Epiphany of the Lord

Daniel Durken, O.S.B. writes: "This celebration of Epiphany is literally bursting with brilliance and littered with light. In today's prayers and readings there are almost two dozen references to such light-words as resplendent, shines, shining radiance, wonderful light, light shining in the darkness, light from light and, of course, the shining star, that 'star of wonder, star of night, star with royal beauty bright,' which is the highlight of today's gospel."

The Babe of Bethlehem whom the magi came to do homage is identified in our Profession of Faith as 'Light from Light.' Jesus accepts this identification when he says, 'I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will not walk in darkness but will have the light of life.' Here is the therapy, remedy of our spiritual quest.

Jesus dares to challenge us to be light ourselves. In his Sermon on the Mount he tells us, 'You are the light of the world...Your light must shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your heavenly Father' (Matt 5:14-16). What a challenge this is, to be not just the light of our home, not the light of our neighborhood, not the light of our city or our state or our nation, but the light of the WORLD! Our light is unlimited.

SUNDAY, JANUARY 7, 2007 SOLEMNITY OF THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD Walk by this light

Imagine the magi seeing the star that led them to the infant Jesus. These were people used to

looking at the stars and diving meaning and guidance from them, but this star was different. Unusually bright, don't you think? Something must be going on. And so they followed the star to worship the newborn King.

The guidance, the "signs" God gives us are like this star. Clear, but still ordinary enough that we have to notice and go after them to find out what they mean. God's leading of us burns like a bright light in the clear evening sky, steady, mysterious, and beckoning us to follow.

MONDAY, JANUARY 8 FEAST OF THE BAPTISM OF THE LORD This call's for you

Here's a crossroads if ever there was one. Today the Christmas season officially ends—time to take down the last of the tinsel and throw out the fruitcake. Today is also the start of Vocation Awareness Week, coinciding with the Baptism of the Lord. It's no accident that we focus on our vocation on the feast when Jesus publicly claimed his. Who are we, in light of our own baptism? "The call," as we know, is not just for priests and religious, not just to married life or a profession. Ultimately, the call is always to holiness. Are we listening?

Today's readings: Isaiah 42:1-4, 6-7 or 40:1-5, 9-11; Luke 3:15-16, 21-22 "He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire."

TUESDAY, JANUARY 9 Be of one mind

It's worthy to note that the "unclean spirits" in the gospel stories speak in the plural: "What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us?" Why is that? The "possessed" person is one who has lost his center, whose soul is divided, split and without grounding or foundation in "the Holy One of God." He is dominated now by one voice, now by another; driven by one desire, then another. No wonder he speaks in the plural.

Today, we might take a moment to ask ourselves, Where (or who) is my center? From where do my thoughts and actions flow? Then make any necessary adjustments.

TODAY'S READINGS: Hebrews 2:5-12; Mark 1:21-28
"The man with the unclean spirit cried out, I know who you are,
the Holy One of God!"

Wednesday, January 10 All in a day's work

Today's gospel is part of a larger scripture passage that recounts a day in Jesus' life—a day filled with preaching, teaching, and healing a great number of people. Early the next morning, Jesus goes out to a place by himself, to be restored by prayer. He then moves on to another town, even though "everyone is looking for" him in the previous one. As we observe Vocation Awareness Week, each of us can take some cues from Jesus' behavior.

A healthy vocation is balanced and restored by prayer and time alone, and a healthy vocation requires vigilance to avoid the temptations presented by fame and adulation. Followers of Christ do the work "for which they have come" and then let go of the results and move on. It's all in a day's ministry.

TODAY'S READINGS: Hebrews 2:14-18; Mark 1:29-39 "Everyone is searching for you."

Thursday, January 11 Have a little faith

Each of us is called to a unique role in the service of God's kingdom. Our daily work, our relationships, our commitments make up our vocation. Sometimes it's difficult to see the good, glory, and honor in what we do each day, whether it is changing a dirty diaper, listening to the woes of a friend, serving a client, or sharing a meal in community. That is where faith comes in. Like the leper in today's gospel, we must simply believe that God is going to make sense of the jumble of our daily lives and help us to feel whole and worthy of being called a disciple. When in doubt about your vocation, have a little faith that all shall be well.

TODAY'S READINGS: Hebrews 3:7-14; Mark 1:40-45
"The leper knelt and said to Jesus, If you choose, you can make
me clean."

Friday, January 12 Walk the walk

What did the people whom Jesus cured do with the rest of their lives? Where did they go? Of them we might paraphrase Shakespeare to say, "He walked his hour upon the stage and then was heard no more." But consider the paralytic man mentioned in the gospel. Surely his life was changed forever by his encounter with Jesus—and likely in ways that went far beyond his restored ability to walk. His sins had also been forgiven, and this is what freed him from the paralysis that plagued him. Aren't we all a bit like the paralytic man? The experience of divine forgiveness can free each of us from paralyzing guilt and empower us to spread the news of our encounter with the healing Christ. This is the essence of vocation, and each of us has one. So pick up your mat and get moving!



SATURDAY, JANUARY 13 FEAST OF HILARY OF POITIERS God is

The simplicity of God can shock a troubled mind. As a young man living in the midst of great philosophers, Hilary of Poitiers searched incessantly for the answers as to what kind of divinity could justify his life. He entertained long discussions about whether God was one or many, internal or external, indifferent or active. By chance, Hilary tells us, he once happened upon a passage from the Hebrew Bible: "I am who I am." This clarity of what he called "incomprehensible knowledge" brought Hilary to the Christian faith. Though he went on to form many arguments on the Trinitarian nature of God, Hilary never lost the simple idea of God-as-being. Today let "I am who I am" sustain you.

Wanted! Young Adults for Confirmation Retreat


We are looking for some young adults (ages 21+) to join this year's retreat team for our overnight




