Notes from Fr. Bob...

OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST, KING OF THE UNIVERSE

At Monasterboice in County Louth, Ireland, the ancient Celtic cross depicts the story of the Last Judgment in graphic terms. Christ is weighing souls in a pair of scales. Those who are found worthy are seated on the right side of Christ with faces towards him, while those who are found unworthy are being prodded away by little devils with pitchforks, their faces looking aghast and facing away from Christ. The stone which has survived the weather of twelve centuries is an early means of teaching the gospel to a people who were illiterate. Only the monks and priests had access to handwritten texts of the gospel. If the cross could speak of the people who had gathered there, name those who had prayed there, witness to the history written in the fields and villages, the history of Christian people would be told.

The story told would be that of the deeds and acts of the love which were done without thinking, often unrecognized and unacknowledged. The heroes of the story would be the unknown of the history books: a woman who nursed a dying neighbor, a man who gave a stranger food and drink one cold November evening, perhaps a woman who hid a priest on the run for being a Catholic in penal times. These moments in history were sudden, brief and quickly past. They are the moments in history when the gospel was lived out.

The gospel highlights the paradox of the Christian life. Christ is met in the most unusual and unknown circumstances of life, and often in the most unlikely and unexpected people. In a world in which style and presentation are very important in advertising and images of beautiful people abound, the gospel reminds us of the anawim, 'the poor', those who can rely only on God because they have nothing and are considered by most others as nothing in the world. They are the people whose history is not written in the history books and whose tombstones, if they could afford a tombstone, are the only reminders of their lives.

Perhaps it is difficult to reconcile the story of the Last Judgment with the mercy and love of God, which is often the focus of preaching today. The feast of Christ the King celebrates God's love and justice. In the first reading, God is presented as a shepherd who cares for each of his sheep. The shepherd seeks each out, knows each by name, strengthens, heals and bandages the wounded. Christ the Good Shepherd deepens this understanding in the story of the shepherd who seeks out the one lost sheep of the hundred in the fold. He carries it home on his shoulders. To this story God's love, we are called to respond and follow in discipleship. The story of the Last Judgment is a reminder that we are called to take responsibility for our lives and that the commandment of love is the invitation to be followed. God

does not reject us, but in

freedom, we have the possibility of rejecting God and God's invitation to love. Through our actions, we can determine how God will judge us.

Christ the King presents an image of humble love and service of others. God will know our weakness and need for healing but invites us out of our brokenness to be close to the weakest in society. It is important to recognize one's Achilles' heel in order to be compassionate to others.

At the end of the Church's year and as we prepare for Advent, we are invited to take stock of our lives and recognize the action of God's grace in shepherding us throughout the last year. Can I see the times of darkness or the times when God has healed me? Are there times when God's love, through love of those around me, rescued me from darkness and despair? Do I thank God for this love?

How have I responded to the invitations with which I have been presented in the poor and weak? With gratitude let us thank God for the way we have responded. Perhaps there is also need for repentance for moments of selfishness and carelessness? God who heals can forgive and show mercy which can restore us to new life.

The feast of Christ the King is a celebration of God's love, which extends to the ends of the earth. To recognize God's love is a call for praise and gratitude.

FOOD PANTRY UPDATE

Last week we served **122 households** at food pantry. **Another new record**, breaking one we just set a couple weeks ago.

With COVID-19 cases higher than ever and more people sick, quarantining, and out of work, we know that the need will continue to increase.

Starting on Monday, suburban Cook County and the City of Chicago will be under a 30 day stay-at-home advisory. Because food pantry operations and workers/ volunteers have been deemed essential by Governor Pritzker, this will not affect our work.

However, safety is our number one priority and we want to remind all volunteers:

- masks are mandatory
- do not come in if you are experiencing any one symptom of COVID-19
- if you have been in close contact (6 ft. or less for 15 min) with anyone who has tested positive in the last 14 days do NOT come
- if anyone in your house is showing any symptom of COVID-19, do NOT come
- if you are uncomfortable volunteering at this time, we understand. Please delete your sign up so that another volunteer may step in, and simply rejoin us when you feel comfortable.
- take frequent breaks to wash your hands and/or use hand sanitizer

This is a very challenging time. We must all do what we can to keep ourselves and others safe. Thanks so much to all of our volunteers who continue to help us serve our neighbors in need.



WHAT'S HAPPENING IN RELIGIOUS EDUCATION?





THE SHEPHERD KING

The job of shepherd and the job of king couldn't be more different from each other. Shepherds are on the lowest rung of society, kings are at the top. But God says, through the prophet Ezekiel, that the Messiah will lead in a way very different from earthly authorities who lord it over their people and cause harm with their poor leadership.

Our King takes on the job himself. Christ, like a shepherd, will give rest, seek out the lost, bring back the strayed and scattered ones. He will heal the wounded and bind up the injured. He does not delegate, but will "shepherd them rightly." We have a king who cares for us and who is not afraid to "judge between one sheep and another" (Ezekiel 34:17). Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

BLESSED MIGUEL AGUSTÍN PRO (1891-1927)

November 23 - Graham Greene's classic The Power and the Glory immortalized Mexico's persecuted Church of the 1920s. But photographs of Father Pro-arms outstretched to image Christ Crucified, kneeling in prayer before the firing squad, crumpled dead on the ground-vividly, visually remind us that not long ago, not far away, the faith we take for granted cost everything! Born to a mining family, Miguel became a Jesuit and was sent to study Catholic labor movements in Belgium in preparation for evangelizing Mexico's workers. But he returned to find a Mexico determined to annihilate Catholicism, and, like priests before him during Roman persecutions, England's Reformation, and in China today, ministered secretly to an "underground Church" until apprehended and sentenced to the firing squad. In his final moments, Father Pro blessed his executioners, forgave his enemies, and shouted: "Viva el Cristo Rev!-Long Live Christ the King!"-his defiant, dying proclamation of ultimate, transcendent loyalty. Father Pro's martyrdom reinvigorated that beleaguered Church, whose countless faithful, never again afraid, would throng John Paul II when he visited Pro's beloved Mexico 52 years later. -Peter Scagnelli, Copyright © J. For I was hungry and you gave me no food, I was thirsty and you gave me no drink, a stranger and you gave me no welcome, naked and you gave me no clothing, ill and in prison, and you did not care for me.' Then they will answer and say, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or ill or in prison, and not minister to your needs?' He will answer them, 'Amen, I say to you, what you did not do for one of these least ones, you did not do for me.' And these will go off to eternal punishment, but the righteous to eternal life."


