

FR. BOB'S UTTERINGS

19TH Sunday in Ordinary Time

It is tempting to wish that our faith in God would enable us to have an unfailing trust that God will take us to where we want to be. It would free us from diddling with decisions, vacillating and second-guessing. Only that wouldn't be faith because it would be our own script we'd have God carrying out.

Faith in God surrenders the script. It also surrenders the outcome, which is why Abraham, when asked by God to pack up kin and belongings and move to another land, did just that without knowing where or how he'd eventually settle in. And much later, like the unpredictable thread of a good novel, Abraham's story finds him and Sarah with child when they are 100 and 90 years old. A decade or so later, Abraham again finds himself without any sensible or sane understanding of the storyline as he leads young Isaac up a sacrificial mountain to what would seem to be a failure of God's promise to Abraham to father countless generations. Once more God rewrites the ending. Throughout Abraham's life it is God's script that Abraham lives out, not his own.

Faith is unpredictable, like good novels that twist and turn and keep us in suspense. If novels are well written, they keep us up long into the night. On the other hand, we like our lives quite the opposite. The appearance of the unpredictable tends to unsettle and undo our living. We presume that good lives, unlike a good novel, are interesting and engaging but always knowledgably focused and without unwarranted surprises. And so we expect good novels and good lives to be like the tracks of the railroad—parallel, but never touching or crossing lest someone or something be derailed.

Growth and change are always the result of conflict, of clashing visions that force adaptation. This is not to say God writes tragedies and suffering into the script, but only that God uses all the unfolding twists and turns of the plot to bring the story to a divine conclusion.

Dressed for action

Most of us know how to dress for success, depending on the situation. Don't wear flip-flops on a hiking trip. If you have to call ahead for restaurant reservations, it's probably best to wear a good shirt. If you're a superhero, bright colors and an artful disguise may be the way to go. But how do you dress for success if you're a follower of Jesus? Forget fashion tips. Just be prepared to act at the first sign of someone's need. Where need is, Jesus is.

MONDAY, AUGUST 13

FEAST OF PONTIAN, POPE, MARTYR, AND HIPPOLYTUS, PRIEST, MARTYR Mom, what's an antipope?

When differences arise, popes, like family members, choose sides. In the third century, a Roman priest, Hippolytus, took exception to the teachings of the pope and gathered followers to his side. He was the first of what became known as the antipopes, those leaders who gained a significant following over and against legitimate popes. He lasted 10 years until, under a new pope, Pontian, the emperor had them both executed, just to make sure he got the right one. Tradition holds that the two were reconciled before they died, and thus became today's martyr saints together. Conflict and betrayal are part of every human life, but reconciliation is the way of true faith. With whom can you reconcile today?

TUESDAY, AUGUST 14

FEAST OF MAXIMILIAN MARY KOLBE, PRIEST, MARTYR A witness to the end

The Franciscan Maximilian Kolbe is best known for the way he died: He offered his life in the Auschwitz Nazi death camp in exchange for another prisoner, a husband and father. But he led an incredibly active life before then. He founded a society for people consecrated to the Immaculate Heart of Mary (still in existence), a Franciscan community near Warsaw that in 12 years grew from 18 to 650 friars, and a publishing house that produced religious booklets and a newspaper and monthly magazine with circulations of 230,000 and more than 1 million respectively. He even established a missionary center in Nagasaki Japan in 1930. His hard work reached its fulfillment in his martyrdom. Let the dedication of this saint serve as an example in your life.

WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 15

SOLEMNITY OF THE ASSUMPTION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY Body and soul

In the years after World War II, which saw the deaths of tens of millions of people, the destruction of whole cities, and immeasurable suffering and heartbreak, Pope Pius XII proclaimed the doctrine of the physical assumption of Mary into heaven. One of his reasons: so that "exalted destiny of both soul and body may in this striking manner be brought clearly to the notice of all persons"—a destiny and dignity the war had, in an equally striking

manner, so degraded.

Mary gave her whole self, body and soul, to the coming of her son Jesus, who saves us body and soul. Humans have the unique ability to both embody life and destroy it on a mass scale. In celebrating Mary today, remember the value our bodies and souls have as places of the Spirit and the ultimate value of all human life.

THURSDAY, AUGUST 16

FEAST OF STEPHEN OF HUNGARY Crowning achievements

Stephen (975-1038) was the son of the chief of the Magyars, a warlike tribe of pagans from Western Asia who settled in modernday Hungary in the ninth century. He was baptized along with his family when he was 10 and became his people's leader when he was 22. He was tireless in his efforts to help the poor and bring Christianity to the land. Because most of the people couldn't read, he filled the churches with statues and mosaics that told the stories of the faith through art. For his efforts, the pope sent Stephen a crown that is still treasured in Hungary today. What might you do with your life, so that you are remembered and treasured 1,000 years from now?

Chastity in the 21st century?

Teaching teen abstinence can be a thankless job to the teacher who loses the lunchroom lottery and gets the assignment. But it's not just our young people who might benefit from the idea of chastity. In a culture that exploits human sexuality to sell everything from soft drinks to homeowners' insurance, the holy power of our capacity for intimacy has been heartlessly dumbed down and devalued. When adults stop marketing themselves as commodities with the currency of themselves, the next generation will learn self-respect from us.

FEAST OF JANE FRANCES DE CHANTAL, RELIGIOUS Forgiveness one step at a time

One of the most difficult spiritual tasks we can face is to forgive someone who has harmed a loved one. Jane Frances de Chantal had to do just that when her husband was killed in a hunting accident. Wisely, Jane took it in steps. She began by greeting her husband's killer on the street. When she mastered that, Jane invited him to her home. Eventually she forgave the man so fully that he asked her to be the godmother of his child.

Forgiveness is a process, sometimes taking many years to be complete. We don't have to accomplish it all at once. What is one thing you might do today that constitutes a first step toward forgiving another?
