Notes from Fr. Bob...

SECOND SUNDAY OF EASTER

One of the stranger facts of the Second World War was the survival of 1,500 Jews in the city of Berlin. It took a mixture of cunning, courage, luck and determination on their part. They were also assisted by an unexpected group of Germans, from lovers to employers who hid employees in their factories. As one employer dryly remarked: "When the penalty for hiding one is the same as for hiding seven, you may as well be hung for a sheep as a lamb." On the other hand, betrayal could come from those whom the Jews might have hoped to rely on.

As the Gestapo arrived at an apartment block, one couple, a mother and son, sought refuge with neighbors, having first taken the precaution of locking the main door. As Christmas carols drifted from inside the apartments, one after another neighbor refused. It was as though they had never known them. There was certainly no room in the inn. In the end it was a stranger, a little old lady, who ushered them speedily into her home and hid them under her bed. When the Gestapo arrived, they passed swiftly by such an insignificant and obviously law-abiding person.


At the end of it all, most of the survivors moved away from Berlin. But, as one survivor said, "What the Nazis also achieved was to make me Jewish." What in the beginning for some had been a forgotten or unheeded characteristic became not just the reason for persecution but a focal point of pride and belief.

In its original form, John's gospel concentrates the stories of the resurrection and the gift of the Holy Spirit into one chapter. Then, as it were by popular request, John tags on another final chapter, with further supportive resurrection experiences.

The summary of the earlier chapter offers concise points of reflection on the risen Lord. To appreciate them fully we have to read them against the background of the whole gospel, for their significance has already been traced for us by John in the body of the gospel text. John's gospel, more self-evidently than the synoptic gospels, is imbued throughout with the presence of the risen Lord.

The two themes which dominate today's gospel reflect the usual Johannine pattern of gift and response. Jesus appears as the bringer of peace and the giver of the Holy Spirit. What is asked in response from his followers is faith as the indispensable channel for the new life in the Spirit.

Throughout the gospel Jesus has illustrated through signs and teaching his special relationship with the Father, a relationship which enables him to bring people into a new way of living. He is recognized now in his gift of peace and in his life-giving wounds. The disciples are filled



with joy at seeing him, and he empowers them with the Holy Spirit, who will enable them to forgive sins and remove the blindfolds we put on ourselves.

The story of Thomas shows how difficult this can be if Jesus does not show himself to us. John uses this story of doubt to end his gospel with a reminder of the great need for faith. It is such faith that will enable the persecuted early Christians to discover true life in the presence of the Lord.

We can find many blocks on the path to accepting the new life of the risen Lord. There is the lack of faith which dulls our perception, preventing us from seeing God's power working through us and in his world. There is sin, depression, sometimes even despair. There is our heavy investment in secular preoccupations and our failure to make the links between them and the divine life which can be celebrated in them.

Faith is not a purely intellectual adherence to the Creed or the truths taught by the Church. It is openness of mind and heart, nourished by prayer, the sacraments and our fellowship with other believers which allow us to discern God's love at work in us and in the world. Just as the risen Lord is recognized through his gift of peace and through his wounds, so we too express our faith through the giving and receiving of peace and through the living out of our own woundedness and vulnerability.

Blessings of the Risen Lord—Alleluia!!!

Catholic Charities Expands DV Services

Catholic Charities has taken a bold step, creating a multidisciplinary program on domestic violence at the Fr. Augustus Tolton Peace Center in Chicago's West Side Austin neighborhood. Thanks to generous donors, CC is responding to deficient health services in communities of color and expanding its work on domestic violence. Four full-time staff make up the team: director, therapist, case manager and outreach worker. Beth Klieger, LCSW, CDVF is the director, with years of experience in domestic violence counseling and child welfare. Staff is already conducting training sessions for local hospital and clinic staff to sensitize them to issues of domestic violence and acquaint them with Tolton's services. Outreach work will extend to churches, schools and other community organizations so that this underserved area will gain access to the services it needs.

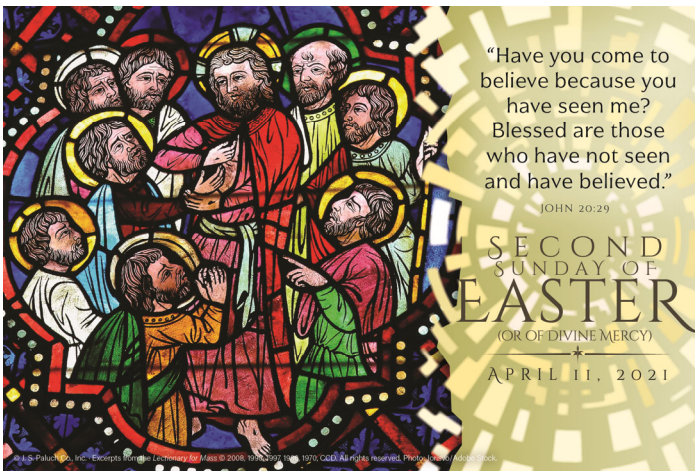

Sunday Notes



DOUBT

The desire to be able to prove the existence of a divinity has troubled humanity since human consciousness first became aware of the divine. To this very day we are fond of saying that any number of things—from sunsets to hot fudge sundaes—are “proof that there is a God.” We get so caught up in the story of “doubting Thomas” that we fail to notice that today’s Gospel gives us John’s account of Pentecost, the bestowing of the Holy Spirit upon the disciples following the Resurrection. Thomas, evidently, missed out not only on seeing the Risen Christ, but receiving the Holy Spirit as well. This is not to be taken lightly and, perhaps, makes Thomas’ disbelief a bit easier to comprehend. It also makes his professing that Jesus is his Lord and God—the only time the New Testament explicitly refers to Jesus Christ as “God”—more remarkable.

FEAST OF FAITH

The Psalms in the Liturgy

The book of Psalms is a prayer book, hymnal, and anthology of verse all rolled into one. It contains one hundred fifty ancient songs—poem-prayers that express the joys and sorrows of the Hebrew people and their longing for God. The psalms are incredibly varied in tone. Some are solemn anthems of praise that once accompanied processions of great multitudes to the temple; others record the lonely cries of a faithful soul who feels abandoned by God.

This ancient prayer book of the Hebrew people is our principal prayer book as well. The psalms are everywhere in the liturgy—in the antiphons and acclamations of the Mass, and most particularly in the responsorial psalm that follows the first reading. The psalm that is sung at Mass usually echoes the themes of the first reading, and sometimes even comments on it. On this Third Sunday of Lent, we listen to the Exodus account of the stubbornness of God’s people in the desert, and then the psalm comes to remind us: “If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts” (Psalm 95:8). In their wonderful variety, the psalms teach us how to pray.

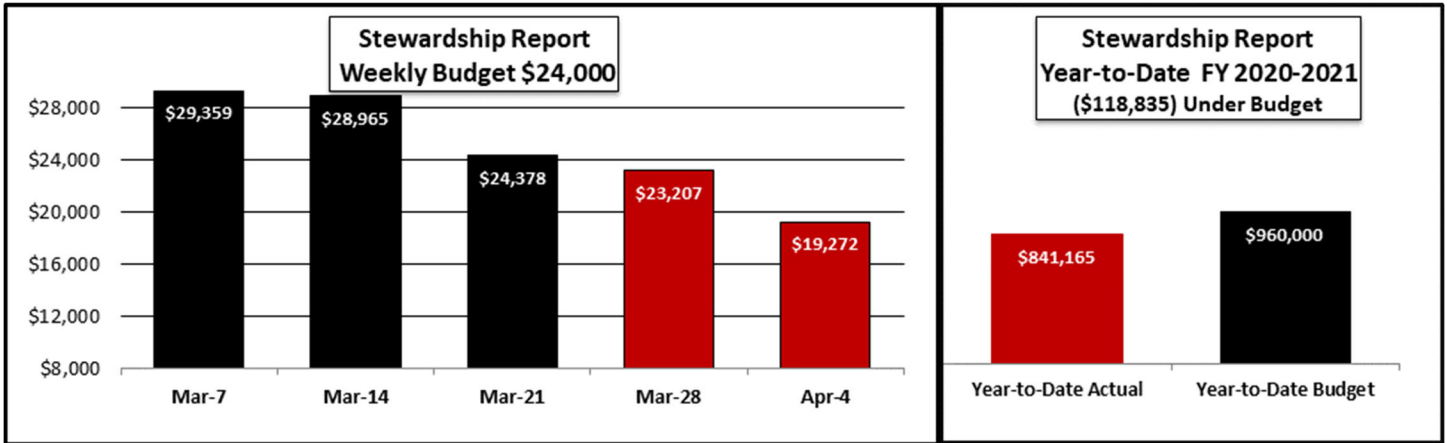
