

370. WHAT ARE THE PASSIONS?

The passions are the feelings, the emotions or the movements of the sensible appetite—natural components of human psychology—which incline a person to act in view of what is perceived as good or evil. The principle passions are love and hatred, desire and fear, joy, sadness, and anger. The chief passion is love which is drawn by the attraction of the good. One can only love what is good, real or apparent.

371. ARE THE PASSIONS MORALLY GOOD OR BAD?

The passions insofar as they are movements of the sensible appetite are neither good nor bad in themselves. They are good when they contribute to a good action and they are evil in the opposite case. They can be taken up into the virtues or perverted by the vices.

SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 30, 2007

TWENTY-SIXTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME Lazarus, is that you?

Whenever you see a homeless or poor or needy person, think of Lazarus in the gospel story—he's the one who languished at the door of a rich man who regularly feasted in splendor and pretty much ignored Lazarus. When Lazarus died, angels carried him off to the comforting bosom of Abraham, while when the rich man died he went to the underworld where, tormented by thirst, he called out to Abraham to ask Lazarus to run one last errand for him and bring him a cooling drop of water. No deal, Abraham said. Between you and Lazarus stands an unbridgeable gulf. In life you received while Lazarus didn't, and now the tables are turned.

Lazarus stands for all similarly suffering people in scripture—and today. When we walk past or around or even over the Lazaruses in our path, that short distance between us and them can turn into quite a gulf, too.

Today's readings: Amos 6:1a, 4-7; 1 Timothy 6:11-16; Luke 16:19-31 "But Abraham said, 'Child, remember that during your lifetime you received your good things.'"

MONDAY, OCTOBER 1

FEAST OF THÉRÈSE OF THE CHILD JESUS, VIRGIN, DOCTOR Revert to your spiritual childhood

For Jesus, children had a special place. For him, they represented the "least," the vulnerable, and also the most receptive. Children are both symbols and examples: symbols of those God especially cares for, and thus those we should especially care for, and examples of being open to and dependent on God. Thérèse of the Child Jesus—Thérèse of Lisieux—wrote of "the way of spiritual childhood, the way of trust and absolute surrender." If we make ourselves aware of the weaker folks around us and find ways to help them as well entering into a trusting relationship with God, we will enter into the spiritual childhood of which Saint Thérèse spoke.

TODAY'S READINGS: Zechariah 8:1-8; Luke 9:46-50 "The least among all of you is the greatest."

TUESDAY, OCTOBER 2 - FEAST OF THE GUARDIAN ANGELS Where angels fear to tread

Back in the day just about every Catholic child knew that a personal guardian angel watched over them. In recent decades belief in these angels didn't disappear, it just went into the Catholic attic for a while. Now it seems to be coming back down. Even the official catechism says: "From infancy to death human life is surrounded by [the angels'] watchful care and intercession."

If you look at what happens to children in our world today, however, you have to wonder if the guardian angels are asleep on the job. Children are regularly murdered in street violence and war, malnourished and even starved, used as soldiers, physically and emotionally abused, deprived of education, and otherwise left vulnerable to exploitation. Maybe we need to give the guardian angels a hand. How do we look out for our children, and the world's children?

TODAY'S READINGS: Zechariah 8:20-23; Matthew 18:1-5, 10 "Take care not to despise these little ones; for their angels continually see the face of my Father in heaven."

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 3 - Harsh words

Sometimes the gospel uses extreme language to make a point. Exaggeration was a common practice of writing at the time, and the

gospels writers did not shy away from it. Take, for example, Jesus' words to a would-be disciple to forego even the duty of burying a parent before following him. It was his way of saying that being his disciple requires a total commitment and an awareness that spiritual death is worse than the death of the body. Reaffirm your desire to let Jesus' way be your way.

TODAY'S READINGS: Nehemiah 2:1-8; Luke 9:57-62 "Let the dead bury their own dead; but as for you, go and proclaim the kingdom of God."

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 4

FEAST OF FRANCIS OF ASSISI, RELIGIOUS Not a garden-variety saint

"We all admire Saint Francis of Assisi" wrote the Catholic psychoanalyst Karl Stern, but "when we come to analyze what attracts us to him, we may find that he represents to us a fantasy of escape rather than a true hero. . . . In the mind of many people he has become a kind of nature boy who lives as the friend of birds and squirrels and does not have to pay any income tax." The fact that he experienced the wounds of Jesus, Stern said, "is a small-print footnote. Moreover, there is no need to do anything about it, because our station in life is such that we could not possibly all try to be Saint Francises."

Most statues of saints rest high on pedestals for easy viewing. But in literally looking up to them, we can make them into servants of our needs, available for petition but not imitation. We can overlook the messier details of their lives, especially when those details challenge us to sally forth from our comfort zones. Remember that behind the marble is flesh-and-blood.

TODAY'S READINGS: Nehemiah 8:1-4a, 5-6, 7b-12; Luke 10:1-12 "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few."

FRIDAY, OCTOBER 5 - Take it or leave it?

It used to be that buying toothpaste was a pretty simple affair; you didn't have a lot of options. Now a visit to the toothpaste aisle presents of dizzying array of choices. If nothing else, modern culture likes to give people choices. In fact, some call the times we live in a "culture of choice."

Being free to make choices means you can take one thing or leave another. But when it comes to Jesus, the stakes are raised. You are free to choose him or not, but your choice will involve a decision for or against the one who sent Jesus, namely God. You have lots of choices to make in life. Make sure you give enough attention to the biggest one of all.

TODAY'S READINGS: Baruch 1:15-22; Luke 10:13-16 "Whoever rejects me rejects the one who sent me."

SATURDAY, OCTOBER 6

Relatively speaking

We hear a lot about the evils of "moral relativism" these days, the idea that nothing really has ultimate value. But there is a good kind of relativism, one that puts God first and makes everything "relative" to God. Doing anything less—putting anything else in the place of God, like money, power, your own security, material possessions—becomes what's called idolatry. That's what got the Israelites into trouble with God: worshipping false gods, or what the prophet Baruch memorably called "no gods." A false god, the prophet says, is really no god at all.

Jesus has shown us the way things really are. He has shown us the true God and how to follow that God, not with power and things but with service and sacrifice.

TODAY'S READINGS: Baruch 4:5-12, 27-29; Luke 10:17-24 "For you provoked the one who made you by sacrificing to demons and not to God."

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Seminary Collection - This Weekend
