

FR. BOB'S UTTERINGS

The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ Corpus Christi

A St. Cletus parishioner shared this remarkable article with me just a couple of weeks ago. It is what this great feast day of Corpus Christi is all about. WHO CAN DOUBT THE REAL PRESENCE? "On the evening of the last day of his October 1995 visit to the United States, Pope John Paul II was scheduled to greet the seminarians at St. Mary's Seminary in Baltimore. It had been a very full day beginning with Mass at Oriole Park at Camden Yards followed by a parade through downtown streets; a visit to the Basilica of the Assumption, the first Cathedral in the country; lunch at a local soup kitchen run by Catholic Charities; a prayer service at the Cathedral of Mary Our Queen in north Baltimore and finally a quick stop at St. Mary's Seminary."

"The schedule was tight so the plan was to simply greet the seminarians while they stood outside on the steps. But, Pope John Paul made his way through their ranks and into the building. His plan was to first make a visit to the Blessed Sacrament. When his wishes were made known, security personnel quickly flew into action ahead of the Pope. Their activities included a sweep of the building, paying closest attention to the chapel where John Paul would be praying. For this purpose highly trained dogs were used to detect any persons who might be present."

"The dogs are trained to locate living people in collapsed buildings after earthquakes and other disasters. These intelligent and eager canines went through their rounds in the halls, offices and classrooms quickly and were then sent into the chapel. They went up and down the aisles, past the pews, and finally into the side chapel where the Blessed Sacrament is reserved. Upon reaching the tabernacle, the dogs sniffed and whined and pointed, refusing to leave. They were convinced that they discovered someone there and firmly remained, their attention riveted on the tabernacle, until called out by their handlers."

"We Catholics know they were right; they found a real, living Person in the tabernacle!" Something for all of us to think about on this Feast of Corpus Christi!!! (Martha Chai and written by Linda Brenegan of Baltimore, MD for the Gospa Mission Newsletter)

SOLEMNITY OF THE MOST HOLY BODY AND BLOOD OF CHRIST Plenty to go around — Science continues to confirm that the old adage "You are what you eat," is more than just a metaphor. MONDAY, JUNE 11- FEAST OF BARNABAS, APOSTLE Good guides needed

Have you ever mentored someone as a godparent, confirmation sponsor, or RCIA companion? When you originally make the commitment, you never know how it will turn out. Will this baby be raised in faith by the parents? Will this teenager remain active in the church once it's his/her turn to choose? Will this adult convert stay faithful to this decision or lose heart? In the first century, when it was Barnabas' turn to offer guidance, he agreed to sponsor the unpromising Saul, persecutor of Christians. Sometimes a good mentor is all it takes.

Let your light shine

Some structures are built to fit into the environment like they belonged there. Frank Lloyd Wright, for example, wanted his buildings to echo the landscape so they could disappear into it like a whisper. Other architects build strictly to dazzle or amaze the eye, to stand out and be seen, like the Chrysler Building in New York, the Disney Music Hall in Los Angeles, or the new museum in Denver. When a structure is built on the most visible site around, chances are the builder wants to attract (positive) attention. We are "the city on a hill" for a reason.

FEAST OF ANTHONY OF PADUA, PRIEST, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH A saint among saints

Some people need only a nickname. Say "The Champ," and most folks will know you mean Muhammad Ali. There have been lots of heavyweight boxing champions, but "The Champ" can mean only one. In 13th-century Padua, all you had to say was "The Saint," and everyone knew you were talking about Saint Anthony, the great Franciscan preacher, theologian, scripture scholar, and wonder-worker who continues to be one of the most popular saints ever.

Today, try this prayer to "The Saint": "O holy Saint Anthony, gentlest of saints, your love for God and charity for God's creatures made you worthy, when on earth, to possess miraculous powers. Encouraged by this thought, I implore you to obtain for me this my request. O gentle and loving Saint Anthony, whose heart was ever full of human sympathy, whisper my petition into the ears of the

Seeing is believing

Anger can be a difficult thing. In response to an injustice, anger is righteous and can spur positive action to right a wrong. At the same time, some have called anger a "secondary emotion," a substitute reaction for another feeling like sadness or fear. And for some people, anger is the default reaction to a frustrating situation and method number one for dealing with problems.

Whatever its source, anger becomes a problem when it destroys—when it turns into rage, even violence. Jesus saw how unchecked anger can lead to far worse things. He called on his disciples to get past the anger response and seek reconciliation instead. Where can you defuse conflict before it flares into anger?

FRIDAY, JUNE 15

SOLEMNITY OF THE MOST SACRED HEART OF JESUS The heart of the matter

If you were raised in a Catholic home, you probably have a memory of a statue or picture of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. You may have looked at it a thousand times without really "seeing" it. Take a moment today to recollect the image as vividly as possible. Recall that the heart is the symbol for, among other things, love, charity, understanding, compassion, and courage. Remember that it is a key organ in the human body, connecting the spiritual with the material, the mind with the body, the intellect with emotions. Then reflect on the ways that the love of Jesus has sustained you every day of your life. TODAY'S READINGS: Ezekiel 34:11-16; Romans 5:5b-11; Luke 15:3-7

SATURDAY, JUNE 16

FEAST OF THE IMMACULATE HEART OF MARY The pure heart wills the one thing: God

The origins of the feast of the Immaculate Heart of Mary may seem naive and remote to contemporary Catholics as it began in the 1940s in response to a request attributed to Our Lady of Fatima and had as its purpose the conversion of Russia. But the need to turn one's heart or the heart of a nation to God is never out of date. Today's gospel recalls the boy Jesus, restored to his worried mother and father explaining that he "had to be in my Father's house" or as it may also be translated, "I must be about my Father's work." We may mark this day by recalling our own task, our role as baptized Christians: to hold up in prayer each part of the broken world.
