Note From Father Mike

Easter 3 – Fulfillment

I want to begin with a great big THANK YOU to all of the liturgical ministers who helped out at the Holy Week Masses and services. It's a lot to do and to keep straight, even for those of us who are seasoned veterans. Maybe that's why they call it Holy Week - it's supposed to touch us at the very core of our souls each year. Of course, the events we celebrate ARE holy because they involve Jesus, but if we celebrate and are able to pray well for Holy Week, personal holiness should be able to grow. Again, THANK YOU, GRACIAS, GRACIE, AND EUCHARISTA. Those are the languages I know how to say it in and how to spell - English, Spanish, Italian, and Greek. I've heard "thank you" in other languages but don't know how to spell them.

I noticed something this year that I don't necessarily remember from previous years of the big three-day liturgy. If you go back and look at the Scripture readings from Holy Saturday evening, while listening this year I heard the prophet Ezekiel finish with the covenant language I had been using all of Lent this year "You shall live in the land I gave your fathers; you shall be my people, and I will be your God." It was a great tie in for all of the Old Testament readings that evening, but it was also affirming in what my focus was during Lent.

Not only that, but that in the Resurrection of Jesus from the tomb, God keeps us focused on what it means for God to keep His promises. I have heard from many people how sad they are about the state of the world and how much persecution goes on against the Church, how they can be so angry with someone else upon leaving Mass and having received the Eucharist, and, how confused they and their peers become because politics and religion are getting to A parishioner came to me after setting up for the gatherbe blurrier.

With Jesus having been raised from the dead, we need to take stock in his promise to never leave us. He is constantly walking among us, even though we believe he ascended to heaven, He does not abandon us. We are taking our cue from His example of what it means to rise.

We rise above hatred.

We rise above prejudice.

Last week (April 7th), our church was full as we welcomed Blase Cardinal Cupich, Archbishop of Chicago, to celebrate

Mass with our St. Cletus community. The Mass was celebrated in both English AND Spanish. What was so heartwarming for my soul was the amount of people that were in attendance from English-speaking and Spanish-speaking communities who came to give a glimpse into what COULD be for St. Cletus.

My understanding is that St. Cletus has offered a Mass in Spanish for many years. However, there has not been a lot of success in "mingling" the two ethnicities. My homily last weekend touched on just how Catholics and Christians don't follow last weekend's first reading that spoke of how "the community of believers was of one heart and mind." (Acts) This is not merely a a unique guandary of St. Cletus." . Ethnicities, traditions, devotions, customs, rituals, and languages tend to send real fear into the hearts of people who don't speak or practice or worship in the same way as others. I continue to watch these difficulties in every place I visit. I also know that it's not merely a disfunction in the laity, but among priests and bishops too. People have told me over and over again how confused they are about what to believe about the Church because this priest or bishop says one thing, another says differently.

How do we become one in heart and mind?

Become a community of mercy.

Mercy is a way of experiencing God's healing grace. But, as St. Augustine would tell us, you cannot give that which you do not possess. We need to experience mercy like we showed last weekend. We need to experience God's mercy, healing divisions caused by language or color of someone's skin. We are ALL God's children.

ing in the Gym after the Cardinal's Mass and said "It was the first time I experienced cooperation between our cultures. If someone came to me and said 'it might look better this way,' I said 'It does. Thank you.' Real communication and I met some new friends too." Precisely. It's a start.

Eucharistic Revival Reflection

What Does the Church Mean by In Persona Christi?

My wife and I recently watched the documentary *Jonathan & Jesus*, which follows Jonathan Roumie, the actor who plays Jesus in *The Chosen*, as he prepares for his role and discusses matters of faith with various people around the world. Throughout the documentary, we saw people encounter Roumie and speak as if he—the actor—were actually Jesus Christ. His portrayal in *The Chosen* has helped people visualize and relate to Jesus in a new, often deeper way, to the point where it can be difficult to distinguish the artwork from the reality it represents.

Jesus is portrayed in a very different way when we celebrate the Mass. When the ordained priest or bishop prays the liturgy of the Eucharist, he does so in the first person, saying the words of Jesus as his own: "This is my body...this is the chalice of my blood...do this in memory of me." Here, it is not a case of the priest play-acting the role of Jesus. Rather, Jesus is acting in the priest. It's a subtle distinction, but one that underscores that the Eucharistic sacrifice remains an act of Jesus—not something we do.

This is what theologians mean by the phrase *in persona Christi* (in the person of Christ). When the priest prays the words of institution, it is Jesus offering his body and blood in the Eucharist. The same is true in the sacrament of confession: the priest is not absolving us of our sins (only God can forgive sins!) but is acting as an instrument of Christ.

Why does this matter? To double up on our Latin, the sacraments act *ex opere operato* (by the work worked). The grace we receive in the sacraments is not contingent on the moral quality of the ordained minister performing them. Even if our priests are imperfect (and there have been some big-time sinners in the clergy throughout church history!) the sacraments remain efficacious, provided there is the proper form and matter.

Like an actor playing Jesus, we want our priests to be good models of Jesus, drawing us deeper into relationship with him. But don't forget who is at work in the sacraments—we are encountering the real Jesus, himself.


Welcome Jeanny!

This has been a huge collaborative effort from the national down to the local level. We gathered with GCFD CEO Kate Maehr, Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle, U.S. Senator Dick Durbin, La Grange Village President Mark Kuchler and other community leaders.

The vans were purchased with funds allocated by Cook County from the American Rescue Plan Act and distributed via a grant with GCFD. We are incredibly honored to have been chosen for this grant which allows us to be a Community Food Rescue Hub.

As a Hub, we help serve other pantries in our area that don't have the capacity to expand their services. Three days a week, we pick up donated groceries and products from a total of nine area retailers and deliver them to our pantry, as well as Second Baptist Pantry in La Grange, and Elsie's Pantry in Palos Hills. This has enabled thousands of Suburban Cook County residents increased access to fresh foods!

We plan to continue to grow and expand this program in 2024 and beyond, including rolling out a Home Delivery Pilot Program by the end of the year.

We could not have done this without you. **Our community support allowed us to be chosen for this grant.** Your hard work, dedication and belief in this important work allows us to continue to grow to best meet the needs of our neighbors. We are excited for the new look to the van and look forward to seeing you around town!

Fiacre Society Spring 2024 Update



As we all made it through the end of the Lenten season, the celebration of the Easter season, St. Fiacre (the patron saint of gardeners, and taxi drivers!) begins to whisper in our ears about the planting season.

This write-up will summarize the plans for the planting season of 2024. We continue with our usual planting of annuals in front of Church, in front of the Rectory and around the flagpole bed. These flowers will get installed sometime around Mother's Day, May 12, to protect against any late-season freeze. Exact dates for delivery and planting, with back-up rain dates will be published later.

The location of these annuals is in accordance with a professionally designed garden plan developed Oct. 7, 2021. This plan was designed with the request from St. Cletus and the Fiacre Society to take advantage of many of the current plants and topography, emphasizing wherever possible to transplant existing plants. The plan also was developed to plant as many hearty perennials to reduce the need for constant maintenance and planting.

This year the Fiacre Society would like to begin working on the beds along the south side of the Parish Center. We so far have nearly completed beds around the Rectory, beds in front of Church, the flagpole bed, the bed surrounding the St. Francis Statue and the beds along the east side of the Parish Center.

Finally, the main reason to communicate the Fiacre Society plans is to continue to seek your help to assist. Planting is only one of the necessary jobs to enhance these gardening efforts. We rely on volunteers to assist in addition to planting with watering, weeding, clean-up and after the fall season, removal of annuals. We cannot do this vocation without our current, dedicated volunteers. They are invaluable and we share many laughs, stories and a shared commitment to our wonderful parish. However, as the saying goes, "many hands make light work." We always seek extra helpers; green thumbs are not required. Our beautiful campus which includes our plantings continue to broadcast to others a welcoming and friendly community. Please join us!


