FR. BOB'S UTTERINGS

Fifth Sunday of Lent John 8 1-11

How do I react? Lord, why do we delight so when someone gets caught doing something wrong? We know that we are all sinners, but somehow we seem to feel a little better when someone gets what we feel they deserve. As Christians, we believe that we are all children of God and that we are to love God and one another, but that behavior does not seem to be our natural tendency.

In today's passage from John, scribes and Pharisees drag a woman before Jesus and claim that she was caught in the act of adultery...if guilty she could be stoned to death. Jesus does not respond the way they expected him to respond or perhaps wanted him to respond. If I caught a friend in the act of adultery, would my first reaction be one of love? How do I show love and understanding without being judgmental or giving acceptance which would enable the person to continue the behavior?

Sometimes we just want to think that the only one we are responsible for is ourselves, but this action falls short of the message Jesus gives us in today's gospel. We are to be forgiving and merciful. Most of us have not yet evolved to the point of being able to forgive very well, to forgive without any need to equalize the suffering. Maybe that is why, for many of us, we still like the idea of capital punishment and a kind of justice that balances scales pain for pain. Maybe it's because we are still in the process of becoming truly Christian in our humanity with such a long way yet to go.

Statues Covered in Purple, Holy Week, and the Sacred Triduum

You will notice this Sunday that the main cross over the sanctuary is draped in purple and that the statues in the church are covered in purple. There is a long tradition in the church that on the fifth Sunday of Lent, which used to be called Passion Sunday, the statues were covered until the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday. In the diocese of the United States, crosses in the church may be covered or draped from the fifth Sunday of Lent until the end of the Celebration of the Lord's Passion on Good Friday. All other statues in the church may be covered from the fifth Sunday of Lent until the beginning of the Easter Vigil. Our Parish Worship Committee has decided to reintroduce this long time tradition this Lenten Season.

Holy Week will soon be upon us as we quickly move through our Lenten journey. Please try to make every effort to fully participate in all the sacred events of the Triduum this year. These three days symbolize the essence of our faith as people of God. I will write over the next couple of weeks about each of the days of the Triduum.

Beginning with the celebration of Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday we are reminded of Jesus with his disciples at the Last Supper, the Institution of the Sacrament of the Eucharist, and the symbol of service in the washing of feet. This year we encourage EVERYONE to have their feet washed. It is a rich symbol and reminder to each of us that by virtue of our Baptism we are all called to serve one another and to truly be the servant of all. We will have eight individual stations for foot washing to help facilitate this wonderful event. The Mass will lead us to the procession, adoration, and repose of the Blessed Sacrament that will be used for Good Friday Services and for the sick or dying during the remainder of the Triduum.

Mark Twain said, "Clothes make the man. Naked people have little or no influence on society." It's sort of an "outside-in" way of

The result: "It is no longer I who live, but it is Christ who lives in me" (Galatians 2:20). Put on the garment of Jesus, and Christ "possesses" you, takes hold of you, calls you his own. Invite Jesus to fill your body, mind, and spirit, and see what kind of person you become.

SOLEMNITY OF THE ANNUNCIATION OF THE LORD How to play the favorite

It's not easy for us to explain why we hold certain people in special esteem above others. We have our favorites, and we don't analyze it much beyond that. But if we did, we'd probably find it's because they remind us of us, or they are people we aspire to become. They possess qualities we find appealing and amusing. We enjoy the person's company because what they do pleases us. For these same reasons Mary found favor with God. She chose ways that were God's ways. Her life was a reflection of life in God, and thus she was asked to bring the love of God to the world through Jesus Christ. Choose God's ways of justice and mercy so that like Mary you, too, may find favor with God and be filled with grace.

TUESDAY, MARCH 27 LENTEN WEEKDAY
YOU either believe or you don't

When you read or hear the Gospel of John, you find out that much of it is up or down, yes or no. Either you believe Jesus to be the Son of God, or you don't, and John was pretty hard on those who didn't. He was writing to Christians who were still separating from the Jewish community, and the conflict got fierce at times. Ultimately, though, John had it right. There really is not much middle ground when it comes to whether you believe the amazing claim that Jesus comes from God and will lead us to God. It is this belief more than any other that makes you Christian. So affirm it in your life today: "I believe in Jesus Christ, the only Son of God" and follow his ways.

WEDNESDAY, MARCH 28 LENTEN WEEKDAY Secrich for the truth

Whenever you feel unduly burdened, hopeless, and helpless, and find yourself wishing you could run away from it all, assume you are living a lie and then try to discover the truth—because the truth will set you free. The truth will tell you that you are not alone, unloved, or unaccounted for. The truth will let you know that nothing can separate you from the love of God and that God's love conquers all. Don't let the lies of your worst fears guide your actions. When you're dazed and confused, move toward love—toward the courageous and compassionate response—and soon you will find your burden lifted and your chains loosed.

Today's readings: Daniel 3:14-20, 91-92, 95; John 8:31-42 'If you are my disciples, you will know the truth, and the truth will make you free."

THURSDAY, MARCH 29 LENTEN WEEKDAY What's in a name?

New names frequently reflect entering upon a new phase of life. A baby receives a name, both on a birth certificate and at baptism, to mark its entrance into the human and Christian communities. At the sacrament of Confirmation young people choose a new name to signal their taking on of the adult responsibilities of discipleship. Even a new era for a business or other organization may mean a name change. When God entered into a covenant with Abram and his descendants, Abram got a new name—Abraham—that signified the renewed relationship and life with which God would grace God's people. Does your faith seem new to you? This Lent, what can you discover about it that's fresh and lifegiving—what new "name" can you give your faith life?

FRIDAY, MARCH 30 LENTEN WEEKDAY Prayer stations

Today is the last Friday before Holy Week and the last one before Good Friday. As the day of the week on which Jesus died, Fridays have had a special place in Christian tradition. There was a time when Catholics abstained from meat on every Friday, not only those in Lent, as a reminder of Christ's sacrifice.

Another traditional Catholic practice associated with Friday is the Stations of the Cross. Pray the Stations today. You might try praying the Stations at church. Every church has the series of 10 shrines devoted to the Stations. Going from one to another as you pray retraces Jesus' footsteps to the place of his crucifixion and offers a kind of pilgrimage in the same sacred space where we celebrate the Eucharist. From life to death to new and transformed life: This is the mystery we enter into at this time of year—and all year round.

SATURDAY, MARCH 31 LENTEN WEEKDAY Correct your faulty logic

Caiphas, who pushed for Jesus' arrest and execution, believed that sacrificing one man for the sake of the nation was the better of two evils. Leaders are often faced with such abhorrent choices in a world where power and glory are held in esteem. Sacrificial lambs are slaughtered daily. But Jesus exposed the falseness of such death-dealing logic. It is not power and glory, he proclaimed, but humility and service that are the standards that please God and will bring about God's reign. The servant leader shares in a sacred trust to protect every life in his or her care. Jesus, the Good Shepherd, refused to forsake even one lamb. Follow Jesus' lead as you lead others.
