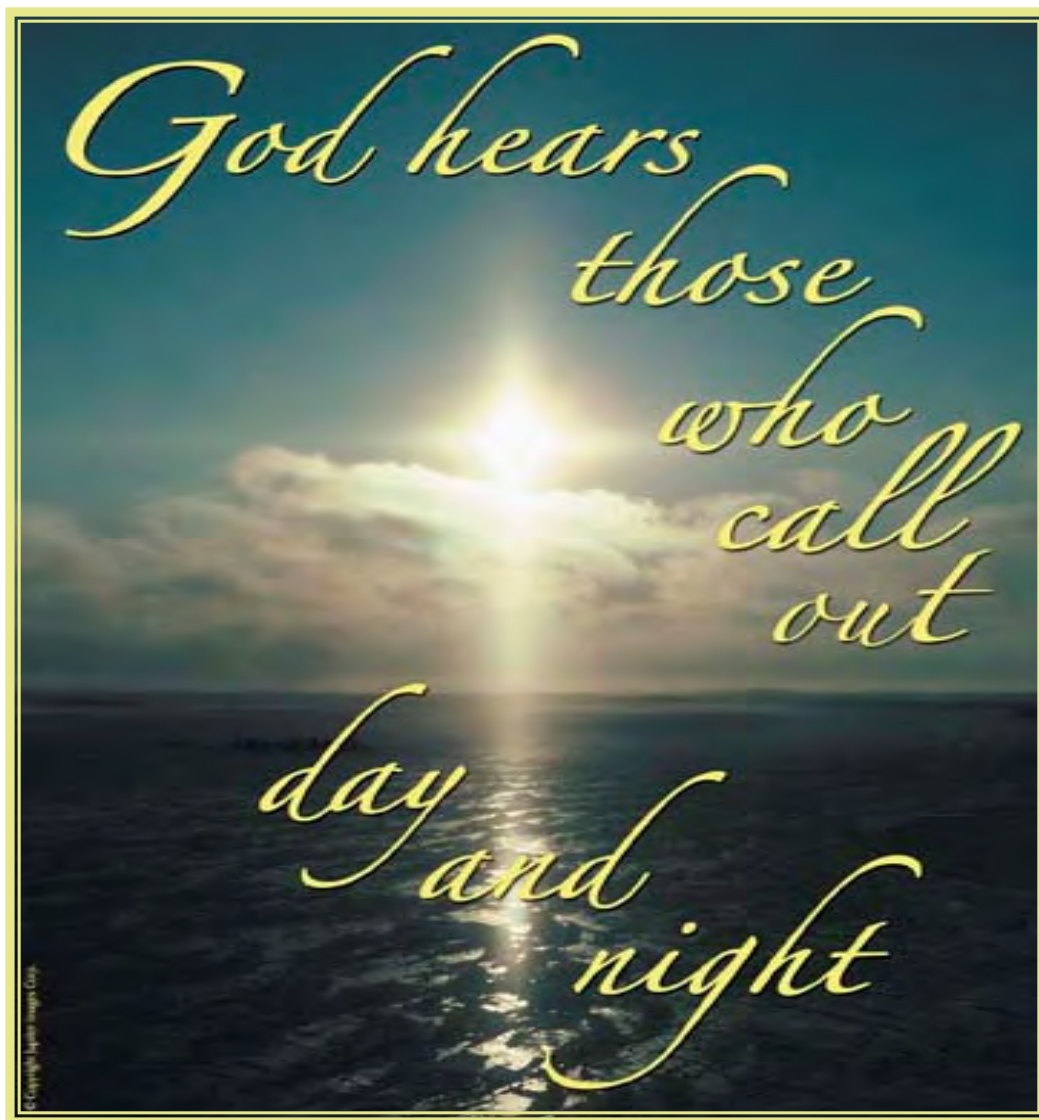

NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

Twenty-Ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Prayer

While I was reflecting on this week's readings, I came across some notes on prayer from a priest friend, Paul Siebenand, who is pastor of St. Catherine Catholic Church in Avalon, California. He calls them the "Three P's of Effective Praying."

"First, prayer should be very PERSONAL. Our personality, our deepest self should be engaged in any praying we attempt. It is not enough to simply recite formal prayers, such as the rosary or a chaplet, or read what others have written, including Bible passages, without any personal reflection or involvement. Prayer is an act of human communication. It involves both giving and receiving. It demands both talking or pondering and listening and responding. It is up to each of us to find the method and place and even the posture for praying that works best for us. Praying takes creativity as well as faith."

"Second, our prayer should be PERENNIAL that is, it should be constant and year-long, not just at certain times or seasons or places. St. Josemaria Escriva, founder of Opus Dei, has stressed in his doctrine of 'unity of life' that all one's daily work, ranging from professional to menial, when done as well as possible rises to the level of true prayer. He says there is no distinction between the spiritual life and the natural life when lived to the best of one's ability. Our daily tasks, rather than preventing prayer, can be prayer."

"Third, our prayer should be PERSISTENT. Jesus stresses again and again in the gospels that nothing is too trivial or too worldly to be an object of our prayer requests. The parable he tells his disciples, and us today as well, says in a very homey and almost humorous way that we should persist in our prayer requests - 'call out night and day,' Jesus says - until God answers our prayers."

Compendium – Catechism of the Catholic Church ***The Moral Conscience-Continued***

- **374. HOW IS A MORAL CONSCIENCE FORMED TO BE UPRIGHT AND TRUTHFUL?**
An upright and true moral conscience is formed by education and by assimilating the Word of God and the teaching of the Church. It is supported by the gifts of the Holy Spirit and helped by the advice of wise people. Prayer and an examination of conscience can also greatly assist one's moral formation.
- **375. WHAT NORMS MUST CONSCIENCE ALWAYS FOLLOW?**
There are three general norms: (1) one may never do evil so that good may result from it (2) the so-called GOLDEN RULE, "Whatever you wish that men would do to you, do so to them" (Matthew 7:12); (3) charity always proceeds by way of respect for one's neighbor and his conscience, even though this does not mean accepting as good something that is objectively evil.
- **376. CAN A MORAL CONSCIENCE MAKE ERRONEOUS JUDGEMENTS?**
A person must always obey the certain judgment of his own conscience but he could make erroneous judgments for reasons that may not always exempt him from personal guilt. However, an evil act committed through involuntary ignorance is not imputable to the person, even though the act remains objectively evil. One must therefore work to correct the errors of moral conscience.

Our mission encircles the globe

It's intriguing to reverse the roles in scripture. What if we think of God not as an unjust judge, but as the insistent widow and we ourselves (or an unjust society) as the one who needs to be pestered again and again into doing the right thing? Missionaries often find themselves in the forefront, demanding justice for the poor in the countries where they serve, an insistence often met with cold indifference, and sometimes with brutality. Yet these women and men, like the persevering gospel widow, do not remain silent, do not go away. If you could trace the history of your faith, it would have to lead back to some man or woman who would not take no for an answer but insisted on carrying the seed of faith that would some day blossom in you. Sustain those missionaries.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Exodus 17:8-13; 2 Timothy 3:14-4:2; Luke 18:1-8*

"Because this widow keeps bothering me, I will grant her justice."

MONDAY, OCTOBER 22 - Food for thought

One of the many ways greed manifests itself is in the area of food production and consumption, where vast global enterprises seem to gobble up every cog in the food chain. The "local foods movement," also referred to as "community-based agriculture," encourages consumers to connect with the food that they buy and consume every day by paying attention to its origin, and to favor locally grown foods whenever possible. Because food is something everyone needs every day, a small change in the way we produce and consume it can have a great effect on health, the ecosystem, and cultural diversity.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Romans 4:20-25; Luke 12:13-21*

"Take care! Be on guard against all kinds of greed; for one's life does not consist in the abundance of possessions."

TUESDAY, OCTOBER 23 - Begin with the end in mind

Chicago-based artist Deborah Boardman created the "Picturing Death Project" to provide a venue for people to reflect on their hopes, fears, and experiences surrounding death. Boardman understands that by writing responses to such questions as "What meaning does the fact that you are going to die give to your life?" and "What are your fears and hopes of death?" insights emerge that enable participants to see more clearly how they want to live.

Jesus had the same idea. By remembering that we are going to die some day, our lives can be lived more fully, consciously, and lovingly. We will be like the servants in the gospel: "Blessed are those whom the master finds vigilant on his arrival."

TODAY'S READINGS: *Romans 5:12, 15b, 17-19, 20b-21; Luke 12:35-38*

"If the master comes near dawn and finds them ready, blessed are those slaves."

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 24 - Ready and waiting

In scripture and tradition we remember and celebrate the past—but in the present. What has been applies very much to how we live now. We also look to the future in hope, when all Jesus stood for and taught will be fulfilled. We think of this time as his return, his coming again, when he will be with us again in his

fullness. And like the past, the future has a lot to do with the present. What we hope for shapes what we do now. That's why Jesus tells his disciples to be ready, especially because his coming again will be unexpected. But if we are ready, the only surprise will be a joyous one, like a surprise visit from a friend or loved one.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Romans 6:12-18; Luke 12:39-48*

"You also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an unexpected hour."

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 25 - Bring on the kindling!

We often think of fire in strictly negative terms, its capacity to burn and destroy. We should not lose sight of the positive aspects of fire, however—it allows us to cook our food and heat our homes, to create useful as well as beautiful materials of clay and metal. The sun's fire warms and lights the earth and provides the energy for plants and trees to grow, which nourishes us and our atmosphere. Jesus came to bring fire to earth—a symbol of new life, purification, rebirth.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Romans 6:19-23; Luke 12:49-53*

"I came to bring fire to the earth, and how I wish it were already kindled!"

FRIDAY, OCTOBER 26 - Judgment calls

Today, Jesus asks his disciples pointedly, "Why do you not judge for yourselves what is right?" Well, it's time-consuming, for one thing. There are so many issues and matters of consequence and problems to solve, how can we decide what we think about them all? And on top of everything else, Jesus warns, it's going to cause division in the household. It's just so much easier to accept what we've been told by our parents, teachers, clergy, and the media.

Implicit in Jesus' question is the imperative that, difficult and time-consuming as it may seem, we must judge for ourselves. And he's right, of course. Today, when an issue arises, we could stop and ask ourselves: *What do I believe about this? What does my experience tell me?*

TODAY'S READINGS: *Romans 7:18-25a; Luke 12:54-59*

FEAST OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY - Fruitful efforts

In biblical terms, fruitfulness is seen as a sign of God's blessing. Mary was the bearer of good fruit par excellence. In her womb and her witness, she brought God's work to fruition by giving birth to Jesus and offering him a mother's love and care. We are called to participate in Mary's witness by becoming nurturers and bearers of Jesus' good news. How can we imitate Mary's courageous and generous actions in our own lives today? What good fruit can we bring forth?

TODAY'S READINGS: *Romans 8:1-11; Luke 13:1-9*

A Christian Lifestyle

The Gospel message invites us, as Christians, to follow a different path - a road less traveled. As a people of faith and members of a parish faith community, we are called to live differently. In many ways a Stewardship Lifestyle is a dramatic departure from our consumer culture which can emphasize and celebrate self, wealth, the material and individualism. As a people of faith, we are called to share, serve others and be part of a worshipping community called parish.

Save Your Pop Tabs, PLEASE!

Our fifth grader religious education students are collecting pop tabs for their service project. Please help them by saving your pop tops and sending them in to the Religious Education Office or placing them in the drop box in the vestibule of Church.

The three core programs of the Ronald McDonald House, Ronald McDonald Family Room and Ronald McDonald Care Mobile are focused on helping families in need. The cornerstone Ronald McDonald House program began in 1974 based on a simple idea: Provide a "home away from home" for families of seriously ill children receiving treatment at nearby hospitals. Since that time, more than 10 million families around the world have benefited from the comfort provided by a Ronald McDonald House.

The Tab Top Program was started in 1987 in South St. Paul, Minnesota by a group of 30 families from VFW #295. They initially presented the local Ronald McDonald House with a check for \$120.00 and more than 15 years later the program has raised several million dollars.

Why tab tops? They are easily removed from the can and allow for any individual or community group to participate. Tabs are much smaller and cleaner than cans, enabling the House to handle the large volume that it receives. Besides, the Tab Top Program is unique to the Ronald McDonald House.

FOOD PANTRY UPDATE

Our deep appreciation goes out to all parishioners who brought donations for our October Food Pantry! We served more than 186 grateful families. And we anticipate serving the same number at our November 8 distribution. As you can see, the second Thursday of the month this time around is as early in the month as it can be. That means we have fewer days to prepare for it. So we ask you to start bringing in your donations as soon as you can, so our volunteers can begin making up our bags. THANK YOU for so faithfully remembering to add Food Pantry items to your shopping list. Here are some reminders:

- We need all of our staple items, including cereal, rice, dry pinto beans, peanut butter, jelly, soup, meals in a can or box, pasta, pasta sauce, canned fruits, canned vegetables, tuna, and macaroni & cheese.
- All in-date non-perishables are always appreciated.
- Some favorite “special” items are coffee, oatmeal, juice or soft drinks, crackers, side dishes, baby food, diapers, paper goods, cleaning supplies, laundry detergent and dish washing soap.
- We can also use large brown grocery bags, since we double bag the groceries we distribute each month.
- Both your non-perishable items and bags may be dropped off in the Church vestibule in the designated food bins located in the Madonna della Strada shrine area.

For your information, each month we also get food pantry donations from our friends at the Western Springs Methodist Church and the Highlands Presbyterian Church. This year’s CROP walkers also brought non-perishables to donate before they began the walk. Our school children have made the Food Pantry one of their yearly causes, and participants in our parish Women’s Club Movie Night donated beauty products for our female clients. We give THANKS to all our friends in the community who work together to help us meet the needs of our clients!
