DOMESTIC VIOLENCE OUTREACH

When we talk about domestic violence, just who and what are we discussing?

It is easy to put that "other" person over there, to feel sorry for her/him, to shun the abuser, to "tsk, tsk," about how it never used to be like this, to say "there but for the grace of God...", to stereotypically link her/him to poverty, drugs, undereducation, or certain racial or ethnic groups.

Was she just a poor judge of men? Didn't she have any backbone? How could she let her children see that going on? Why didn't her family help her? Why didn't she just leave?

Unfortunately, interpersonal and intimate partner violence isn't so simple. During October, Domestic Violence month, this space will share with you some situations and some of the many faces of violence, so you can see for yourself how complicated it can be. As you read, please pay attention to the people as you picture them in your mind, to their appearance, their ethnicity - if you notice, to their general demeanor.

MYTH: Domestic Violence is bad, but it happens elsewhere. It doesn't happen in my community, my neighborhood, my culture, my religion, or my congregation.

FACT: Domestic Violence happens to people of every educational and socio-economic level. Domestic violence happens in all races, religions and age groups. Domestic Violence happens in both heterosexual and same-sex relationships.

The grant can cover the past due rent from the previous 12 months and future rental assistance for the next three months, if deemed necessary.

CELEBRATING WORLD DAY FOR GRANDPARENTS AND THE ELDERLY



Today is the First World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly, and it is fitting that we celebrate it on the Feast Day of Saints Anne and Joachim, the grandparents of Jesus. Our Grandparents and the Elderly are cherished gifts in our society. The older generation has "seen it all", and they have lived most of their lives with unpredictable and challenging times, including this current pandemic. They are true survivors, having overcome very difficult experiences including war, droughts, fires, financial recessions, business failures and pandemics. They can certainly provide us all with some valuable wisdom and perspective in these current challenging times.

Grandparents and the Elderly offer us their personal memories. Memories help us to understand who we are, and help us to prepare for our future. Grandparents carry the collective experiences of many generations before them. That's a wealth of memories and wisdom!

The mental health of young people is enhanced by knowing their place in their own particular family's history. In today's world, social media has significantly increased the number and range of contacts of our youth, but often their contacts are limited to their own age range. The presence of the elderly in their lives can help to improve that imbalance. The elderly also benefit from our younger generation as well. Young people help their elders to keep abreast of new trends and new technologies. They help to keep elders young!

Perhaps one of the greatest gifts of Grandparents and the elderly to our younger generation is that they have the gift of time to share. Grandparents often have more time to spend with the younger generation, from offering rides, teaching them to cook or build things, reading them stories, or just having the time for interactive play. The main gift is their presence – just being present to others. Their own love and care, in combination with their

observations and life experience, are all components of making a culture of security and care for the younger generation.

It is important to recognize that the loss of faith practice of grandchildren can be a deep source of sorrow for our Grandparents and Elderly. Pray for your grandchildren. When you pray, pray with trust and pray for them by name. Tell your grandchildren that you are praying for them. Preach without words – be the kind of person you want your grandchildren to become: trustworthy, respectful, generous, and faithful. Be joyful and talk about the good that you see others do, including the good that they do.

Many Grandparents do not live near their grandchildren to be physically present with them. Here are a few suggestions for Long-Distance Grandparents:

Whats App, Facetime, Zoom... and a host of other apps are good ways to keep in touch with your grandchildren. Make sure you have a news item or interesting fact to pass on to them in your video chat. Write a note on your calendar to remind you to connect with them virtually at a regular time each week.

Texting is quick...and perfect for passing on jokes, a fun photo, a fun fact or an interesting quote. Get your grandchildren to show you how to include emojis and gifs to take your texts to the next level!

Email is so easy...and perfect for sharing an attachment from your photos, or a news item, or even an interesting story or piece of family history.


Snail mail is slow...but brings true delight to your grandchild when they receive a letter, card or care package in the mail!

ONE LORD, ONE FAITH

Do you suppose the authors of the four Gospels were aware of today's first reading from the second book of Kings? Of course they were. The prophet Elisha fed a hundred men with twenty barley loaves in order to prove God's power. This same miracle, now multiplied by more people fed by fewer loaves, is attributed to Jesus in all four Gospels. In today's passage from John we even have the detail that the loaves were barley, reminding every pious Jew of that miracle that Elisha worked. Yet Jesus went into hiding when they wanted to make him king. It is the passage from Paul's Letter to the Ephesians that gives us the reason for this. The power of Jesus comes from God. It is not meant merely to feed us, or to provide one group with a king. There is one Lord, one faith, one God and Father of all who works through Jesus Christ and through us all. Copyright © J. S. FEAST OF FAITH

The Preface Dialogue

"Lift up your hearts." "We lift them up to the Lord." "Let us give thanks to the Lord our God." "It is right to give him thanks and praise." With this ancient dialogue we enter the Eucharistic Prayer, the heart of the Mass. These venerable words have been part of the Christian liturgy almost from the beginning—by the time of Hippolytus of Rome (c. 215) they were already fixed in the liturgy.

Several times during the Mass the priest has invited us to pray. There is something different here. We are invited to be "lifted up," to ascend, to climb the Lord's mountain, as it were, to go to a new place for this most solemn part of the Mass. And we are invited to a new frame of mind, a sense of joy, of focused dedication: our hearts must not be cast down, but lifted up, and lifted to the Lord. Why? Because we are going to give thanks—we are going to "eucharist!" It is right and just that we do this.

Deacon Stuart Heyes Homily - July 11, 2021

15TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

ARE YOU CHOSEN? ARE YOU?

In today's readings and Gospel we heard a lot about being "CHOSEN"

The Jewish people were the chosen ones as we read in the OT - But they offended and disappointed God - for example in today's first reading from Amos!

God chose Amos to go to the Northern Kingdom of Israel and remonstrate with the people because of their unfaithfulness to God's covenant.

But Amaziah, the priest of Bethel, insults and dismisses him, despite Amos's protestations that as a humble shepherd and orchard keeper he had nothing to gain personally but was commissioned - "CHOSEN" by God.

So Christ in his ministry extends those Chosen to include gentiles, and no wonder given the reception He got from The Jewish leaders and indeed His own Jewish friends and neighbors in Nazareth - as heard in last week's gospel.

Who does He think He is - A carpenters son, son of Mary. A prophet is not without honor except in His native place indeed!!!

So in today's second reading Paul writes to the Ephesiians that God Chose them - to be Holy and they are blessed through Jesus Christ - because God chose them from the beginning of time.

Making it clear that in Gods plan all are equal - Jews and Gentiles - All are **chosen.**

Then in Mark's Gospel we hear what it means to be **CHOSEN** by Jesus.

Jesus not only ignores the disbelievers but he doubles down on his ministry and sends out his disciples - two by two - they are **CHOSEN** to have power over unclean spirits, to rely on the faithful for hospitality, and to make a public display of rejecting the disbelievers - "shaking the dust of their feet"

So those of us who believe in God the Father, The Son and Holy Spirit are indeed chosen. BUT we are expected to live our lives accordingly - not easy in society today.

And as I read and thought about this aspect of being **CHOSEN** - a story I read recently came to mind. It was written by Marie Armenia for the local TN paper.

To summarise - its end of time - God has had it with all the hate & division.

But Because some us believed what God said and because of His mercy we are standing in Heaven with Popes, Martin Luther, Calvin, Rabbis, Prophets, Wesleyan brothers, Evangelists, Priests, Nuns, Saints old and recent, and even a few politicians!

We look around and are surprised by some people we know that made it -God is more merciful than we could ever have imagined !! Then we realise we are there by His grace despite such un-Christian human thoughts!!! - but all thoughts of denominations and disagreements are forgotten -

We are all THE BODY OF CHRIST.

Now Its time for REWARDS CEREMONY of ETERNITY to begin.

Gabriel the Archangel steps forward and blows his trumpet and announces the reward for the most faithful servant of God goes to "Elmer Schmertz"

I didn't make this name up Fr. Elmer - it was the name in the story.

All assembled are puzzled - no-one it seems has heard of Elmer Schmertz - who is he??

And Gabriel reading their minds tells them:

Elmer wasn't famous on earth but he was famous in heaven - where it counts.

He didn't care if people knew his name - it was the name of Jesus he wanted people to know

It wasn't fame that motivated Elmer but **Love of God and Love of people**,

Gabriel continued - Love is a big deal up here - ELMER was ignored most of the time, suffered sometimes - but did what he knew God wanted him to do - all day, every day - all his life -

Yes he was a nobody on earth but up here he was famous!!

In Conclusion - some of you will have heard me say that I'm not the pope

nor a big shot TV Sports or entertainment personality


BUT I interact with many many people during my life - as we all do -
