FR. BOB'S UTTERINGS

<u>Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time</u> <u>Luke 6:27-38</u>

Luke's gospel this week has Jesus challenging us to do some very difficult things. "To you who hear, I say, love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who mistreat you." All of these things are much easier said than done. In our everyday lives we don't often find these responses to be our normal reaction to people who mistreat us. The challenge of Jesus is not an easy thing for us to hear. Retaliation is the natural instinct in dealing with an enemy or someone who wrongs us. But Jesus insists in the gospel that we not only love our enemies, but that we do good to them, bless them, and pray for them.

Jesus reminds us that the true promise here is that God will deal with us as we choose to deal with others. If we forgive, we will be forgiven. If we reach out with gifts to the poor and vulnerable, "giving to everyone who asks of you," the Father will pour an overflowing abundance of divine gifts into our laps.

The question for you and me this week is what can we do to make ourselves more open to Jesus' challenges in today's gospel? What feelings within ourselves do we need to ask God to help us remove to more fully open our hearts to this radical way of thinking? Does the gospel say we have a choice to do it differently? The answer is NO. Jesus says one's enemies must ALWAYS be seen as neighbors and be loved. I don't know about you, but I still need God's help and grace in these areas! May today's Eucharist bring us all one step closer to meeting these difficult challenges!

Lent 2007

I don't know about you, but it is hard for me to believe that we are about to begin our Lenten journey already. It must be a sign that I am getting older because the days appear to fly by lately. Our emphasis this Lent will be "Embrace the Challenge of Conversion."

Luke's gospel today, even though difficult to hear and even more difficult to put into practice, is so appropriate in leading us into our Lenten goal to "Embrace the Challenge of Conversion." Lent is about this type of conversion in our lives.

Instead of fasting from some favorite food during Lent let us FAST from not loving our enemies, from judging others, from looking for something in return when we give to others, and from revenge in our thoughts and actions to those who wrong us. Let us use this Lent to seek CONVERSION of hearts and minds which will bring us closer to Jesus' call to "love our enemies and do good to them, and lend expecting nothing back; then your reward will be great and you will be children of the Most High, for he himself is kind to the ungrateful and the wicked." This indeed would be our ultimate response to our Lenten call to: "EMBRACE THE CHALLENGE OF CONVERSION."

When the Pharisees criticized Jesus for his eating and drinking, he responded that indeed

there is a time for feasting just as there is a time for fasting. On Carnival Sunday we celebrate this spirit. Carnival, which derives from the Latin word for "farewell to meat," encourages us to enjoy those earthly gifts, such as meat, from which we will soon abstain. While it is tempting to extend this pre-Lent invitation to feast into self-indulgence, the church calls us not to oppose our feasting and our fasting, but connect them. In feasting today, we know the delight of the sacrifice that we will live out with our own bodies. The enjoyment of our gifts is truly a preparation in love for Christ, to whom we dedicate our Lent.

Monday, February 19 Presidents' Day The spirit of authority

Good leadership takes great courage, the ability to face challenges that others may not be able to handle. In today's gospel, when the disciples were unable to heal a boy with a particularly difficult problem, all the people turned to Jesus for help. He was able to help, and when asked how, he answered that certain challenges can only be met with prayer. As we observe Presidents' Day, we are aware that people today continue to face great challenges in their daily lives and look to their leaders for courageous and wise assistance and guidance. It is the responsibility of each of us to engage in the process by which our leaders are elected and held accountable. Are they serving us well? Only we, the people, can answer that question.

Tuesday, February 20 Mardi Gras Eat, drink, and get ready

It's traditional to include oneself on this "Fat Tuesday" before the lean weeks of Lent to come. In a way, at least the idea of selfindulgence makes a kind of sense, because it points us to the fact that the Lenten season we begin tomorrow does the opposite: It helps us to get out of ourselves, to reach out to God and others. Today would be a good time to take a deep breath and reflect a bit about what Lent means, and in particular what it will mean to you this time around.

WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 21 ASH WEDNESDAY Welcome to the journey

Of the two "big seasons" of the year, Advent and Lent, Advent has more the feel of getting ready for something: celebrating the birth of Christ. And while Lent has a little bit of a similar sensation—getting ready for Easter—in this season, how you get there is just as important as the destination itself. Lent is a process we enter into.

If this time has a theme, it's conversion. Sure, you're already religious. We're not talking about converting to a religion. Rather, this season calls you to reconvert and recommit to your faith. The mark of ashes works as a sign—to yourself as much or even more than to others—of this recommitment. The "practices" of

Lent—fasting, prayer, almsgiving—are there to help you focus and become more prayerful and generous. Embrace this journey today. Today's READINGS: Joel 2:12-18; 2 Corinthians 5:20-6:2;

THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 22 CHAIR OF PETER, APOSTLE Chair of the fisherman

In pre-Christian Rome, this day was celebrated as "Ancestors' Day." People remembered their departed loved ones, particularly their parents. Later, Christians in Rome began to celebrate this day in memory of Saint Peter, their "founding father" and first bishop. The Chair of Saint Peter is an ancient wooden chair believed to have belonged to the first bishop of Rome. Today's feast honors the unity of the worldwide church and its teaching authority. This authority has given popes the ability to speak out for human rights and against injustice, which they have done with increasing frequency in the past century. Dip into the social teachings of recent popes, and you will find them surprisingly forthright and progressive on many issues.

FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 23 FEAST OF POLYCARP, BISHOP, MARTYR A long and fruitful life

Polycarp died around the year 155 at the age of 87, so he was a very early Christian who came to adulthood while some of the original apostles were still alive. The apostle John appointed Polycarp bishop of the city of Smyrna (now Izmir in Turkey), where Polycarp faced many challenges during his long years in office. Christians were a persecuted minority, while most of the population still worshipped the Roman gods. During one persecution, Polycarp was captured and, even though very advanced in age, sentenced to be burned at the stake. But tradition has it that the flames would not burn him, so he was stabbed to death. His remains are entombed with honor in the church of St. Ambrose in Rome, and his long life of service to the early church is remembered each year on this day. The name *Polycarp* means many fruits. May all of our lives be as fruitful!

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 24 SATURDAY AFTER ASH WEDNESDAY The right response

William James said there are only three requirements to changing your life: 1. Start immediately. 2. Do it flamboyantly. 3. No exceptions. These commands appear extreme and unattainable and perhaps lack a certain humility. But, the Gospel of Luke tells us of one man, a tax collector named Levi, who spared no steps and asked no questions in his conversion. We are told only that upon Jesus' command, the sinner said nothing but "got up, left everything, and followed him." Where is the flamboyance? Well, upon leaving everything, Levi gathered a crowd of sinners and gave them a great banquet in the company of the Lord, so that they all might hear his Word. This Lent, recall the change of Levi.

TODAY'S READINGS: Isaiah 58:9b-14; Luke 5:27-32 "Jesus said to the tax collector Levi, Follow me.' And he got up, left everything, and followed him."




JOIN US IN OUR LENTEN PROJECT

This year the students in the school and religious education programs are collecting money for the Heifer Project as a change from our usual Lenten Operation Rice Bowl collection. The Heifer Project is an international project begun in 1944 that has helped more than seven million families in more than 125 countries improve their quality of life and move toward greater self-reliance.

The program works like this. In the back of church, you will find a cardboard "Arc" to fold to make a bank much like the rice bowl bank. Next to the "Arc", help yourself to a calendar of activities to work on during Lent. These activities are designed to remind you of how many blessings you have in your life. If you do not wish to use the calendar, you may just place the "Arc" on your table as a "Sacrifice Offering Bank" for Lent. We ask that on Palm Sunday, or during Holy Week, you return your "Arc" to us. Our collective money will be counted and we will purchase animals for families around the world in need. Our goal is the Gift of an Arc, which costs \$5,000. It includes 2 trios of rabbits, 2 trios of guinea pigs, 2 flocks of geese, 2 flocks of chicks, 2 llamas.
