Note From Father Mike

Eucharistic Revival

Brothers and sisters, in my homily on July 9th, I gave a short reflection on an upcoming time-period for the Church own things. Oh, we may all interpret things differently Universal. It's being called a Eucharistic Revival. It's no secret that there are less and less people in our pews on weekends. Many are saying that if people had a true sense of the Eucharist being our "source and summit of our faith," the churches might begin to show signs of life as it once had. It's very possible that is true. Still, it tends to feel like as much as bishops, priests, and deacons preach and try to teach about the Real Presence of Jesus in His Body and Blood, it's only you, the faithful, who are hearing what we are teaching.

The word "revival" can sometimes have a negative connotation to Catholics. There can be a feeling that revivals are a Protestant idea and custom. But why do Protestants have revivals? Because they seek to awaken the Spirit of Jesus within the people who attend. That is why they have stereotypically had their revivals outside and under large tents. That's why the music they play and sing is "gospel-like" and upbeat. If you can simply imagine or remember days that you felt down or needed a "shot in the arm" to find some energy, music is a great motivator. It matters not the genre nor the pace of the song. What matters is letting the music reach your soul. It could be Mozart or Metallica. It is very helpful for the soul. But music isn't the only way to reach the soul. The Eucharist, Jesus' Body and Blood, enters our own body via our mouths and nourishes the whole body AND soul. But there are many Catholics, even those who are still coming to Church on weekends, who do not believe it is truly Jesus. Many of those Catholics have been coming to Church for decades. So how do we change that?

I have heard that preaching needs to be more energetic and engaging. It needs to be more charming. It's not brainwashing, but it is a way of preparing those in attendance to open their eyes and souls to KNOW they are receiving Jesus in His fullness. Even if we are only receiving one species as we did for nearly three full years since the pandemic, the Eucharist IS Jesus present to us fully. He never holds back. Maybe that is something that our past generations of Catholics can teach us. They were required to celebrate reconciliation before receiving communion. We may not require is any longer, but it's a good practice. Fr. Elmer and I are always in the confessional on Saturday mornings at 8:30am until about 9:15 or so. I've been there as long as 10am. It tells me that there are indeed many who still see the Sacrament of Reconciliation as important. But all of the above began 2000 years ago when baptism became our foundation in Christ to build upon. Fr. Elmer has asked us all to pray about the Bible passage of the great commission to the Apostles after the Resurrection. "Go make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you." (Mt. 28:19-20a) While the commission was given

directly to the Apostles, we, their descendants, continue to

baptize and teach. So much of what we teach is **driven** into us by the Holy Spirit. It's not like we make up our when we preach, but that is why the Holy Spirit guides us to be where He knows we are needed to be at any given time or place. But it's also why we use the commissioning for you at the end of Mass. The Church has given us options in our prayer book to use for phrasing that "dismissal." I try to keep it simple by stating "Go in peace." Another that many have taken to using is "Go in peace, glorifying the Lord by your lives." Ah, but there is YOUR response too, "Thanks be to God." So you've heard the commission each week, but how often do we remember what we said?

Thus the need for "revival." More literally, it means "life again." We don't baptize more than once. We can confess as often as we need to. The Eucharist awakens the soul and nourishes it. The soul yearns to receive it. If you don't believe me, talk to someone who tried to find their relationship with Jesus in a Protestant or nondenominational church. Those who return say that what they missed was receiving the Eucharist. Ask those who returned after not practicing for some time or those who might be homebound. What do they miss the most? Receiving the Eucharist. It is their source of feeling complete and in touch with Jesus.

Ask yourself, or ask your family, what would be different if you stopped coming to Mass on Sunday? Do you think you would miss the Eucharist? Peace and all good things,







