NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

Twenty-Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time

FAITH

Faith is trust in the person who has given you his word. The AMOUNT of faith you have in that person isn't important. Whether you trust a little or a lot, the job is done for you. If your trust was small as a mustard seed, you could still enjoy the gift you've been given. It is the gift given that is the key. Faith is trust in the person who gives the gift.

END OF THE FISCAL YEAR FINANCIAL REPORT

Thank you to all who continue to give generously to St. Cletus Parish. We have been able to maintain all of our wonderful ministries while taking the Parish in a new direction. The first Parish Pastoral Council has been established; we are in the process of formulating a Long Range Development Plan. Our Parish School and Religious Education programs continue with strong enrollments. During the past twelve months, several ministry areas have been expanded.

During next week's Masses, we will discuss the parish's financial results and condition. Although the parish finished the fiscal year ended June 30, 2007 "in the black," the news is somewhat mixed. When I arrived at St. Cletus, there were significant cash and investment balances and the parish plant was in good repair. I am pleased to report that St. Cletus remains in a healthy asset position and the facility continues to improve.

However, the parish ended the fiscal year with a surplus primarily because of our strong investment performance. The fiscal year just ended saw collections decline by almost \$149,000. If not for our strong investment performance, St. Cletus would have suffered a deficit of \$193,000. The parish finance committee has told me that our collections need to increase if St. Cletus is to maintain its solid financial condition. After viewing our financial results, I am confident you will agree.

Good stewardship asks us to review our yearly income and then return to God some percentage of our resources. The ancient Jewish prescription for tithing asked for 10% of income to be donated to the Temple. The Catholic concept of tithing suggests that 2½% of income be shared with the parish; while 2½% more is to be donated to worthy secular charities. Would you reassess your level of giving?

I am most grateful for your sincere review of contributions to our parish and for those who will be able to increase their offerings. Our parish expenses, like yours at home, continue to increase. You can be sure I will work to keep our expenses controlled.

I am confident you will do your part to support the parish with your time, your talent, and your treasure. Thank you for all of your contributions to St. Cletus!

In preparation for next week's presentation, we have included in today's Canticle a summary of the parish's assets, liabilities, revenues, and expenses as of and for the year ended June 30, 2007.

Compendium – Catechism of the Catholic Church

372. WHAT IS THE MORAL CONSCIENCE?

Moral conscience, present in the heart of the person, is a judgment of reason which at the appropriate moment enjoins him to do good and to avoid evil. Thanks to moral conscience, the human person perceives the moral quality of an act to be done or which has already been done, permitting him to assume responsibility or the act. When attentive to moral conscience, the prudent person can hear the voice of God who speaks to him or her.

373. WHAT DOES THE DIGNITY OF THE HUMAN PERSON IMPLY FOR THE MORAL CONSCIENCE?

The dignity of a human person requires the uprightness of a moral conscience (which is to say that i be in accord with what is just and good according to reason and the law of God). Because of this personal dignity, no one may be forced to act contrary to conscience; nor, within the limits of the common good, be prevented from acting according to it, especially in religious matters.

RESPECT LIFE SUNDAY

Sing it out

“*R-E-S-P-E-C-T, find out what it means to me,*” sang Aretha Franklin in her 1967 rendition of the hit song “Respect,” written by Otis Redding, another legend of soul music. At the time, African Americans were struggling for recognition and acceptance as equal participants in society. In the 1970s the song was picked up by diverse groups struggling for acceptance in society. As we celebrate Respect Life Sunday, it is good to remember that respecting life involves respecting the diversity of that life. God creates in many hues and shades, many styles, shapes, and sizes. Yet though we are diverse, we are equal in God’s eyes. Equality and diversity together sing a harmonious song of respect.

MONDAY, OCTOBER 8

Don’t fence love in

“Hear, O Israel,” says a famous Jewish prayer, taken from the Book of Deuteronomy, “. . . you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your might.” Sound familiar? How about this, from the Book of Leviticus: “You shall love your neighbor as yourself.” As you can see, the Christian teaching to love God with all your being and to love your neighbor as yourself was not new. What was new was the messenger: Jesus. And right before the “love your neighbor” quote, the Old Testament says, “You shall not take vengeance or bear a grudge against *any of your people.*” Christ, however, made it clear that love wasn’t meant only for your own people. “Your neighbor” is everyone.

TUESDAY, OCTOBER 9

FEAST OF DENIS, BISHOP, MARTYR, AND COMPANIONS, MARTYRS

The medium is the message

All martyrs’ stories sound alike. They certainly all end alike, with blood on the ground. But behind all these bloody endings are some pretty remarkable beginnings, each one as unique as you are to the person next to you. Each starts with an individual on fire with the beauty, hope, and truth of the gospel. So Bishop Denis, future patron saint of France, got together with six of his fellow bishops around the year 250 to bring the story of Jesus to Paris. It has been said that nothing is more eloquent than the blood of martyrs. These men became the message they brought.

TODAY’S READINGS: *Jonah 3:1-10; Luke 10:38-42*

“Get up, go to Nineveh, that great city, and proclaim to it the message that I tell you.”

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 10

The National Day of Forgiveness

OK: So there is no National Day of Forgiveness. But it got you thinking, didn’t it? What would it mean if we all agreed to set aside a day each year to forgive our debtors, as we hope to be forgiven? What would it mean if we forgave each other across race and gender,

generation and sexual orientation, social class and economic advantage, religious belief and political affiliation? What if each of us personally forgave that one person who has hurt us more than we can describe? It’s a day to dream about, and to live for.

TODAY’S READINGS: *Jonah 4:1-11; Luke 11:1-4*

“And forgive us our sins, for we ourselves forgive everyone indebted to us.”

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 11

Put some flesh in your prayers

Today Jesus states in no uncertain terms that every prayer is answered: “For everyone who asks, receives; and the one who seeks, finds; and to the one who knocks, the door will be opened.” Yet surely every one of us has had the experience of having asked and not received. How do we reconcile Jesus’ assurance with our lived experience?

One possibility is that every prayer is answered—just not always in the way we expect. Another, according to author Ronald Rolheiser in *The Holy Longing*, is that we must “put skin on our prayer.” In other words, we have to work actively to bring our prayer about. We are God’s hands and eyes and mouth. *If not through us, then how? And through whom?*

TODAY’S READINGS: *Malachi 3:13-20b; Luke 11:5-13*

“If you know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will the heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to those who ask!”

FRIDAY, OCTOBER 12

Just use Evil-B-Gone!

Now here’s a product we could use: Evil-B-Gone—your one-stop fix-it for any bad behaviors, dieting problems, and relationship issues you may be experiencing. Just hold the can upright and spray on that lazy impulse, chocolate cake, urge to argue, or impure thought. One quick spritz and it’s history!

Then again, maybe not. Jesus says it’s not enough to get rid of the evil spirit. You have to replace it with the spirit of goodness. That, regrettably, doesn’t come in a can. But it is available for the asking.

FEAST OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY

Bear Christ in your heart

There are 144 unnamed females in the Bible. Many are referred to as someone’s wife, mother, or daughter. Even queens don’t always merit a name. But on one occasion, a woman who remains merely a voice raised in the crowd spoke to Jesus. It took some courage for her to speak in public—this was not approved of, as we know from the letters of Paul that debate this right. Jesus immediately used her blessing to point to a deeper reality: that blessings are due to the one who bears him in the heart and not just in the womb. Mary, happily for us, did both.

TODAY’S READINGS: *Joel 4:12-21; Luke 11:27-28*

“A woman in the crowd raised her voice and said, ‘Blessed is the womb that bore you and the breasts that nursed you!’”
