## Notes from Fr. Bob...

#### **4<sup>TH</sup> SUNDAY OF LENT 2016**

The words of the hymn "Amazing Grace" are well known and very popular. The hymn praises God and celebrates the power of God in bringing about conversion. Less well-known is the story of the conversion of John Newton, who wrote the words of the hymn in 1770.

John Newton (1725-1807) was a slave trader. He made money from the shipment of African slaves to property owners in the United States of America. At the age of 23 he became a Christian but only later recognized the evil of slavery, retired from the sea and became a priest in the Church of England in the parish of Olney, Buckinghamshire England. He later campaigned for the abolition of slavery. The words of the hymn describe the way in which God's grace gave him new sight and then became his shield and protection.

John Newton's conversion to Christianity was sudden but only slowly did he realize the evil of slavery. His conversion to Christ shows the way in which little-by-little the "Amazing Grace" of God is at work in human activities. The experience of home-coming to God is repeated regularly in acts of recognizing wrong-doing, repentance and the experience of forgiveness. Each of these events is a moment of conversion towards God and a deepening of the relationship with God.

John Newton's conversion resembles that of the prodigal son. As soon as his son came to his senses, he began the journey back to his Father, who rushed out to welcome him back and embraced him. The father runs to meet him before he has time to speak. God's love is scandalously generous to those who return to him. The effects of God's mercy are described in the words of St. Paul as the building of a new creation and the reconciliation of the world to God. A new covenant of mercy replaces the old covenant forged after God had liberated Israel from Egypt. The liberator God of the Old Testament freed the people of Israel from slavery; God's liberation in the New Testament is liberation from sin. We cannot free ourselves but only accept God's gift.

The joy of the father's feast is spoiled by the attitude of the elder brother. He is bitter and resentful about the welcome given to his brother. He had worked hard at home for his father and cared for his possessions. He had been obedient and dutiful in carrying out his responsibilities. There is a danger that duty and hard work can make people resentful towards others, especially if they seem to be slackers. Bitterness and

resentment are like a poison in the system which builds up slowly but which, when released, can be highly destructive.

Resentments can run very deep in families. It might be about an event of the past, a time when someone was hurt or ignored. For example a relative who cares for a sick member of the family may become resentful if other members do not appear to be pulling their weight. Forgiveness of family hurt is difficult and takes time to heal. We are often told to "forgive and forget", but often forgetting may not be possible. Forgiveness is rather a graced act of will. It is a choice to go beyond the hurt and not allow it to dominate the relationship or determine the future. It is an act of courage and hope for the future. To reach the moment of such a choice may be a lengthy process and need many years.

The readings invite trust in God's mercy and forgiveness. Knowledge of our own weaknesses and limitations can help us understand one another. It can lead to a new insight or perspective on a situation. Such a moment of recognition happened in John Newton's life when he understood that the slave was a man or woman of equal dignity and created by God. This insight led to a deepening conversion. He recognized his prejudice and failure to see the slave as an equal. May we be blessed with similar conversion experiences.

# RESTORE THE CHURCH BUILD THE FUTURE

For those living in Central and Eastern Europe, rebuilding in the wake of 70 years of Soviet rule is a constant struggle. Often, people face poverty, infrequent pastoral care, and lack of spaces for worship, presenting challenges as they try to live lives of faith. Your support of the Collection for the Church in Central and Eastern Europe (CCEE) helps provide grants for projects to restore the Church and build the future in these areas.

In Armenia, the recovery from a devastating earthquake in the late 1980s and the fall of the Soviet Union in the early 1990s has been difficult and slow. Many children in Armenia live on the street because of poor family situations or the need to earn their own money. The Sisters of the Immaculate Conception have

used a grant from CCEE to fund a summer camp for 850 children ages 8 to 15.

The camp is provided for children who are orphans, live in extreme poverty, or live in poor isolated villages. At camp, the children receive much-needed rest along with physical and spiritual support, all in a nurturing environment. Local and international volunteers help create an atmosphere of safety and trust while guiding and mentoring the children. Some of the camp activities include attending catechetical classes, going hiking and on field trips, and participating in sports and acting in theatrical presentations. While at camp, the children can experience the encouraging love and support of God and others.

In 2014, the Subcommittee on the Church in Central and Eastern Europe approved 290 grants for a total of \$7,853,306.

These grants represent scholarship and pastoral grants funded by your donations. In addition, 61 scholarship and evangelization grants were awarded, totaling \$850,552. The remainder of the collection was allocated to support construction, pastoral, social justice, and peace projects. All grants serve one purpose to rebuild the pastoral capacity and form future leaders of the Catholic Church in Central and Eastern Europe.

Be Not Afraid, the theme of the 36th annual Good Friday Walk for Justice, is more than a salve for the soul. These words are an active call to meet oppression with solidarity, and despair with hope. Every Good Friday, 8th Day Center for Justice gathers friends and partners for our Annual Good Friday Walk for Justice. The Walk is a modern-day Way-of-the-Cross. Starting at the corner of Congress and Michigan, we walk, pray, and sing our way through 10 Stations in downtown Chicago. We explore the justice issues of the day that remind us to "be not afraid."

If you or someone close to you is experiencing domestic violence the group may be very helpful. The objective of the group is to provide all a chance to talk about domestic violence and share questions, concerns and experiences with others who are facing - or who have faced - similar situations in confidence.

Meetings are held in the St. Cletus Education Building, Room 200. Please enter at the flagpole entrance and follow buzzer prompts for entry.

#### "I bet he likes you."

Dear man at the registration desk at Children's hospital, I'm positive that you didn't think that statement through. As soon as I heard it I knew that is where it begins. That statement is where the idea that hurting is flirting begins to set a tone for what is acceptable behavior. My four year old knows That's not how we show we like someone. That was not a good choice."

In that moment, hurt and in a new place, worried about perhaps getting a shot or stitches you were a person we needed to help us and your words of comfort conveyed a message that someone who likes you might hurt you. No. I will not allow that message to be ok. I will not allow it to be louder than That's not how we show we like each other."At that desk you are in a position of influence, whether you realize it or not. You thought you were making the moment lighter. It is time to take responsibility for the messages we as a society give our children. Do Not tell my 4 year old who needs stitches from a boy at school hitting her I bet he likes you. "NO.

After the above facebook post went viral, the mom-Merritt Smith-responded with an official statement:

On October 5, 2015 I visited the emergency room at Nationwide Children's Hospital in Columbus, Ohio with my four-year-old daughter. She was there to receive treatment for an injury that had occurred at preschool. A classmate hit her in the face with a metal toy forcefully enough to warrant stitches. Her school handled the incident professionally and respectfully, as did the parents of the child who hit my daughter.

The comment, "I bet he likes you," was made by a young man working at the registration desk to my daughter after learning that she sustained her injury from a boy in her class. I immediately pointed out, "That's not how we show that we like someone," but the totality of the experience, even after sleeping on it, weighed heavily on my heart and on my conscience as a mother. There were three key elements from my experience that compelled me to share my story:

- 1. The comment itself, regardless of the speaker's intent, plants damaging seeds about what is acceptable as a demonstration of affection. It is a symptom of the larger issue of how deeply and casually violence is ingrained in our society.
- 2. At the registration desk, I was given an information pamphlet and a questionnaire on assistance for victims of

domestic violence. I felt there was a huge disconnect between the comment and its message and these materials, which both came from the same place.

3. My four-year-old daughter had her first experience of losing her power over her own body to a necessary yet scary procedure because, as she had just been told, someone likes her.

This post was not initially public. A good friend asked if she could

share it, so I changed my privacy setting on the post and off it went out into the world. It was not meant as an attack on the hospital or the employee, who genuinely meant no harm. I value Nationwide Children's Hospital as a tremendous asset and resource in our community. They reached out to me and thanked me for creating awareness and the opportunity to refine the ongoing training they are committed to providing their staff. I am grateful for their empathy and desire to use this experience to grow, as I hope others may.

It is my intent that this be a teaching moment. I am humbled by the overwhelming response and positive conversations being had near and far. If we re-examine the power of our words, we can change old scripts that do not serve us as adults and most certainly do not serve our children. By bringing awareness to how a seemingly innocuous remark can cause harm, I hope that we can change the messages that guide our children as they learn to interact with one another and the world around them.
