. Of course, there are wrong ways to train animals, but there are right ways as well. Positive reinforcement – particularly

some sort of food — is how the animals are trained. And no, they were not starved, nor beaten, nor whipped for any reason. Of course, they are wild animals too. The only time an animal's life might have been in danger was if they attacked either a trainer or if (God forbid) someone watching the show. Otherwise, like any domestic animal, when they know who loves and feeds them, they respond with love in return. Now, that doesn't get to happen and it practically was a nail in Ringling Brother's "coffin."

What so many activists fail to realize is that people who work in the traveling show industry only make their living when there is a crowd/audience to play before, and the bulk of the acts people have gone to see in the circus revolved around wild, large animals. The fact remains that more animals die in the wild because of poachers, those who are only interested in killing wild animals for sport. The world has certainly changed without Ringling Brother's around. They actually tried to put on a show primarily revolving around ice skating. What happens now? What do these families that have grown up under circus tents do to make a living? Some of those families have know the circus as their home for generations.

I ask that you pray with me this Epiphany weekend for people like the wise men who simply traveled by caravans of camels doing work for money – not for fun.






