FR. BOB'S UTTERINGS

4th Sunday of Lent

Luke 15:1-3, 11-32

On this fourth Sunday of Lent we hear once again the familiar parable about the prodigal son. It is a story about abundance, greed, wastefulness, overindulgence, disrespect, envy, jealousy, loss, and anger. It sounds more like a soap opera than a scripture parable. The real story is about FORGIVENESS and not just forgiveness but forgiveness in ABUNDANCE. It is important to note that the young man's father was so pleased to have his son return that he showered him with not just forgiveness but with ACCEPTANCE and LOVE which were expressed in the gifts and celebration offered to him.

It is precisely this same ABUNDANT FORGIVENESS, ACCEPTANCE, AND LOVE that our God calls each one of us to during this holy season of Lent. How does anyone ever imagine such abundant forgiveness, acceptance and love? Sometimes, maybe always, forgiveness stretches us beyond ourselves, beyond balancing the scales or restoring justice to our lives. Maybe that is exactly why it is often so difficult, just because we can't imagine what it looks like, at least until someone comes along and shows us, the way the father did in the parable, and the way Jesus does everyday of our lives.

If we are to do one thing this Lent as we continue to embrace the challenge of our conversion, consider doing something lavishly generous to someone who may be seeking our forgiveness or so something generous for a different person each day. It'll change their world, and yours, too.

SUNDAY, MARCH 18, 2007 FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT; LAETARE SUNDAY Rejoice and let go

Today we are supposed to rejoice (laetare in Latin) because Jesus turned the world upside down and preached a message of mercy and forgive-

ness. Instead, we often resent God's largesse. We have our sense of who is deserving, and we're less than thrilled when the door is open to those we'd rather shut out. As we enter the fourth week of Lent, our challenge is to love those who remain unrepentant despite their having hurt, persecuted, or deceived us at a cost of time, money, bloodshed, or heartache. Love for our enemies begins by understanding that everyone receives the same openended invitation to God's banquet. God's heart never hardens, but ours may with built-up resentments. Remember this psalm as you struggle with the hard task of forgiving: "Shepherd me, O God, beyond my wants, beyond my fears, from death into life."

Today's readings: Joshua 5:9a, 10-12; 2 Corinthians 5:17-21; Luke 15:1-3, 11-32

Monday, March 19 Solemnity of Joseph, Husband of Mary The good father

Jesus taught his disciples to pray "Our Father" We are blessed in the name of the Trinity: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Saint Joseph, the husband of Mary, was a generous and strong father who always put the well-being of Mary and Jesus first. He stands as an inspiration for parents, and he points to the kind of parental love God has for us. He is also a powerful intercessor. Catholics call Saint Joseph the patron saint of the entire church. Pray to Joseph today in your own words for the wisdom and courage to care for the people and responsibilities in your charge.

TODAY'S READINGS: 2 Samuel 7:4-5a, 12-14a, 16; Romans 4:13, 16-18, 22; Matthew 1:16, 18-21, 24a or Luke 2:41-51a "Did you not know that I must be in my Father's house?"

Tuesday, March 20 Lenten weekday Do you want to be well?

Jesus posed an intriguing question to one man who had been ailing for 38 years: Do you want to be well? It appears as though the answer would be obvious. So why does Jesus even bother to ask before healing him? Perhaps because he knew how often we find it difficult to leave our own suffering. We cling to our suffering because we have grown so comfortable in it. Ailments can explain all our insufficiencies before God. But what would we cling to when those ailments have been cured? Muster the courage to commit to true health, and say yes to an offer to be healed.

TODAY'S READINGS: Ezekiel 47:1-9, 12; John 5:1-16 "Jesus knew that the sick man had been there a long time and asked, Do you want to be made well?"

WEDNESDAY, MARCH 21 LENTEN WEEKDAY Father loves best

Author Frederick Buechner writes the sad story of an adolescent boy who shot and killed his father because of his father's relentless, unbearable cruelty toward him. Later on, when he had been placed in detention, a guard walking the dark corridors one night heard the boy sobbing in his cell, and his words were, "I want my father, I want my father." This is the father wound, suffered by so many men in particular, but women as well, who lack a close, loving relationship with their father, yet continue to need a father's love. Jesus offers hope to all who suffer this great pain. His intimate relationship with, and absolute trust in, his divine

Father can serve as a guidepost toward our own healing. All of us do indeed have a loving Father—we just have to get to know him as well as Jesus did.

TODAY'S READINGS: Isaiah 49:8-15; John 5:17-30 "The father loves the son and shows him all he himself is doing."

THURSDAY, MARCH 22 LENTEN WEEKDAY Do you believe?

When some of the people around Jesus would not believe him to be the Son of God, he rebuked them for their shortsightedness. How can you not see, he said to them, when so many good authorities testify to me—God, scripture, Moses, John the Baptist?

In today's world it can be hard for us, too, to recognize Jesus. We live in a society that seems more committed to making money and pursuing comfort, pleasure, and security than in finding the presence of God, especially a God who asks for sacrifice and generosity—of putting others ahead of oneself. But amid the busyness stands the humble figure of Christ, inviting us to live for others.

Today's readings: Exadus 32:7-14; John 5:31-47 "But if you do not believe what Moses wrote, how will you believe what I say?"

FRIDAY, MARCH 23

LENTEN WEEKDAY; FEAST OF TORIBIO DE MOGROVEJO, BISHOP Nobody expects the Spanish Inquisition

Saint Toribio (1538-1606) had his career all set. A law professor at the University of Salamanca, he became the head of the dreaded Inquisition that rooted out heresy. But the king of Spain had other ideas for him and sent him as bishop to the colony of Peru. There he faced a vast diocese of uncatechized native people and many dissolute clergy. He threw himself into reform, requiring his priests to learn native languages and publishing a catechism in those tongues. He set out to tour his diocese, teaching and baptizing as he went and showing up where "no prelate or visitor had come." Working tirelessly, he was generous and refused to accept gifts.

The Spirit lit a fire under Toribio, and not the kind to burn heretics at the stake. He underwent a profound conversion and lived it out to the end of his days. What will be your conversion this Lent?

TODAY'S READINGS: Wisdom 2:1a, 12-22; John 7:1-2, 10, 25-30 "Let us see if his words are true, and let us test what will happen at the end of his life."

SATURDAY, MARCH 24 LENTEN WEEKDAY Hear them out

A question addressed to Jesus—Our law does not judge people without first giving them a hearing, does it?—is one that Americans are asking of their leaders today when it comes to immigration issues and the detention of accused terrorists. Due process is a fundamental human right that the Catholic Church and all major religious, humanitarian, and justice groups support. Jesus was ridiculed, persecuted, and condemned to death because his message and his very existence frightened and threatened those in power. Let's not repeat the mistake of the Pharisees. Give your friends and enemies a fair hearing and insist that your government, who acts in your name, do the same.
