Fr. Bob's Utterings

30th Sunday in Ordinary Time
Mark 10:46-52

This week we meet Bartimaeus in Mark's gospel. The blind man whose faith allows him to see Jesus as the Son of David, the one sent from God, the Messiah. His faith not only cures him but moves him to follow Jesus. It is important to note that in Mark's gospel this is the only person cured by Jesus whose name is mentioned and he is the only one who actually follows Jesus without being called to follow. Bartimaeus leaves his cloak, which is the only thing he owns, and follows Jesus in discipleship. Mark reminds us that it is through our faith that we become true followers of Christ. It is through faith that we recognize our call to discipleship and are given the courage to leave everything behind and follow.

Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)

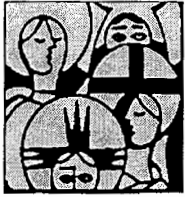

All Saints

During the past several years any number of game shows have cropped up on TV that one way or another rest on the premise that judging another incompetent, unworthy, stupid, fearful, or weak is, somehow, entertainment. The participants and viewing audiences these shows draw seem to delight in putting people down. Destroying human dignity (even if temporarily) is sport. Hurting another wins people prizes. The name of the game is survive, at all costs.

The Feast of All Saints stands in direct opposition to such mockery. Rather than demean, the solemnity points to human dignity and worth in the eyes of God — people “from every nation, race, people, and tongue” stand “before the Lamb”. We all were created blessed. This solemnity reminds us that “blessed” is not just what we expect or would like; this life isn’t only about what is pleasing to us. Being blessed takes us to passion and death and it demands of us self-giving.

Whenever we hear the Beatitudes, we know vividly how counter-cultural living the paschal mystery is. We must die to many ways of the world so that gospel values may come alive in us. It is unfortunate that Halloween gets far better press and response than the feastday for which it prepares. Saint-hood is not only a final destination, but what we are living and striving for right here, right now. And in the end, the promise of eternal life is the greatest prize we can win.

Respect Life

Life is complicated. Few issues are black and white. Most are colored several shades of gray. One truth that stands clear is the right to life. The Declaration of Independence acknowledges that all human beings are "created equal"... "endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights" including the "right to life". It is odd that this first principle of natural justice held bound in the Fourteenth Amendment to our Constitution, was cited by the Supreme Court as they denied the unborn the right to life in *Roe v. Wade*.

The right to life is central to civil law. We must consider the unborn and other potential victims of legalized homicide when we choose our legislative representatives. Unfortunately, the politicians will be concerned into choosing between proposals, none of which they find acceptable. The late John Paul the Great helps them in *Evangelium Vitae*. He states, "When it is not possible to overturn or completely abrogate a pro-abortion law, an elected official... could licitly support proposals aimed at limiting the harm done by such a law".

As voting time draws near, remember that no race is a one-issue contest. Nor is respect life one dimensional. We must show our disapproval of all threats to life: indifference to poverty, ignorance, materialism, consumerism, sexual immorality, war, drugs, abortion, euthanasia, capital punishment and eugenics.

Our public servants should be people who serve life. We should demand just as much of ourselves as we serve others in our own lives. We serve life out of gratitude to Jesus for his sacrifice. Anything worth such a sacrifice must be valuable indeed. If someone in need comes to you imagine they are Jesus and serve life.

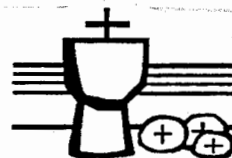
