

FR. BOB'S UTTERINGS

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13th Sunday of Ordinary Time

As we once again prepare to celebrate our independence this 4th of July we look to the preamble of our Constitution that states what we as a nation intend to be about.

"We the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America." In stating what we as a nation propose as our tasks, we are proclaiming that to which we intend to commit ourselves. Indeed, one knows who one is by one's commitments.

Somewhere in the course of our personal lives each of us comes to face the question of commitment, to its risks and its unknowns. Some, out of fear, turn away. Others, because they seek comfort, refuse the challenge. Still others, too enamored of the banquet of choices before them, never decide and so never commit. Finally there are also those who step into the swirling darkness and say yes, simply because they realize only too well that if they do not, a life of any significance will be less likely from that very moment onward.

It is what drove Henry David Thoreau to Walden, in search of a purpose for which to live. "I went to the woods because I wished to live deliberately, to front only the essential facts of life, and see if I could not learn what it had to teach, and not when I came to die, discover that I had not lived. I did not wish to live what was not life, living is so dear, nor did I wish to practice resignation, unless it was quite necessary. I wanted to live deep and suck out all the marrow of life, to live so sturdily and Spartan-like as to put to rout all that was not life." (Walden, 1854).

On this 4th of July make a list of your commitments, the ones that entail a cost on your part. Do you like what you see? Is anything missing? Should any be discarded?

In what ways and to what extent are you committed to God and country? To our Lord Jesus Christ? To the call of faith and service to country?

SUNDAY, JULY 1, 2007

THIRTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME Be like the gentle rain

Hospitality to strangers and those on a journey is a deeply held value in Middle Eastern societies, in no small part because of the harsh desert climate of the region. So it comes as no surprise when the disciples James and John asked if a Samaritan town warranted destruction for its lack of hospitality. But Jesus lives by a different logic, one based on mercy rather than retribution. Would that we, and all humanity, could embrace this logic and leave retribution behind for good.

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Kings 19:16b, 19-21; Galatians 5:1, 13-18; Luke 9:51-62

"After the Samaritans refused them hospitality, James and John said, 'Lord, do you want us to command fire from heaven to consume them?' "

MONDAY, JULY 2 - Get your priorities straight

Using one obligation as an excuse to avoid another is an old game in the spiritual life. Being attentive and responsive to God's will is our obligation as Christians. A disciple once tried to put off the call to follow Christ by claiming his need to bury his father. Jesus' retort—"let the dead bury the dead"—is not a slight against the corporal work of mercy of burying the dead but rather a wake-up call to this disciple not to bury himself with excuses and cut off his divine lifeline. If we put our duty to Christ first, everything else will take care of itself.

TODAY'S READINGS: Genesis 18:16-33; Matthew 8:18-22 "Follow me, and let the dead bury their own dead."

TUESDAY, JULY 3 - FEAST OF THOMAS, APOSTLE What you don't see

It can be unfortunate how tradition tags certain people in scripture. We hear of the well-known parable of the prodigal son, for example, even though the story never uses the word *prodigal* and has more to do with the father than the son. The apostle Thomas suffered a similar fate, when *doubting* became part of his proper name. The main point of the story of Thomas wanting to touch the risen Jesus lies not in Thomas' so-called doubt but in Jesus' line at the end: "Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe." The majority of those who follow the apostles, us included, are called to believe without "seeing." How do you do it?

TODAY'S READINGS: Ephesians 2:19-22; John 20:24-29 "Have you believed because you have seen me?"

WEDNESDAY, JULY 4 - INDEPENDENCE DAY

Unchain our hearts

Demonizing enemies, including religious and political ones, is one of the unsavory ways in which religious language can be abused. One's opponent is not merely wrong but evil incarnate. As we celebrate the nation we love—and that we wish were always right, pure, and honorable above all others—we must acknowledge our government's sometime misuse of our amazing wealth and power and pray that citizen and government alike may set about the work of unshackling one another and seeking the Lord's power to free us from whatever possesses us that is not of God.

TODAY'S READINGS: Genesis 21:5, 8-20a; Matthew 8:28-34 " 'If you drive us out, send us into the herd of swine.' And he said to them, 'Go then!' "

THURSDAY, JULY 5

FEAST OF ANTHONY MARY ZACCARIA, PRIEST The love that heals

The number one killer in this country is heart disease. And despite modern advances in medicine, it's still not easy to fix a broken heart. So imagine how hard it was 500 years ago in Milan when today's saint, Anthony Mary Zaccaria, worked there as a physician. That's why he traded in his stethoscope for a stole and became a priest. He realized that God's merciful love did more to heal the human heart than anything he could do with pills and a scalpel. It's true for us, too. Forgiving someone's sins is a lot easier than performing open heart surgery.

TODAY'S READINGS: Genesis 22:1b-19; Matthew 9:1-8 "When Jesus saw their faith, he said to the paralytic, 'Take heart, son; your sins are forgiven.'"

FRIDAY, JULY 6

FEAST OF MARIA GORETTI, VIRGIN, MARTYR The power of forgiveness

The story of Maria Goretti, the young virgin and martyr whose feast we celebrate today, is one that generations have read with a mixture of fascination and horror.

Maria was only 11 years old when she was murdered by a would-be rapist. That's the horrific part of her story. The fascinating part is Maria's deathbed forgiveness of her attacker and his subsequent conversion.

How did Maria do it? By entering fully into the heart, mind, and experience of the young man who tried to rape her. This is how any of us can forgive another person. It might seem hard, even impossible at times, but the important thing to remember about forgiveness is that it's good for us. We benefit far more than the person we have forgiven. So, do something nice for yourself today: Forgive someone.

TODAY'S READINGS: Genesis 23:1-4, 19; 24:1-8, 62-67; Matthew 9:9-13

"I have come to call not the righteous but sinners."

SATURDAY, JULY 7

Behold Christ

All is second to the reality of Christ. When the disciples of John the Baptist asked Christ why his disciples did not observe fasting as they did, Christ's response was: Because I am Me and here I am. The Divine Incarnation lived among the disciples; they needed to do nothing further but to behold him and revel in his presence, as a family would its bridegroom. It is dangerous to get lost in a world that can blind us to the Incarnation. Today Christ reminds you that embracing existence is all the work you need to do.

TODAY'S READINGS: Genesis 27:1-5, 15-29; Matthew 9:14-17 "The disciples of John came to Jesus, saying, 'Why do we and the Pharisees fast often, but your disciples do not fast?'"

Food Pantry Update

It's summer vacation time, but the need is still great, and the shelves need replenishing! Because of your incredible generosity, we were able to serve over 115 families in June. These families have asked me to convey their deep appreciation to you, the parishioners of St. Cletus, for continuing to help them out, as they struggle to pay bills and feed their families. THANK YOU!!!

Please continue to make it a routine to pick up some items for the Food Pantry when you do your weekly grocery shopping. Here are some reminders:

All non-perishables are greatly appreciated. We are low on most of our staple items, including cereal, rice, dry pinto beans, peanut butter, jelly, soup, meals in a can or box, pasta, pasta sauce, canned fruits and vegetables and tuna.

Each month we have a "specials table" where we have extra items from which our clients choose a couple of things. Some favorites include coffee, oatmeal, juice or soft drinks, crackers or cookies, baby food, toiletries, cleaning supplies, laundry detergent and dish washing soap. (Usually one of these extra items is also put in each pre-packed family bag.) Check expiration dates to avoid out of date goods which we cannot use.

These items can be dropped off in the Church vestibule in the bins now provided in the former baptistery.

The Food Pantry distributes groceries from the vestibule of the Church on the second Thursday of each month, from 6:30-8:00 PM. Our next distribution is on July 12.
