Advent has a twofold character: as a season to prepare for Christmas when Christ's first coming to us is remembered; as a season when that remembrance directs the mind and heart to await Christ's Second Coming at the end of time. Advent is thus a period for devout and joyful expectation.

Notes from Father Bob ...

First Sunday of Advent "Light Our World With Peace"

We have seen the prophet Isaiah's vision of peace, where "one nation shall not raise the sword against another." In Isaiah 9:6, we find one of the most cherished titles of the anticipated Messiah: Prince of peace! What a great name for a savior! Yet, Jesus, called the Prince of peace, came two thousand years ago and these millennia haven't exactly seen the reign of peace. The bloodshed has continued unabated. In what possible sense is Jesus the Prince of peace?

Peace in the Bible is an active word, not a passive one. Peace is not simply the absence of war or the resolution of conflict. Biblically "peace" and "reconciliation" are inseparably related. Peace is the presence of something. Peace has a substance and a reality all its own. We speak of "making war," but peace is also something we "make." When God was reconciled to us in Christ, says St. Paul, God "made peace." (Ep 2:15) Those who are "blessed," said Jesus, are "peace-makers." Health isn't only the absence of disease. Joy is not simply the absence of sorrow. Truth isn't merely the absence of a lie. These things have a content of their own. So does peace.

Love makes peace. Good peace, not just a ceasefire. Love transforms hostilities, and converts their negative energies into life forces. The testimony of Christ's followers throughout history is that, because of the transforming power of love, "Christ is our peace."

Jesus, in his farewell to his disciples, said, "Have courage! The victory is mine! I have conquered the world!" There are still skirmishes among us and within us, and conflicts with old adversaries. But the decisive battle has been won. One day the peace of God will cover everything, like LIGHT! Until then, Christ is the one who MAKES PEACE and calls us to be PEACE-MAKERS. God in Christ has reconciled the world to himself, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation to help us "LIGHT OUR WORLD WITH PEACE."

SUNDAY, DECEMBER 2, 2007 -FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT Are you ready for this?

Virtually every church book is opened to page one today—the beginning of the liturgical year, the beginning of Advent. Yet Jesus' message—be prepared, stay awake, be ready—is an old one, and we do need fresh reminders because when there is no imminent crisis we forget to lock the doors and windows, to wear our seatbelt, to look both ways. Jesus' insistence on readiness is not a call for new pious practices but rather that the old compassion for the broken, the impulse to be kind, the need to be generous and grateful become so ingrained that when the doorbell rings or a trumpet blast shatters the sky, we'll be all right. Prepared. Ready.

TODAY'S READINGS: Isaiah 2:1-5; Romans 13:11-14; Matthew 24:37-44

"For at an hour you do not expect, the Son of Man will come."

Monday, December 3 - Feast of Francis Xavier, Priest Think globally, act locally

Saint Francis Xavier (1506-1552) is one the patron saints of Catholic foreign missions—not surprising given his dedicated service in Far Eastern mission work. But who's another? Saint Thérèse of Lisieux, the "little flower," who never traveled outside Europe and died at age 24 of tuberculosis in a small convent. Yet she wanted to go East as well, to live in a Carmelite community in Saigon. Her great desire, her prayer and support for missionaries, and perhaps most of all the popularity of her devotion to serving God in small ways with the people around her earned this surprising but ultimately logical title. Interesting: Mission isn't always about long journeys, strange food, and mosquitoes. Most of the time it's quite local, about the way you live the gospel right where you are.

TODAY'S READINGS: Isaiah 4:2-6; Matthew 8:5-11 "The branch of the Lord shall be beautiful and glorious."

TUESDAY, DECEMBER 4- ADVENT WEEKDAY; HANUKKAH BEGINS AT SUNSET - Share the light

Hanukkah, also known as the Festival of Lights, begins this evening and runs for eight days. It celebrates the rekindling of the Temple menorah at the time of a Jewish uprising against foreign domination that began in 167 B.C. The festival is observed in Jewish homes by the kindling of lights on each night of the holiday—one on the first night, two on the second, and so on. While followers of Jesus worldwide prepare for the Christmas holidays, it is good for us to acknowledge the religious holidays of other faiths. Surprise a Jewish friend or coworker by wishing them a Happy Hanukkah today.

TODAY'S READINGS: Isaiah 11:1-10; Luke 10:21-24 "You have hidden these things from the wise and the intelligent and have revealed them to infants."

WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 5- ADVENT WEEKDAY Something from nothing

The story of the feeding of the crowd with a few loaves of bread and a couple of fish is well known and much loved, and it's the only miracle that is told in all four gospels. It is also one reason why the fish was the first symbol of Christianity.

At its heart, this story is about abundance, where seemingly there was only lack. But make no mistake: This event is not just something that happened 2,000 years ago; it reveals a reality we live in today. We can't produce a feast for thousands, but we can create peace and comfort out of thin air every time we offer a kind

word or a helping hand.

TODAY'S READINGS: Isaiah 25:6-10a; Matthew 15:29-37 "Jesus said to them, 'How many loaves do you have?' 'Seven,' they replied, 'and a few fish.'"

THURSDAY, DECEMBER 6 - FEAST OF NICHOLAS, BISHOP The bishop of Christmas

Few historical figures could have made the transition from being a fourth-century bishop to becoming the most recognized icon of contemporary commercial culture, but Saint Nicholas managed to pull it off. He embodies the spirit of Christmas, both in giving and receiving. Children all over the world wait in joyful hope for a visit from Saint Nicholas on Christmas Eve. Grownups likewise spend enormous amounts of time and money in the pursuit of Christmas giving. These two experiences are the touchstones of Christmas: We receive the gift of Christ. And in turn we act on the words of Jesus by giving of ourselves. What better lesson can we teach our families than that of Saint Nicholas, who gave in the same manner that he received?

TODAY'S READINGS: Isaiah 26:1-6; Matthew 7:21, 24-27 "Everyone who listens to these words of mine and acts on them will be like a wise man who built his house on rock."

FRIDAY, DECEMBER 7-FEAST OF AMBROSE, BISHOP, DOCTOR The best use of authority

It is not uncommon to think that authority is only questioned from the bottom up. It may be interesting then to find the early patriarch Bishop Ambrose (340-397) looking critically at the corrupting influence of his own position when he says, "Authority is not evil in itself, but a certain use of authority is. Although it does not come from the devil, authority is subject to the snares of the devil." Unexpected words from a bishop. While Ambrose acknowledges that those who take on authority open themselves up to a great temptation, however, he nevertheless sees it as a necessary burden for the bishops of the church. Consider those things you take upon yourself that invite temptation, then question how necessary these things are in your relationship to Christ.

TODAY'S READINGS: Isaiah 29:17-24; Matthew 9:27-31 "Jesus said to the blind men, 'Do you believe that I am able to do this?' They said to him, 'Yes, Lord.""

SATURDAY, DECEMBER 8

SOLEMNITY OF THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION OF THE BVM; PATRONAL DAY IN THE U.S. - Past and present

Advent is a good time to ponder the mysteries of Mary, and the Feast of the Immaculate Conception (which celebrates Mary's conception) is a good place to start.

According to Pope Pius IX's 1854 solemn decree on the Immaculate Conception, "Mary was preserved exempt from all stain of original sin by a singular privilege and grace granted by God, in view of the merits of Jesus Christ." Here's the mystery: God preserved Mary from sin through the love of her son. What does this mean? It means that God works in the past as well as the present. It means further that our own past wounds and deeds—which we thought were cast in stone—are available to be transformed, too. What in your past needs healing?

TODAY'S READINGS: Genesis 3:9-15, 20; Ephesians 1:3-6, 11-12; Luke 1:26-38

EVENING OF REFLECTION FOR ADVENT

Please join us for an evening of reflection and friendship on Tuesday, December 11 at 7:00pm, in church, as we focus on the true purpose of Advent. *Keeping Christ in Christmas* is a reflection on the history of the Christmas tradition. From The Infancy Narratives in the Gospels to Living those Gospels today, we will explore the development and struggle to be faithful disciples in a difficult world that has taken our religious symbols and used them for profit.

Our presenter, Friar Johnpaul Cafiero, OFM, is a Franciscan Priest of the Sacred Heart Province of Chicago/St. Louis. As a follower of St. Francis of Assisi, Friar Johnpaul's love of the poor and the outcasts is only surpassed by his love of the scripture. This comes through in his many speaking and preaching engagements.

He has lectured extensively throughout the Chicagoland area, Joliet, New York, New Jersey, Ohio, Florida, Michigan, Ireland, Italy and on his study Pilgrimage to Israel.

Friar Johnpaul is a pastoral associate and preacher at Holy Family Parish in Inverness, a chaplain for AGLO at Mount Carmel Church in Chicago, and now serves as chaplain for the Illinois State Police - District Chicago.




St. Cletus Welcomes New Accompanist



If you itemize, your outright gifts of cash are fully deductible for federal income tax purposes up to 50% of your adjusted gross income. If your total gifts should exceed this limitation, the excess may be carried forward for tax purposes for up to five additional years.
