

Notes from Father Bob ...

Thirty-Third Sunday in Ordinary Time HOPE

Why does the Lord speak of the end of time, today in Luke's gospel, when that end remains for us "an unknown"? Furthermore, we have to be occupied with the present time, the time in which we are living, and it is our duty to improve the things of time, to do our best that there might be more justice, more love, more equality in the distribution of well-being, more material and spiritual freedom. In reality, this discourse on the end of time sets before us the problem of the purpose and the end of civilizations.

Can we imagine human civilizations which produce marvelous achievements, even when offered to God as the Temple was offered to Him, and which are indestructible? Will there come a day when there is a civilization without wars; without famines; without hostility against God and His Christ? Jesus does not hesitate to answer this question. No! If so, what is the situation of a Christian in every human civilization? The Christian must bear TRUE HOPE in his time. He must have confidence in God's activity if he wants to have the strength to preserve that hope.

We bring a leaven of truth into human hopes, into human civilizations, when we work to make the name of "Jesus" known. This name "Jesus Christ" means the Son of God and Savior of men. We contribute to the salvation of a civilization to the extent that we bring to it – through the reality of our life, word, and action – the testimony that human success is realized in a relationship, the relationship of Jesus, adorer of God, who sacrificed Himself for us, His brothers and sisters.

THANKSGIVING

We will gather together this coming Thursday in thanksgiving for the many blessings we have received during this past year. We will join together, single and married, brothers and sisters, aunts and uncles, workers and co-workers, friends and enemies, believers and nonbelievers, to give thanks. It is the one day in our country where we are all united, no matter what faith or belief we may have or not have, in the understanding that we need to pause and be truly thankful for what we do have.

This is a day when we are truly at our best. We share what we have with one another freely and without expecting anything in return. It is a day filled with the grace of sharing and giving. Sharing and giving of thanks, appreciation, help, compassion, mercy, forgiveness, and love. Sound familiar? It is the call of the gospel. May we spend the rest of our days in thankfulness to a God who calls and guides us each day in the reality of this gospel call. May we in thankfulness answer that call with abundant gratitude and appreciation in how we treat each other every day of our lives.

The First Commandment: I Am the Lord Your God, You Shall Not Have Other Gods Before Me

• WHAT IS IMPLIED IN THE AFFIRMATION OF GOD: "I AM THE LORD YOUR GOD" (Exodus 20:2)?

This means that the faithful must guard and activate the three theological virtues and must avoid sins which are opposed to them. FAITH believes in God and rejects everything that is opposed to it, such as, deliberate doubt, unbelief, heresy, apostasy, and schism. HOPE trustingly awaits the blessed vision of God and his help, while avoiding despair and presumption. CHARITY loves God above all things and therefore repudiates indifference, ingratitude, lukewarmness, sloth or spiritual indolence, and that hatred of God which is born of pride.

SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 18, 2007

THIRTY-THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME; NATIONAL BIBLE WEEK - Do your part to expand the Bible belt

One still hears, even from well-educated people, that the Catholic Church is not Bible-based compared with most Protestant churches, even though today many of the most eminent Bible scholars in the world are Catholics. It seems that word of the Catholic reawakening to the centrality of scripture (as symbolized by the Word's prominence in the liturgy) has not filtered down, and perhaps we need to take responsibility. Catholics can talk the talk of holy scripture, but do we read it daily? National Bible Week reminds Americans to read the Bible "in every sector of society regardless of religious or political distinction," but we can go one better: We can pray the scripture until we and the Word are one.

Today's Readings: Malachi 3:19-20a; 2 Thessalonians 3:7-12; Luke 21:5-19 - "By your perseverance you will secure your lives."

MONDAY, NOVEMBER 19 - Please let me see

You've got to admire the blind beggar in today's gospel story. First, he ignores the crowd who wants him to keep quiet. He calls out repeatedly, "Jesus, Son of David, have pity on me!" Then, when Jesus finally stops and asks him what he wants, the blind man doesn't hesitate: "Lord, please let me see."

What if this prayer were ours, too? "Please, let me see . . . that life is beautiful even when it is very hard." Or, "Please, let me see through the eyes of my child, or that homeless person, or one who is dying." For to see is to understand. To understand is to forgive. To forgive is to be grateful. To be grateful is to have peace. And peace is what we really want.

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Maccabees 1:10-15, 41-43, 54-57, 62-63; Luke 18:35-43 "A blind man heard a crowd going by and asked what was happening. They told him, 'Jesus of Nazareth is passing by.'"

TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 20 - Jesus with the bad guys

So if Jesus visited your town today, whose house do you think he'd stay at? The pastor's? The mayor's? Yours? How about the person with the worst reputation in town? If you know the Jesus of the gospels, you'd probably guess the latter, and you'd be right. Zacchaeus was the biggest little bad guy in the hood and it just rankled the righteous when Jesus chose to stay with him. But when it comes to saving people, Jesus picks the folks in deep water, not the ones safe on the beach. So he probably wouldn't come to your house. Then again, maybe he would.

TODAY'S READINGS: 2 Maccabees 6:18-31; Luke 19:1-10 "All who saw it began to grumble: 'He has gone to be the guest of one who is a sinner.'"

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 21

PRESENTATION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY - For those who pray

Today Catholics around the world are encouraged to remember the thousands of men and women who choose to live their vowed religious life as cloistered contemplatives. Like the Blessed Virgin Mary, these men and women consecrate their lives in service to God; yet for contemplatives, their special offering to the church is separated, silent lives of prayer. In dedicating this Pro Orantibus ("For those who pray") Day in 1997, Pope John Paul II called cloistered contemplatives the church's vanguard who "serve as a leaven of renewal and of the presence of the spirit of Christ in the world." THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 22

THANKSGIVING DAY - That's the spirit

Today we give thanks for the many blessings in our lives. But what if we're not feeling particularly grateful? Maybe it's been a tough week or month or year for you, and your spirits are down. Here's what Albert Schweitzer, a great humanitarian, had to say about such periods: "At times our own light goes out and is rekindled by a spark from another person. Each of us has cause to think with deep gratitude of those who have lighted the flame within us." Pause to give thanks today for someone in your life who has been a guiding light and rekindling spirit for you.

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Maccabees 2:15-29; Luke 19:41-44 "If you had only recognized on this day the things that make for peace!"

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 23 - FEAST OF CLEMENT I, POPE, MARTYR Take a letter

We tend to think that important letter-writing in the early church was limited to what we have in the New Testament, Saint Paul being the star correspondent. But other figures wrote letters to Christian communities, like the third bishop of Rome, Clement. He wrote a letter to the same church in Corinth, in Greece, that Paul had tried to straighten out some years earlier.

Though we don't know very much about Clement besides the one surviving document attributed to him, we know he lived and worked in Rome at the end of first century, only a generation or two after Peter and Paul had died in that city. Clement mentions their deaths, writing of Peter, "Let us set before our eyes the illustrious apostles. Peter, through unrighteous envy, endured not one or two, but numerous labors, and when he had finally suffered martyrdom, departed to the place of glory due to him." Let us recall those early martyrs who gave everything they had for Christ and his church.

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Maccabees 4:36-37, 52-59; Luke 19:45-48 - "They rose and offered sacrifice, as the law directs, on the new altar of burnt offering that they had built."

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 24

FEAST OF ANDREW DUNG-LAC, PRIEST, MARTYR, AND COMPANIONS, MARTYRS - Culture gets holy; holiness gets culture

In 1988, when Pope John Paul II canonized the Vietnam martyrs whose feast we celebrate today, he used the opportunity to speak of the value of enculturation. The pope praised the martyrs and witnesses for initiating dialogue among various religious groups and proposing ways to put Christian faith in action that was suited to Asian culture, such as teaching that "one should respect and venerate one's ancestors according to the customs of the land in light of the mystery of the resurrection." Out of respect for these humble and courageous martyrs, do your best to respect the customs and religious practices of Catholics, Christians, and believers of all faiths as you freely practice your own cultural expressions of faith.

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Maccabees 6:1-13; Luke 20:27-40 "Indeed they cannot die anymore, because they are like angels, being children of the resurrection."
