

FR. BOB'S UTTERINGS

Twentieth Sunday in Ordinary Time Standing Alone

By now just about all of summer has been unwrapped and spent. As the season drains away and summer's light dims, so too grows the realization that the busy work of life must soon be taken up in earnest once more. The realization returns that life calls us seriously to particular autumn cares. No matter how fearful or challenging, each of us must follow that inner voice or else sense that life will have become less.

Such was the story of Jeremiah, who found himself prophet to the Hebrew people. He sensed an inner call to speak God's word against the nation's political alliances and against the king's penchant to trust in military machines. As a result Jeremiah found himself tossed into a well. Yet he remained committed.

It is also the story of Jesus, who came with truth as a walking stick and the kingdom as seeds of life to be scattered and sown. He also knew full well that few would walk where he would walk or choose to feed on what he would sow. Yet he would not back away from what he was about.

Such a willingness to stretch ourselves into the unknown is part of that mysterious list of things that make us human. At such times we walk in the shadow of Jesus as he leads us into new ways of being human. Seldom, if ever, is it without struggle or even pain, yet it is then that we begin to gain a fuller sense of who we truly are, and it is then that through us God brings the world to something new.

Each of us must choose to step into some unknown, guided by our God-given vision of what our lives must be about, a vision to which others are often blind. At these moments one can feel both most alone and most alive.

Development and Long-Range Advancement Plan

Our new Parish Pastoral Council (P.P.C.) has begun their work already. They have been working hard starting our process of developing a Long-Range Advancement Plan for the parish. They are working in conjunction with the Institute of School and Parish Development (ISPD) to develop a 3-5 year plan for our parish. This is a wonderful opportunity for our new Pastoral Council to guide us in creating the future vision for our parish and school. Most importantly this vision will come from the input, ideas and recommendations of you the people of St. Cletus Parish.

Please take a few minutes and read pages 4 & 5 of today's Canticle to learn more about this wonderful adventure. Especially notice page 5 where we need your input. Take a few moments and complete the three questions and return them either to the rectory or in next week's collection. There will, also, be a formal Assessment report presented at a parish-wide open meeting on <u>TUESDAY, AUGUST 28TH FROM 7:30 – 9:00 P.M. IN THE CHURCH</u>. Please make every effort to attend and join in this exciting process leading us into the future.

A DEVELOPMENT UPDATE

CHARTING A NEW COURSE

St. Cletus is charting a new course for its future! Parish leaders have identified the need to plan Council (PPC) will lead this planning process for our for St. Cletus's future in all areas of parish life. During the next ten months, our parish and school family will create a Long-Range Advancement Plan. Working with St. Cletus on this important task is the Institute of School and Parish Development (ISPD). ISPD, headquartered in New Orleans, LA, is a national development consulting firm that works exclusively with Catholic parishes, schools and dioceses throughout the country. They have partnered with St. Cletus and will guide us through our strategic planning process.

As we begin this new chapter in St. Cletus history, the theme that we will follow is: *the future* vision we establish for our parish and school must come from the input, ideas and recommendations of the people who make up the St. Cletus community. Beginning with this update, you will be kept informed about various activities and programs geared toward community input. There will be many opportunities available for everyone to help us create a dynamic future for St. Cletus.

GETTING STARTED

The process to create St. Cletus's Long-Range Advancement Plan has already begun. ISPD has been October: working with the parish to assess our present situation in several key areas of development: governance, November: involvement of people, stewardship, communication, marketing, and others. As part of this process, ISPD | Dec. - Feb.: personally interviewed 25 members of our parish and school community and reviewed key materials and *March*: publications. A formal Assessment report will be presented at a parish-wide open meeting on **Tuesday**, *April*: August 28th from 7:30–9:00 pm in the Church. Make plans to attend!

TWENTIETH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Baptism by fire

Imagine having the insight to realize that your mission would lead without fail to your persecution and death. Now imagine having the courage to remain faithful to that mission—despite the cost. The next time you feel stressed out by the demands of your own calling (and don't we all feel that way at least some of the time?), pause to consider the stress that Jesus was under. Say a quick prayer asking Jesus to send you the courage you need to face your own trials.

MONDAY, AUGUST 20

FEAST OF BERNARD, ABBOT, DOCTOR

Love lessons

Of all the titles given to Christ, Saint Bernard of Clairvaux puts forth perhaps the most intriguing: The Kiss. In his commentary of the Song of Songs, the 12th-century Cistercian abbot identified the line "Let him kiss me with the kiss of his mouth" as a unique explanation of God's incarnation. Human flesh does not presume to be kissed by the mouth but by the *kiss* of the mouth. For Bernard, the Word-God is signified as the mouth, and human flesh is the recipient, the speaker. But what unites them is the kiss, our great mediator, Christ Jesus. Today try to imagine receiving Christ as a kiss from God.

TODAY'S READINGS: Judges 2:11-19; Matthew 19:16-22 "Teacher, what good deed must I do to have eternal life?"

TUESDAY, AUGUST 21

FEAST OF PIUS X, POPE

Popes and politics

Pius X (1836-1914) was considered a saint during his lifetime, just like John Paul II was by many during his lifetime. Both were controversial because their teachings were highly political. Pius X was criticized for trying to intervene in pre-World War I European politics, while John Paul II was instrumental in the post-Soviet political reforms of Eastern Europe. Often church teaching will resonate with one or the other side of any political debate. But truth always comes from the same place. Think of all the ways now that the political right or the political left can claim agreement with what the church believes.

TODAY'S READINGS: Judges 6:11-24a; Matthew 19:23-30 "The Lord is with you, you mighty warrior."

WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 22

FEAST OF THE QUEENSHIP OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY Our most gracious advocate

The mother that bore the child Jesus and reared him into manhood was, in turn, borne up into heaven by the power of the child. There she was deemed Queen, so that she might share the inheritance of Christ with her people. We cry out to her in the antiphon, "Hail Holy Queen, mother of mercy, our life, our sweetness, and our hope." In doing so, we name her by her unique kingdoms, not of land but of virtues. These were the territories given to her by the Lord. Today, for our share in these territories we may ask her, who has always concerned herself in our salvation, to intercede to her King.

Today's readings: Judges 9:6-15; Matthew 20:1-16 "If in good faith you are anointing me king over you, then come and take refuge in my shade."

THURSDAY, AUGUST 23

FEAST OF ROSE OF LIMA, VIRGIN

Flower power

Given her beauty, Rose of Lima (1586-1617) could have had her pick of marriage partners, but she preferred to live a simple life of prayer and live in a small hut set in her family's garden. To help her parents financially, she sold the beautiful flowers she cultivated. Aware of the many poor people in Lima, she opened a room in her family's home to anyone who needed her care, asking nothing in return. Great crowds gathered at her death, and her coffin was carried through the city. Rose was the first saint from the Western Hemisphere, and her feast day is widely celebrated in South America with processions filled with flowers. What beautiful creation can you cultivate in the garden of your own life?

TODAY'S READINGS: Judges 11:29-39a; Matthew 22:1-14 "Go therefore into the main streets, and invite everyone you find to the wedding banquet."

FRIDAY, AUGUST 24

FEAST OF BARTHOLOMEW, APOSTLE

Labor for the kingdom

All we know for sure about Saint Bartholomew is that he went East, probably as far as India, to spread the gospel. Armenia was his last stop, where he was flayed or crucified or maybe both. His discipleship and missionary zeal are traits worthy of remembering and passing on from generation to generation. He is the working person's saint—patron of many skilled laborers—who helped build God's kingdom by his sweat and blood. With summer drawing to a close, it is a good time to recommit to throwing your whole self—body and soul—into God's work of bringing good news to the poor and his promise of justice and mercy to all.

TODAY'S READINGS: Revelation 21:9b-14; John 1:45-51 "Here is truly an Israelite in whom there is no deceit!"

SATURDAY, AUGUST 25

FEAST OF JOSEPH CALASANZ, PRIEST

Just doing my Job

The work of a teacher can be hard. Take the example of Saint Joseph Calasanz (1556-1648), whose great mission in life was educating the urban poor, with special attention to the abandoned and homeless children of Rome—for free. He even founded a religious order devoted to this task. By 1611 his school had 1,200 students.


But then one of the members of his own community led a revolt against him that resulted in his false arrest and being forced from office. Joseph went through this experience without complaint. Picking up on this fact, Cardinal Prospero Lambertini, who would become Pope Benedict XIV, said Calasanz was a "perpetual miracle of fortitude and another Job." Next time you find yourself in a position to teach someone, remember the great dedication and patience of Joseph Calasanz.

THANK YOU to all who contributed to the August Food

Pantry. We served 110+ families this month thanks to your generosity, even during these summer vacation months. Besides groceries, we also offered families with children some school supplies. Our "share the wealth" distribution of fresh produce was awesome... we're sure there will be even more garden surpluses during September! Watch the Canticle for details about drop off times for fresh fruits and vegetables on September 13.

In the meantime, please keep our Food Pantry in mind when you do your grocery shopping. Several other reminders:

- All non-perishables are greatly appreciated, especially our staples of rice, dry pinto beans, peanut butter, jelly, soup, meals in a can/box, tuna, pasta, pasta sauce, canned fruits and vegetables, cereal and paper products.
- Each month we have a "specials table" where we have extra items from which our clients choose a couple of items. Some favorites include coffee, oatmeal, juice or soft drinks, crackers or cookies, diapers, toiletries, laundry detergent and dish washing soap. (Usually one of these extra items is also put in each prepacked family bag.)
- Remember to check expiration dates to avoid out-of-date goods which we cannot use.
- These items can be dropped off in the church vestibule in the bins now provided in the former baptistery.

The Food Pantry distributes groceries from the vestibule of the Church on the second Thursday of each month, from 6:30-8:00 PM. Our next distribution is on September 13.

This outreach is an important one which is greatly appreciated by the working poor in our area. Again, many thanks for your continuing support!




